

Hartford High Places Five Players on Courant's All Hartford Schoolboy Eleven

Weaver And Bulkeley Are Each Given Two Positions

Suburban Schools, East Hartford and West Hartford, Both Land One Man on All-Star Choice—Blue and White Had One of Its Best Years

The All-Hartford High School team has become a yearly institution. The past season was one of the best ever experienced in Greater Hartford schoolboy circles.

A short review of the records of the five secondary schools in this district will serve to exemplify this.

Hartford High, with one of the best teams in its history, shows a slate unblemished by defeat and only scarred slightly through a tie game with New Britain. The Newellmen climaxed a brilliant season by drubbing New Britain, 24 to 6, in the Red and Gold's own backyard. As a result of its record the Blue and White eleven laid claim to the state championship, and although this move was contested by several other state teams, Hartford High has a strong title to the honor.

Bulkeley Was Good.
 The other high schools were outdone by the senior institution, but they had fairly successful seasons. Bulkeley High's record of five wins and only two losses and Weaver's identical slate are especially noteworthy.

East Hartford and West Hartford High, the two suburban teams, have enjoyed much better seasons, but considering the apparent dearth of material the two coaches had to work with it is not at all surprising that their records were not better.

But to get back to the main issue—the All-Hartford team.

Three Good Ends.

There were three outstanding wingmen, Cunningham and Ring of Hartford and Rosenbaum of Weaver. Cunningham is undoubtedly the best of this trio and Rosenbaum is given the other berth because of his kicking ability, which was a dominant factor in all of his team's games.

Dubofsky of Weaver and Fisher of West Hartford appear to be the class of the tackles. Dubofsky is one of the best linemen that Hartford has ever produced. He weighs well over 200 pounds, is fairly fast, a deadly tackler and a good man on the offense. Fisher possessed all the qualities of a good tackle and besides he did most of the kicking for his team. Pitney of Hartford, Strong of East Hartford and Baron of Weaver also did good work at the tackles.

Cernsole of Bulkeley looked the best of the guards. The Cutler brothers of

Hartford High also contributed heavily to their team's cause, but Frank Cutler, because of the fact that he played in more games than his brother, is given the other first team position.

Captain Johnny Burke of Hartford High is far and away the best center of the lot. No other pivot man can be considered in the same class with Burke at the snapper back berth.

There were two good quarterbacks, George Stangle of East Hartford and Urricchio of Bulkeley. The first team honor rightfully belongs to Stangle, however, as he proved to be a better all around man than Urricchio.

Tommy Hayden of Hartford High was the outstanding halfback. Hayden was the most consistent ground gainer for the Blue and White team and although illness permitted him to play only part of the New Britain game his showing in the previous games easily rates him the first team job. Cooksley Bulkeley and Hoot of Hartford appear to be the only two halfbacks in line for the other job although Gray of West Hartford also did some good work.

However, Cooksley played consistently well all season while Root, who was handicapped by injuries, was more of an in and out.

Kenny Deserves Honor.

Jackie Kenny of Hartford, Polly Phelps of Weaver and Powell of East Hartford were all exceptional fullbacks. Kenny, through his sensational work in the final game of the season with New Britain, which climaxed a season of splendid work, seems to be the most deserving for the first team job. He had a rather tough assignment in making the Blue and White varsity early in the fall as he had to win the regular fullback position from Barker, who was generally conceded to be one of the best secondary defense men in the city.

Hartford High easily leads in respect to the number of players chosen on the first and second teams with five players on the first eleven and four more on the second team. In fact practically the entire Blue and White team was picked and well they might be for they were by far the best of the lot.

Weaver and Bulkeley each have two men on the first team while the suburban schools both placed one man.
