a wooden quilt. When finished it will be presented to the Quilter's Guild for display at their 2012 show to be held tentatively in Augusta. . So far we have eight members interested. Should be fun!

Tom and Elizabeth and Heather were busy doing woodcarving demonstrations at the World Cup Biathlons in Presque Isle and Ft. Kent the first two weeks of February. Elizabeth worked on her horse's head and Heather worked on an owl she has started in the round.

Tom has been busy showcasing his talents as a carver of not only wood but now ICE..As part of the biathlon festivities Tom created two ice sculptures. One of the Nordic Heritage Sport Club logo and the other of the 10th Mountain Ski Club logo. The Nordic Heritage ice sculpture will be on display in front of the Aroostook Centre Mall in Presque Isle until it melts. The other ice sculpture is located in Ft. Kent.

Each block of ice was 3 feet by 3 feet by 10 inches and weighed roughly 600 pounds. The ice was delivered in 4 blocks that were cut and delivered by some of the Amish living in Fort Fairfield. Two other blocks served as the base. I believe I was told that this is the first ice sculptures that we have seen here in Aroostook County. Many people and visitors to the County were able to watch the carving as it progressed. It was quite an accomplishment and we are all very proud of Tom.

We are all busy working at our projects; some of which will be entered in the next woodcarving competition. Galen is working on a relief carving of 3 raccoons nestled inside a tree trunk..Very cute. Ron is working on a rooster of a different kind (stylistically created)...can't wait to see it completed. Dan is working on a relief carving of a fireman in full gear. He may have to guard that one as I know there would be many people who would like to have it when it's done..Dan does a wonderful job on his pieces. Miles and Amy are also busy with their projects. Miles is doing an old tar (sailor) in the round and Amy has chosen to do a very pretty yard scene with house and trees. Hers will be in relief and is coming right along. John Violette is working on a duck He just finished doing a bust of an African woman ...it came out just beautiful. Natalia waaaaas working on a moose relief the last time I looked. She's so quiet I have to sneak up on her to see what she's been doing.

We are still making plans for the next carving

competition. Will keep everyone posted when there are more details to share.

EAGLE HEAD CANE FOR AIR FORCE VETERAN

In 1954 following graduation from Buckfield High School, my older brother Luther and two fellow classmates, Guy Lovejoy and David Heald enlisted in the United States Air Force. Luther and David served their enlistments and returned to civilian life. Guy made the Air force his carrier, retiring as a Tec Sgt after 20 Years. Guy (a Vietnam Veteran) returned to Buckfield with his family enjoying frequent camping trips and a second career as a mechanic and with his cousin, owned and operated the Buckfield garage. As fellow campers Merriel and I have fond memories of camping, sing a longs and entertainment with the Lovejoys and related family members.

Last fall following a camping trip, Guy was diagnosed with a rapidly advancing form of brain cancer. Just after New Years I contacted brothers Luther and Chuck to create an Eagle Head Cane for Guy. When creating Canes for the Eagle Head Project, we work as a team. Luther turns the shaft, Chuck does the lettering and carves ribbons/awards, and I carve the Eagle Head.

On Sunday Feb. 6th, the three of us traveled to the Lovejoy home and presented the cane. Guy now confined to bed and unable to speak was most appreciative of this gesture. The entire time we were there he did not put the cane down, all the time turning it in his hands and admiring it. With tears in his eyes, he tried to speak. It was most rewarding to witness this obvious appreciation. His wife Shirley, daughter Anita and granddaughter Jessica told us that Guy had not shown this much reaction and emotion for several days. On February 10th, Guy passed away.

We were fortunate that we could present this cane to Mr. Lovejoy before his passing. A good lesson learned in that we should strive to complete and present Eagle Head Canes in a timely fashion, especially in cases of illness.

MASSACHUSETTS SANTA

A co-worker in my daughter's office in Massachusetts needed a gift for a friend who collects Santa Clauses. She asked if I could carve a Massachusetts Santa. My first thought was "What is a Massachusetts Santa?" The answer was anything that represents the State of Massachusetts. She had a picture of a Red Socks Santa and said that would do if I couldn't come up with something different. I liked the baseball Santa but wanted to create something different and of my own creation. I suggested a "Minuteman Santa." She thought this would be a great idea and gave the go ahead.

I used a modified version of Ol Don Bergdorf's "Where's Mama Santa" from the #8 issue of CARVING MAGAZINE. In order for this pattern to fit my needs as a Minuteman, I moved his right arm forward and placed a Tricon hat in his hand as if he were placing it on his head. I also lifted his left foot giving him the appearance of taking a step forward. In his left hand I placed a lantern and a second one sits on the ground beside him. To his right is a lamp post with a sign pointing to Concord and Lexington. On the ground in front of him is a folded note with the message "In the old North Church, 1 if by land, 2 if by sea". On the base is lettered "DELIVERING FREEDOM, AMERICA'S MOST PRECIOUS GIFT."

The finished carving met with approval and delivered to its new home in Massachusetts.





Bird Collection

Maine Wood Carvers Association now has American Robin, Pine Siskin, Philadelphia Warbler and White-winged Crossbill mounts. If members find a bird specimen that we do not have in our collection, wrap **JUST THE LEGS/FEET** in a wet paper towel, place the specimen in a plastic bag and remove as much air as possible from the bag before freezing. If you have a vacuum sealer, that works even better!. Then let me know you have the specimen, and I'll arrange for a pick-up. Freezer burned specimens cannot be made into mounts.

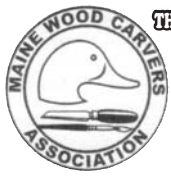

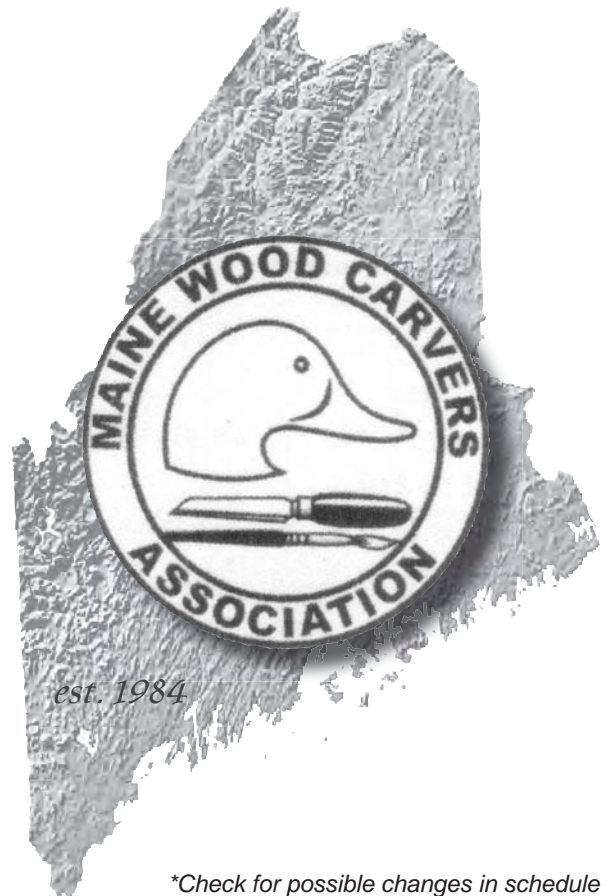
