

"Love of Country MUST Be Taught Early & Forever After!"



May is particularly a special month. It's when we all are invited to commemorate all those Veterans who "gave their all to protect us, to preserve our freedoms, our liberties. Let's all never forget to celebrate Memorial Day—May 27, 2019. How? By visiting a local cemetery and sharing in the Memorial Day Celebration. By wearing a poppy—American Legion Auxiliary Members and VFW Members will be offering the poppies for a donation. The poppies are made by hospitalized Veterans; all proceeds are donated to Veterans and their families.

Increasingly happening at many public events and even at meetings of community service organizations, when the pledge of allegiance is performed (and frequently is NOT!) some men and boys do not take off their hats. Some people don't even stand up, and others do not even recite the pledge. Why? Because they don't even know the words. A former school principal of the largest pre-K-12th school district in California recently told me that "Teachers in that district no longer have their students salute the flag." And so it goes!

Oft times when our National Anthem is sung, the audience is invited to stand and hear the singer "perform <u>OUR</u> National Anthem." Attendees, rarely join in the singing. If you dare to sing along, you may receive inquisitive or even hostile looks of admonition. Sadly, too many attendees do not even know the words. Many men forget to take off their hats. The only men allowed not to "uncover" are present or past military Veterans—they are allowed to render the military salute with their open hand.

Not long ago, I attended a concert at the Hollywood Bowl and was dismayed that a man, his wife, and children who were seated behind my family, did not stand to salute the flag nor sing our National Anthem. When asked about this, the father proudly said, "Oh, we don't do that because this country is so racist." And then you may recall that "kneeling" at some NFL Games has become more and more in vogue by some players who claim that they are expressing their "protest against racism."

A tv news report recently showed that a little Boy Scout, who unlike his fellow scouts, was kneeling during the salute to our flag. His father was interviewed and proudly announced, "I am so proud of my son—he's a real American...protesting racism!"

Some of our colleges and universities have a strict policy that forbids military recruiters from entering their campuses. And so it goes. But why?

In my humble opinion, love of country, instilling patriotism, and respect for our nation's flag must begin at an early age and continue thereafter. It once was an unquestioned tradition (patriotism), which seems to be disappearing more and more. But why?

Yet, there is hope! It was absolutely inspirational to witness at this year's Super Bowl that when the talented Gladys Knight performed the National Anthem so beautifully, a number of football players and fans joined in the singing.

What's the answer to the growing lack of patriotism? Quite simple. It's up to us, the adults, to model proper behavior: to remind others of love of country; proudly saluting our flag; wearing a poppy, and singing our National Anthem—not standing in silence as a singer "Sings our National Anthem."

What else can we do? We can fly an American flag on our car or on our home. Put a patriotic bumper sticker on our can. Yes, we can inspire and remind others by joining in the singing of our National Anthem whenever given the chance

The International Outreach Community Service Program is designed to give members the opportunity to **become better world citizens** and make an impact throughout the world **through education**, advocacy, and action to affect change for others throughout the world.

One fun way is to learn about International Affiliates of the General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC)! International Affiliates are clubs, Federations, and associations whose work is relevant to GFWC programs and are based outside the United States.

How It All Began

In 1889, Dr. Emma Brainard Ryder of the New York City Sorosis Club placed an advertisement in a newspaper in Bombay, India, inviting young women of all classes and nationalities to a meeting about forming a women's organization. Dr. Ryder received a great deal of backlash for her plan. Some missionaries said that men would not permit women to participate, and residents of Bombay argued India's caste system would make forming a club difficult.

Despite this doubt, 47 women attended the first meeting, and 30 women became charter members. Thus, the first GFWC International Club was created. GFWC Founder Jane Cunningham Croly sent a message congratulating the new club. "Tell them the world was made for women also," she wrote.¹

Recent History

The black and white photo on the left shows a delegation of GFWC members in 1953 going to Havana to meet with the Havana Women's Club and to learn more about commercial coffee production on the island. First Vice President Helen Chapman was invited as an honorary guest of the Havana Women's Club. During the club's Federation Day celebration, Mrs. Chapman addressed the crowd and reported that "the Federation prides itself on being the most democratic organization in the world. Prospective members are not investigated on race, religion, economic or social standing; they are asked to affirm their willingness... to help others." The Present

Some recent accomplishments by international affiliates include:

GFWC Belmopan Women's Club (Belize)

- Bottle cap collection to fund chemotherapy sessions for hospitalized children.
- Breakfast for hungry school children.
- A community garden for local residents to plant vegetables, herbs, and flowers for both personal consumption and for sale to the community.

The Cam Kwoki Woman's Club (Uganda)

- Work towards a loan plan for women.
- Chicken and pig raising.
- Beaded handbags, candles, and body jelly production.

Cam Kwoki members recently expressed thanks to GFWC Maine for donating over 760 reusable sanitary pads, cloth bags, and underwear. Prior to receiving the pads, young girls missed up to 55 days of school each year. Since the donation, school attendance for girls has dramatically increased, and their academic achievement and self-confidence has grown.⁴

Champions of Peace and Nonviolence

From women's rights and racial justice to disarmament and gun control, visionary women have championed the drive for nonviolent change. These women consciously built supportive, nonviolent and loving communities while advocating necessary changes to achieve peace. They have given voice to the unrepresented and hope to victims of violence and those who dream of living in a peaceful world.

Women have learned to step forward with confidence and their legacy sparks others to use legal defense and public education to direct actions that reduce violence, achieve peace and promote the common good. History tells a complete story of the accomplishments of many such women. Some of the women honored in the annals of the 'National Women's History Alliance' are still living today. Women such as:

Deborah Tucker - President of the Board of Directors of the National Center on Domestic and Sexual Violence, has dedicated over 40 years to ending violence. She founded and led several organizations while working with many to advocate for improvements to laws, policies, and pass the Violence Against Women Act of 1994 and co-chaired the Defense Task Force on Domestic Violence. She is currently President of the Board of Directors of the National Center on Domestic and Sexual Violence.

Graciela Sanchez - Co Founder of the Esperanza Peace & Justice Center, is a dedicated neighborhood activist and cultural worker. She is the co-founder and director of the Esperanza Peace and Justice Center in San Antonio, Texas. The Esperanza is a community-based arts and cultural organization, committed to serving marginalized communities. She has worked throughout her lifetime to eliminate racism, sexism, homophobia, and class elitism. Her activism facilitates conversations on issues of colonization, cultural genocide, violence and intersectionality.

Kathy Kelly - Co-coordinator of Voices for Creative Nonviolence, is a peace activist, pacific, and author, one of the founding members of *Voices in the Wilderness*, and currently a co-coordinator of *Voices for Creative Nonviolence*. As part of peace teamwork in several countries, she has traveled to Iraq twenty-six times, notably remaining in combat zones during the early days of both US-Iraq wars. Her recent work has focused on Afghanistan and Gaza and protesting US drone policy.

In recent years, *Sarah Brady*, became active in the gun control movement in the 1980s after husband, Jim Brady, was permanently disabled in the failed assassination attempt on President Reagan. She was the most visible gun control activist of her time and was instrumental in the passage of the Brady Handgun Violence Prevention Act, more commonly known as the Brady Bill, in 1993. In 2000 Handgun Control Inc. was renamed the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence and Sarah Brady was appointed chairwoman where she served until her death in 2015.

The work women do matters! Why? For younger women and girls, knowing women's achievements expands their sense of what is possible. Knowledge of women's strengths and contributions builds respect and nourishes self-esteem, which is crucial to women of all ages.

You too are a role model within your home and community. Help other women set the world on fire and create change.....peacefully!
