A 27-0 title run sets standard

NEW BRITAIN — After the jubilant Hartford Public basketball players sprayed coach Stan Pior-

sess the 83-68 CIAC Class LL championship victory over Danbury Saturday.

"It means — we made history," White said. "We went 27-0. We won the City Series, our league [CCC East and now we're state champions."

A crowd of 4,146 squeezed into Detrick Gymnasium at Central Connecticut State University to watch second-seeded Hartford Public cap a perfect season in perfect fashion.

The victory ended a 31-year championship drought and made the Owls the first boys team to go 27-0 (Harding-Bridgeport and Thomaston were 26-0 in 1987 and 1991, respectively). The Owls won the Class A title in 1962 and had gone 0-for-6 in

state championship games since, losing by a total of 34 points.

Led by tournament most valuable player and All-American Marcus Camby and his splendid supporting cast of Kendrick Moore, Courtney Dunstan, Michael Thompson and White, the Owls achieved their lofty goal.

"We all agreed it was an easy set of goals because all high school teams do it," Piorkowski said. "The players realized, from the beginning,

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that if they allowed their egos come in with their ability, it was going to take away from their goal."

The Owls, ranked No. 1 in The Courant's coaches poll all season, combined for 19 assists in their patents.

combined for 19 assists in their patented, unselfish style.
"That's a very, very good team,"
Danbury coach Walt Richard said.
"They were better than us, and deserve their ranking. I have an awful lot of respect for them."
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Said Piorkowski: "In my 25 years, I don't think I've seen a team pass the ball on the break as well as we did. Once on a break, they didn't think whether they should or shouldn't pass. They just did it. They saw the open guy. That passing starts with the players. As a coach, you try to help and encourage it in practice, but if the kid doesn't have it in his heart, he won't make those passes you saw today."

Camby, the 6-foot-11 University of Massachusetts-bound senior center, had 32 points (13 of 18 from the field), 14 rebounds, four assists, three blocks and four steals. Moore, a 6-2 junior forward, finished with 21

a 6-2 junior forward, finished with 21 oints (8-for-11), six rebounds and ive assists. White, a 5-9 senior guard, contributed nine points on guard, contributed nine points on three three-pointers, had three as-sists and one steal. Eighth-seeded Danbury (22-5)

Eighth-seeded Danbury (22-5) was led by 6-3 junior forward Anthony Scott (19 points, six rebounds, two steals); 6-4 senior forward D'Quill Osbey (18 points, eight rebounds, two assists and two steals); and 6-5 junior center Marcus McCollough (17 points, 12 rebounds, one assist, three blocks, four steals).

It was Danbury's third appear ance in a state title game since 1989 and marked the second time the Hat-

ters have lost to a Hartford team. Weaver beat Danbury 79-76 in the 1991 final. The game was fast-paced from the start, and the teams matched basket for basket the first four minutes. With the score 13-13, Dunstan's basket with 4½ minutes gone sent Hart-ford Public on a 10-2 run for a 23-15

The Owls started with man-to-man defense, but Piorkowski switched to a 2-3 zone — with Camby on one of the wings — after four minutes. 20 free throws. Danbury was 29-for-80 (36.3 percent) from the field, 3for-19 from three-point range and made 7 of 10 free throws. Hartford Public outrebounded Danbury, 46-

Camby, who sat out his junior year after transferring from Conard-West Hartford, left the game with 1:39 remaining. He cracked a wide smile and hugged Piorkowski, "Yes, those were tears," Camby said. Camby said.

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
