## Chautauqua Bottoms ADA Trail Construction Update

**Project Recap:** Improvements to this site will include upgrading a trail to ADA Friendly trail standards, installing a bridge over Little Crab Orchard Creek, improving the trailheads, and enlarging the main parking lot.

**Construction:** Upgrades are underway! The parking lot expansion and amenities installation were completed earlier this spring, the ADA trail construction will begin this summer, and the pedestrian bridge installation is on track for this fall/winter—we couldn't be more excited!

**RTP Grant:** The Illinois Department of Natural Resources Recreational Trails Program is funding 80% of the original cost of this project, and we have been actively fundraising for the remaining 20%.

**Costs and Fundraising:** Due to additional requirements for the pedestrian bridge and the recent increase in the price of steel, the project cost exceeded the original estimate. We have been actively seeking additional grant funding to help cover the original match requirement and the additional project cost.

To date we have raised \$9,335 from our generous donors. We are very honored that so many of you felt this was a project worthy of your support. We are also extremely happy to announce that the Carbondale Township approved a one-time grant request, and has awarded \$25,500 toward this project. The Township was in a unique position to award these funds because of a new state law that compelled the Board of Trustees to spend down surplus funds in their general assistance budget. Furthering their tradition of supporting local nonprofits, the Township used these funds to increase grants made available to community groups during this budget year.

*We're Almost There:* With donor support and the Township grant, we are in a good position to meet the increased project costs. Any funds raised above the project cost will be

put towards extending the ADA trail surface to additional trailheads. If you have not donated towards this project, would you consider doing so? Together, we can make this trail system accessible to nearly all in our community so those with limited mobility can share our hiking trails.

## Landscape Plants Gone Bad: Burning Bush

Every year, in all seasons, Green Earth volunteers spend hundreds of hours working in our preserves. The vast majority of those hours are spent tying to eliminate or slow the spread of invasive plants. Left unchecked, alien invaders will overwhelm the native plants in GE preserves. Despite our best efforts, we are barely holding the line against some species and every year additional invaders are added to our list of problem plants.

Local yards and public properties are often landscaped with plants that are destructive when they spread to natural areas. Despite their destructive attributes, many of these plants are legally sold and planted. Most gardeners don't intend to cause harm to local plants and animals, but often are unaware of the broader consequences of planting garden varieties available at their local nurseries.

GE is expanding our focus to include education about plants that should be avoided or eliminated from landowner properties. In our first article we discussed winter creeper. This article addresses burning bush.

Burning bush, *Euonymus alatus*, is a popular ornamental shrub, easily recognized in the fall by its brilliant red foliage. A native of Asia, this shrub grows 20 feet tall, and is often wider than tall. Burning bush is an invasive species that produces prolific seeds that are spread by birds. Having invaded woodlands of eastern North America, its importation and sale is now prohibited in the states of Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Maine. It is best removed sooner rather than later, because removing a mature burning bush is a formidable task, often requiring a professional arborist with heavy equipment.

Burning bush can be seen at all GE sites. When you join us for a workday you can learn to identify this species and eradication techniques.

#### Native Alternatives to Burning Bush

Although burning bush provides beautiful fall color, it is a one-season show. Two species of sumac provide equally showy fall color, along with flowers, fruits, and seeds.

Fragrant Sumac, *Rhus aromatica* leaves are pungently fragrant, lovely flower clusters.





Smooth Sumac, *Rhus glabra* has short, crooked, leaning trunks and picturesque branches. On female plants, yellow-green flowers are covered with buzzing pollinators, flowers are followed by bright-red, hairy berries in clusters which persist throughout winter.
