The first The Courant's boys basketball poll of the season provided few surprises. As expected, Hartford Public is No. 1 with seven of nine first-place votes and 262 points.



The Owls (3-0) have been impressive in victories over city rival Weaver (83-49) and perennial power Wilbur Cross-New Haven (103-79). HPHS has a dominating center in 6 foot-11 senior Marcus Camby and an

excellent backcourt led by senior guard Kendrick Moore (31 points against Wilbur Cross).

St. Joseph-Trumbull, defending Class L champion, is No. 2 with 248 points and one first-place vote.

The Cadets have one of the better inside-outside combinations in 6-9 center/forward Keith Vail and senior guard Desmond Artis. St. Joseph was ranked 25th in USA Today's preseason national poll and 24th by Street & Smith's magazine. The other first-place vote went to Notre Dame-West Haven. Brian O'Dowd, a 6-4 swingman, is shaping up as one of the better players in the All Connecticut Conference.

## Wilbur Cross goes west

Wilbur Cross raised more than \$10,000 to pay for its trip to Las Vegas Christmas Day where it is playing in the Las Vegas Holiday Prep Classic through Wednesday. Coach Bob Saulsbury said Starter Sportwear Inc. of New Haven donated 400 T-shirts, which team members sold for \$10 each. The rest of the money came from button sales and donations.

"It's a very fine honor to play in the Las Vegas tournament," Saulsbury said. "The kids were all very excited about going out and playing some of the best teams in the country."

Cross (2-2) is 1-1 in the tournament and plays a losers bracket game today.

Saulsbury admitted he was nervous about facing the competition in Las Vegas after the Governors suffered their worst defeat in recent memory (to HPHS).

"I hope the sound thrashing we got [against Public] has made the kids realize that we have a long way to go," Saulsbury said. "I know we have a good team, we just have to make the commitment to being a great

team."
Wilbur Cross has gotten great play from 6-2 senior swingman Will Shoulars, who scored 71 points — including a career-high 43 against McMahon-Norwalk — in Wilbur Cross' first two games.

And speaking of Saulsbury: The veteran (26 years) coach said at the start of the season this would probably be his last. But now he says the door is partly open for a return next year. "I've been in the game a long time and it looks like this will be it, but we'll see," Saulsbury said. "Although after [the Public game] I think I might as well have handed in my resignation."

#### Rule changes

The most significant rule change implemented this season is "the Magic rule." The National Federation of State High School Associations mandates that any player with an open wound be removed from the game and cannot return until the bleeding has stopped. In addition, any clothing, such as uniforms, socks, or sweatbands that become bloodied must be removed or replaced before the player may return.

The rule is in reaction to former Los Angeles Lakers guard Magic Johnson, who announced last year he had tested HIV positive. Johnson's disclosure raised questions as to whether the virus, which causes AIDS, could be contracted while playing sports.
