ANNUAL SHORE DINNER

Saturday, October 1, 1 pm to dusk

Don't miss this highlight of our OYC season!

Our OYC Shore Dinner is an all-day affair, but you can also come just for dinner. From 1-5 p.m., the chowders (New England, Manhattan and Vegetable soup) are served. The first of the shrimp and steamed clams are served at 1. About 3:30 more shrimp and steamed clams are served along with salt potatoes. Then at 5, salad, salt potatoes, corn-on-the-cob, lobster or steaks are served, with cookies for dessert. Between courses, members visit on the porch, go sailing, paddling, bike riding or walking. This year we are offering two sizes of lobsters: large (1 ½ to 2 lb) or small (1 ¼ to 1 ½ lb).

Sailing on the Lewis R. French

If you've been to any events at the club, you might have noticed the hats worn by the Flahertys or Urbans that feature a sailing schooner and the name Lewis R. French. We brought those home from our four-day sailing adventure in Maine in July.

Launched in April 1871, the French is the oldest schooner still sailed in the nation; originally designed to carry lumber, granite and even Christmas trees along the New England coast, the ship was converted in the 1970s to a passenger vessel. It features 5 single cabins, 6 double-bed cabins, and 2 bunk-bed cabins, as well as a full galley with a wood-burning stove (you have to see it to believe it), a library and a wonderful crew.

We sailed out of Camden, Maine on a Friday morning and headed down to Rockland, Maine to join several other windjammers for the annual Rockland Lighthouse Parade. Then we headed east across beautiful Penobscot Bay before mooring out (for the first of three nights) near one of the many islands off the coast of Maine. The next evening, we moored near Pond Island, in sight of Acadia National Park, for a lobster dinner. Along the way we observed porpoises, seals, and a variety of birds including a bald eagle. In the evening, passengers could swim or row ashore for short hikes. By the time the sun set, we were exhausted!

With only the captain and a crew of three, we and the 17 other passengers happily pitched in to help raise and lower the sails as well as pull up the anchor every morning. Naively, we thought we might even lose some weight on the trip, but the food was too good!!!

Returning to Camden on Monday morning, we reluctantly said our goodbyes and headed home to Central New York – but can't wait to go again next year, and hope other OYC members can join us for another fabulous sailing adventure!

If it is September it is Ya gotta Regatta time. The OYC held an Invitational Regatta on the first weekend after Labor Day for many years. From the late 1930s to the early 2000s that weekend was the last regatta for many who came. Yacht Clubs from the Central New York region were invited to the races. Any One Design Class with 3 boats or more could have their own start; although later, Handicap racing was used.

From the late 1930s to the 1980s classes included: Snipes, Lightings, Lasers, Thistles and Rhodes Bantams. Some of the trophies are in the display case. Some of the flags hanging in the main lounge are from those races. A good time was had by all!

OYC Sailing School 2016

Our 2016 Sailing School, held June 27, 28, 29 and July 6, 7, 8 and followed by three practice sessions, was a great success. Twelve youth ages 7 – 12, seven adults and one Sea Scout participated. Students included OYC adult members, children and grandchildren. Over half of the participants were non-members. Instructors included Heather McQuade, assisted by Robert Gustke, for the youth, and Jeff Freedman, Bill Pease, and Ron Higgins for the adults, with over a dozen other members and Sea Scouts assisting on shore and on the water.
