■ Defense always has been Courtney Dunston's favorite part of basketball.

"Defense," Dunston said, "is

what gets results."

And results are what Dunston has given Hartford Public this season. Dunston, a 6-foot-2 junior forward, has been an integral but sometimes overlooked part of-Hartford Public's 8-0 start and the top ranking in The Courant's coaches poll.

Playing behind 6-11 senior

center Marcus Camby does not allow others much time in the limelight. But Dunston is beginning to emerge from the shadow.

Dunston is averaging nine points and three steals a game. Tuesday, he scored a career-high 15 points in an 85-53 victory over rival Bulkeley. Friday, Dunston had 10 points and seven rebounds in a 50-33 victory over No. 8 Manchester.

Dunston was a vital part of Hartford Public's success Friday, combining with Kendrick Moore for 10 points in the third quarter as the Owls outscored Manchester 14-6 on the way to a 32-26 lead.

"I thought Courtney made a real good contribution [Friday] and that just inspired everybody," Hartford

Public coach Stan Piorkowski said.

As usual, Dunston's most important contribution against Manchester was defense. Left free to roam the passing lanes in Hartford Public's full-court press, Dunston made three steals, two resulting in layups.

"The offense comes off of the defense," Dunston said. "I like defense. I don't worry about the rest of the

game because that's the most important thing to me." One thing that concerns Dunston is losing the No. 1 ranking.

"I want to be No. 1 all year," Dunston said.

"We play every game like it is our last game. Against Manchester, we played every player like he

was their star."

Manchester's defense, which had allowed an opponent 50 points once before Friday, was the focus of pregame talk. Dunston was proud to point out Hartford Public held Manchester to a season-low 33 points.

"We all know what we can do out there and we just have to keep working hard to reach our goal," Dun-

ston said
