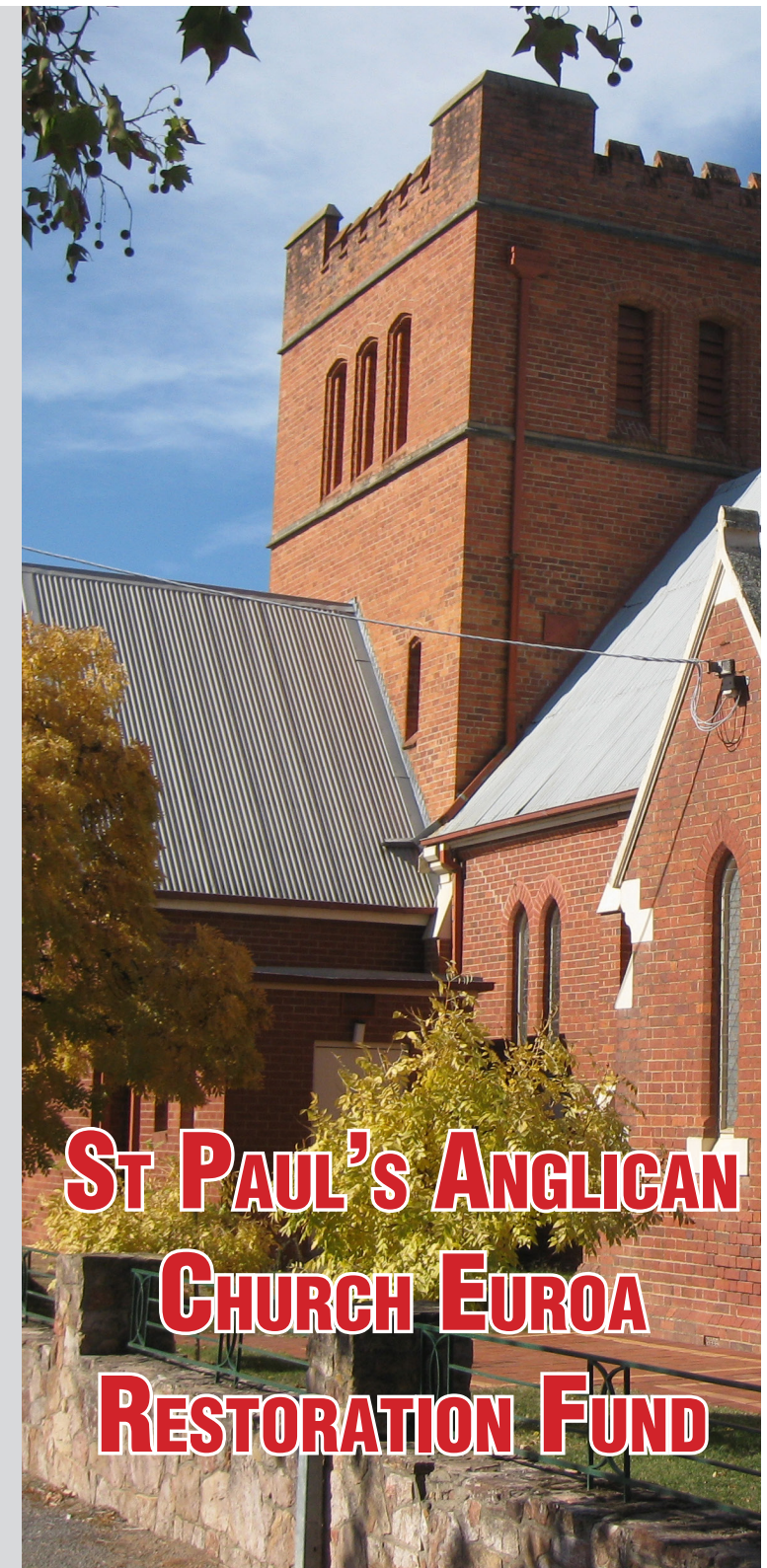

HISTORY

The church was constructed after plans were drawn up for a Gothic style building in 1884 and the building was completed in 1884. The church was opened in 1885. By the 1920s after work on the Rectory was finally finished, the focus then returned to a need to include a Sanctuary and Chancel within the church building. Prior to this time a temporary timber extension to the Nave had sufficed but was always felt to be inadequate. The extension to the church was started in 1929 after engaging well-known architect Louis Williams.

The plan included a bell tower above the Chancel, and the foundation stone for this extension was laid in November, 1929 by Wangaratta Rt. Rev John Stephen Hart. This was the time of the great depression and there was much discussion, consideration and debate over the finishing of the building. The actual tower cost an extra 400 pounds to complete.

In the 1960s further changes took place. The Stribling family presented the church with a fine pipe organ built by Mr Stephen Laurie. The organ has since been classified by the National Trust. During this time, the current Vestry and a new Baptistry were also built.

When Louis Williams had drawn up the plans for the Sanctuary and Chancel, he had also indicated a small Lady Chapel in his drawings and sketches. Eventually in 1978 the Chapel came into being. Built on the north wall of the Chancel it affords a place for small services and quiet times for worshippers.

This building has been classified by the National Trust of Australia (Victoria) and the parish have set up an appeal for restoration works. July 2018



WHAT NEEDS TO BE DONE

An accredited conservation architect will be employed to guide the project and ensure that the restoration works are undertaken in accordance with the specifications of the National Trust.

The following aspects of the building will be the main focus of the restoration:

- Termite damage to the floor requiring treatment for infestation and replacement of the floor throughout
- Drainage – replacement and enhancement of existing systems to minimise future degradation due to excess moisture
- Repair and restore the internal plaster where necessary and repaint all walls
- Replacement of the carpet
