

"Take Bullying Seriously--It's Never A Joke!"

I am sure we all can recall when back in school so many years ago, there were instances of bullying--teasing, tormenting, name-calling, and even hitting. Maybe you yourself was even bullied or made fun of.

Commonly, those of us who wore glasses were ridiculed and named "four eyes." Some of us may have been teased due to being plump, skinny, having curly hair, red hair, being blonde, being a stutterer, etc.

Most of us were instructed at home or at school that when bullied, the best reaction would be to say, "Sticks and stones may break my bones...but names can never hurt me." Unfortunately, that didn't work very well. Remember?

According to the Health Resources and Services Administration, "bully-victim behavior" is a public health problem affecting up to a quarter of students every year. On any given day, as many as 160,000 students stay home from school because they are afraid of being bullied. Victims of bullying often remain quiet out of shame or fear. Many victims of bullying are told to "ignore it;" "it will go away," and, occasionally are even themselves blamed for "provoking the bullying." Some parents very unwisely may even tell their children to "hit back," which automatically gets them into trouble.

Children's parents/guardians, and the school staff need to ensure that their children's school culture never demonizes "tattle-tales" or "snitches." Children are to be encouraged to report bullying they experience or witness. Nobody should ever be bullied. If it's not reported, not dealt with...it will continue and grow. And, then, everybody loses!

Bullies, of course, warrant attention because bullying behavior strongly predicts future trouble with the law. Schools must provide, on a regular basis, assemblies wherein all the children learn that bullying is never, ever permitted and that their school has an anti-bullying policy, especially in the social media, such as Facebook and Twitter.

End of year is the BEST time for PR

With the end of the club year in sight, now is the time to start reviewing your efforts from the current year and planning your year ahead. Your goal should be to plan in detail for six months and then revisit your plan every three months. Listed below are actions that are particularly important at this early stage.

Review how you did last year and identify what worked and what didn't work. Talk with other clubs to see what they did and how you might be able to partner with them to gain exposure.

Take full advantage of the PR resources the Federation offers at the District, State, and National level. There is a wealth of information readily available for you.

Meet with your district leadership team to discuss the year ahead and use the objectives to revamp or create your PR plan.

Establish a publicity calendar to keep track of what's happening in your club and/or district Include events, projects and publicity efforts through December (six months), such as club programs, district conferences, announcements, anniversaries, open house meetings, milestones, member achievements and recognitions.

Indicate the vehicles you will use to attract and connect with fellow members (internal audience) and news media (external audience). For example: news releases, your (club or district) newsletter, websites and social networking sites.

As a reminder, communicate openly with your local media. Tailor your pitch and/or news release to meet the topics your local journalists are writing about.

Include contact information of everyone you need to reach, what needs to get done, who's responsible, and what the deadlines are.

Some of our clubs, held election in March and are changing officers in May and June. Once the club officers for 2019-20 have been elected, why not plan an Officer Orientation for all officers? Even if you have served on your Club's Executive Board (Committee), the new responsibilities of your next office may need to be described or discussed. Even if you are continuing in the same office, you may have some questions about club protocol or responsibilities.

An Orientation for Officers will be beneficial for all. As a new officer, or new to a position on the Board, you'll want to know all about your duties. Where can you find the information you'll need to fulfil your job? Check your club Bylaws and Standing Rules. Another valuable resource to you throughout your term is your predecessor. I am sure she will welcome your questions and be there for you if the need arises.

Many clubs have "In & Out" Board meetings where new officers are welcomed to the Board meeting at the end of the club year. This is an excellent time to get to know the President and officers you will be serving with – both incoming and outgoing – remember to share vital information to help the club operate smoothly during the transition. 
