We met, we carved and I am not sure all us conquered but we tried. Looks like we are in the mood for bird carvings. At the meeting, there were Bluejays, Canadian geese, Loons, and a shorebird being worked on...what happened here? I just can't keep up.

We discussed the upcoming Acadian World Congress that is coming to the County in August of 2014. This is a festival of Acadian and Cajun culture and history and is held every five years. In the past, this international festival has been held in Louisiana and Canada. In 2014, it will be held here in the County and will be the gathering site for many large Acadian family reunions. Hundreds of people are

expected to come to the county for this event. There will be many different interesting venues offered and concerts to attend. The festival will provide education and entertainment on such subjects as family life, art, music, farming, lumber industry, etc of the first Acadians and should prove to be very interesting.

Tom is still working on small scale sign models which he is designing in order to construct and carve the actual larger sized road signs for the Acadian Congress. The signs will depict Acadian life during the 1700-1800s. These signs will be posted all along the route between Van Buren and Madawaska at festival time.

Our group is making preliminary plans to hold a special worldwide Woodcarving Competition that will be held in conjunction with the 2014 Acadian Festival and will replace the competition normally held at the forestry building during the fair.. We will let everyone know more as the plans develop.

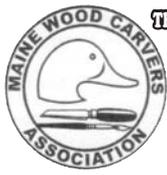

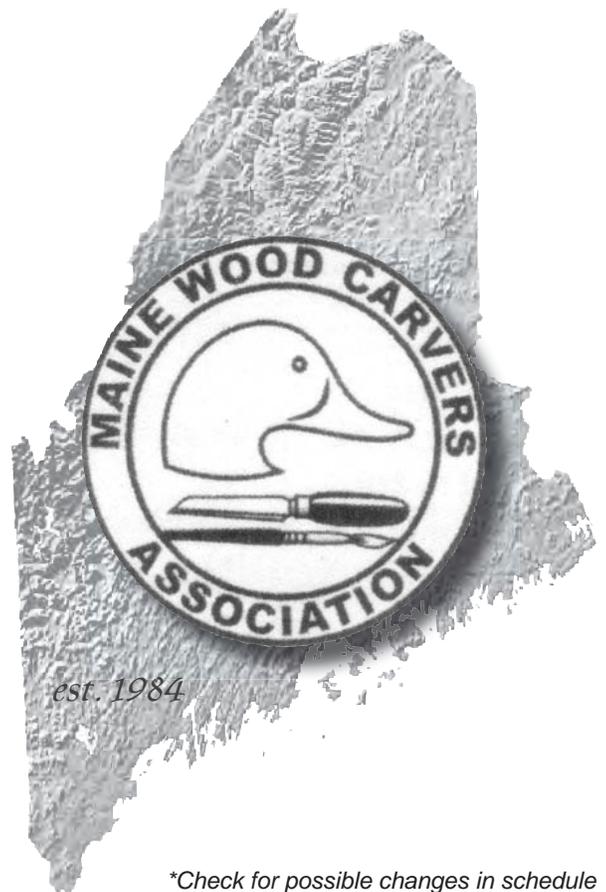
