

Hartford High Gets "The Breaks" to Win Opening Game of Interschool Series

Root's Ninety Yard Run Proves Real Feature

Blocked Punt Leads to One Touchdown — Losers Count Twice on Safeties—Bulkeley Makes Costly Fumbles but Shows Open Game

Hartford High getting the breaks yesterday scored a 12 to 4 victory over a strong Bulkeley eleven in the opening game of the local interschool season at Trinity Field.

Both of the touchdowns scored by the Blue and White eleven were of the like variety. In the second period Kerwin, Hartford, end, blocked a punt on the Bulkeley 30 yard line and with the same motion scooped the ball up before it touched the ground and ran the remaining distance for a score. Root added the other six points when he picked up a fumble by Ensign on his own ten yard line in the third quarter and raced ninety yards for a touchdown.

Score On Safeties.
 The losers scored their points on two safeties.

Bulkeley had several chances to score, but slipped up on every occasion generally because the backs tumbled.

Outside of the runs by Kerwin and Root there was little of the spectacular. The forward passing combination of Urrichio to Carella featured the South Enders attack. Urrichio played an ideal game although his helpers erred all around him. He handled every punt from his safety position in good style contributing several neat run backs.

"Pat" had a tough time getting past the Blue and White wingmen. Both Ring and Cunningham were down under every kick and they didn't miss their tackle very often.

Many Substitutions.
 Newell kept a steady stream of substitutes going into the game with which he was plentifully supplied. Johnny Burke, the blue and White's center and captain, was the lone Hartford player to go the entire distance. Needless to say, Burke's playing both in the line and behind it was exceptional.

Tommy Hayden, playing his first game for Hartford, looked good as did Jackie Kenny, who started the game at fullback. Jackie made a couple of nice runs while his defensive work also was of high order.

Both schools were well represented in the stands and although the weather was decidedly warm for good football, it was fairly comfortable on the side lines.

Bulkeley Power Wanes.
 Bulkeley displayed a good attacking power around midfield, but whenever they advanced to within striking distance their offense went amiss.

It might be said in finishing that Bulkeley showed a good deal more power than even the majority of their admirers expected them to display and that even in defeat they looked good. A slightly better Hartford High eleven which played heads up football took the verdict. Summary:
