Hartford High Gets Jump on New Haven Hillhouse and Emerges Victorious, Score 14-0

LOCALS WIN WITH LITTLE DIFFICULTY

Elm City Team Threatens
Only Once—Gets to
30-Yard Line.

GALLIVAN AND SHAY
STRONG ON ATTACK

Blue and White Registers
Early—Blocked Punt
Brings Touchdown.

The Blue and White of Hartford High smashed its way through to a 14 to 0 victory over the New Haven Hillhouse eleven at Trinity Field yesterday afternoon.

The locals found little difficulty in defeating the Elm City warriors. The ball was continually in New Haven's territory, the Blue and White backs forcing the New Haven line to their liking.

New Haven Threatens Once.
Only once during the game did the New Haven team reach Hartford's 30 yard line but they could get no further.

New Haven's lone chance to score came when Molloy broke through the local line for a sixty yard run but "Dinny" Shay, Hartford halfback, brought him down on the 30 yard line.

Here New Haven opened up on its aerial attack but failed to complete a pass and lost the ball on downs. Hartford kicked off to New Haven but they could do little with the Hartford line and punted. Counihan ran back a punt ten yards. Hartford crashed its way to the 3 yard line and Shay took it over on a line play.

Hartford's second touchdown came soon after. "Henric" Walsh broke through the Hillhouse line and picked up a blocked kick, running thirty yards for a touchdown. For the rest of the half the ball was in New Haven territory but Hartford was unable to put it over.

Fumble Costs Score.
At the start of the second half Hartford received the kick and started a march down the field that seemed sure to land them a touchdown but a fumble lost the ball on the 5 yard line. Hartford had many other chances to score during the rest of the game but lacked the touch to put it over.

It was an entirely different Hartford High team that took the field in contrast with the teams which played such mediocre ball against Windham and Weaver.

The old Eight, sadly lacking in the past few games, made itself manifest and played a big part in the Blue and White victory.

Plain Line Plays.
The Newellmen showed their fight at the time they held New Haven on their own 30 yard line for four downs without making a gain.

What makes the Hartford High victory all the sweeter was the fact that they beat the Hillhouse on plain line plays. Hartford didn't attempt to throw one pass during the entire game and tried only one end run which went for twenty yards. The only department that New Haven bothered Hartford in was the kicking.

Walsh's thirty yard run for a touchdown was the outstanding feat of the game. The playing of Captain "Joe" Ring on the line and Tommy Gallivan and "Dinny" Shay in the backfield was a treat to watch. Time after time Ring broke through the New Haven interference and nailed the runner for a loss, while Gallivan and Shay reeled off many a yard for the Blue and White. Molloy's playing stood out for New Haven.
