### Acute Kidney Failure By Cassandra Cowans & Mary Stewart

Acute kidney failure occurs when your kidneys suddenly become unable to filter waste products from your blood. When kidneys lose their filtering ability, dangerous levels of waste may accumulate and your blood's chemical makeup may get out of balance.

Acute kidney failure, also called acute renal failure or acute kidney injury, develops rapidly, usually in less than a few days. Acute kidney failure is most common in people who are already

hospitalized, particularly in critically ill people who need intensive care.

Acute kidney failure can be fatal and requires intensive treatment. However, acute kidney failure may be reversible. If you're otherwise in good health, you may recover normal or nearly normal kidney function. Signs and symptoms of acute kidney failure may include: decreased urine, fluid retention, swelling in legs, ankles or feet, shortness of

breath, fatigue, confusion, nausea, irregular heartbeat, chest pain or pressure, seizures or coma in severe cases. Acute kidney failure can occur when you have a condition that slows blood flow to your kidneys, you experience direct damage to your kidneys or your kidneys' urine drainage tubes (ureters) become blocked and waste can't leave your body through your urine. Some preventive measures are to pay attention to labels when taking over-thecounter pain medications and make healthy living a priority.

#### "Justice in the New Testament" By Dr. Tyrone T. Davis

My assignment is to write an overview of the theme for Summer 2018 Sunday School lessons, which was entitled, "Justice in the New Testament." Since this overview occurs after the Summer Quarter, for some, it may be a refresher. The best overview I can offer is to share what was most meaningful to me, which I found in the Standard Lesson Commentary. Because justice, is an important issue for us today, in both local and national news and it was also an important issue of both the Old and New Testaments, I will attempt to paraphrase the Commentary's introduction thusly.

Justice in the biblical period was not a simple concept. In fact, there were four classical subcategories that further describe justice:

**Distributive Justice** – focused on economic fairness. Its primary point was that individuals should receive what is due them.

**Procedural Justice** –focused on due process, or fairness, in the application of rules. Such as, the principle emphasized in the commands to treat foreigners, widows, orphans and individuals with no legal status – justly.

**Restorative Justice** –focused on punishments that required an offender to make restitution. There were no jails in ancient Israel, so criminals were expected to repay damages. This type of justice today is found in our civil courts.

**Retributive Justice** –focused on punishment for its own sake, such as penalties levied proportionate to the crime and was often found in principles such as an "eye for an eye."
