School is in Season

It is once again that time of year we have to change our driving focus as we go about our daily routines. Drive through almost any neighborhood and you will see this:

Every fall we have to re-learn a new skill. Last June, when school let out, we quickly learned to ignore that reduced speed zone, since it wasn't a reduced speed zone any more. It didn't require any effort at all. Now we have to re-learn the previous skill of driving 20 mph during restricted hours.



Now, a school zone slower speed limit is a good thing and necessary to safeguard children, but just when school opens we are all still in summer time mode – bopping to music, enjoying the sun through the car sunroof or thinking about how early you can leave work to go on a short bike ride. It takes a concentrated effort to see that flashing speed limit ahead of us, especially with the sun rising behind it.

Be aware of the different kinds of markings to designate school zones. It may be as simple as lines on the road. There may be signs overhead or on the side of the road. There may be flashing lights only or all of the above.

Don't rely on flashing lights alone. Legal court decisions in recent years have said that even if lights are not flashing, and it is during restricted hours while school is in session, the 20 mph speed limit applies. It is the drivers' responsibility to know when schools are in session so the limit can be obeyed. Tickets issued for speeding in a school zone, even though the lights are not working, are valid.



On your daily drives, know where the schools are located. And watch for the young drivers with shiny, new licenses who get to drive to school each day. They are already distracted, just being teens, and friends, school stress thoughts and applying new skills are now behind a large moving vehicle. If you know that kid, remind them to slow down, look twice and don't become a statistic.

Back to some Basics about Team (Group) Riding

Last month I refreshed on the basics of "self-checking" our bikes for roadworthiness, the T-CLOC forms. In this month's article we will acquaint (or re-acquaint) ourselves with some of the basics of safe riding in groups. To prepare for our scheduled color rides in October, I would appreciate if everyone (especially our newer members!) could attend a brief refresher on Team Riding, following our October 1 gathering. I promise to keep it short, so that we can get to our scheduled "fun" day at Tim and Connie Ratliff's.

I will also offer a Road Captain course next spring, probably in April, for anyone who would like to learn (or refresh) your skills as effective (safe) group ride leaders and/or tail-gunners. The Road Captain course has two parts, a "classroom" segment, followed by a "road" segment, so you can put your new skills into practice on a short structured ride. It is fun (and free!) and everyone is invited to attend.

For now, let's review the standard "Hand Signals" that are used on a group ride. These may be important for those cases where someone in the group may not have a CB radio on their bike, or if someone's radio may not be working properly. These are found in the GWRRA Team Riding Manual, which is available on the GWRRA National Website. These will be reviewed in more detail at the October gathering.

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These are the standard CWRRRA signals for use in communication with motorcycles not equipped with CE radios which are following the lead bike.

Following bikes should acknowledge comprehension by a head nod or flick of the dimmer switch.

To gain the attention of the lead rider, following bikes should flash their headlights. The lead rider can then nod acknowledgement, or give the "Come Alongside" signal when safe, so the following rider can signal his or her needs.

"Follow Me"



Arm extended straight from the shoulder. Palm forward.

"Speed Up"



Arm down to side. Fist clenched. Twist as if turning throttle.

"Need Fuel Stop"



Arm out to side. Point to fuel tank.

"Need Food Stop"



Arm out to side. Fingers closed. Thumb to mouth.

"Turn Signals Left On"



Repeatedly open and close hand with thumb and fingers extended.

"Stop or Slow"



Arm extended straight down. Palm back.

"You Lead"



Arm extended down. Palm forward. Swing forward from hip in arc.

"Hazard in Road"



Point immediately with emphasis. Sometimes done with right arm.

"Come Alongside"



Same as "You Lead," but ending with alongside pointing motion.

"Pull Off"



Arm positioned as for right turn. Forearm then swung toward shoulder.

"Need Comfort Stop"



Upper arm extended. Forearm straight up and down. Fist clenched. Short up-and-down motion (like pulling a toilet chain.)

"Single File"



Arm and index finger extended straight up.

"Double File"



Arm extended straight up. First and fourth finger form "ram's horns" sign.

"Check Headlight"



Tap on top of head with open hand, palm down.

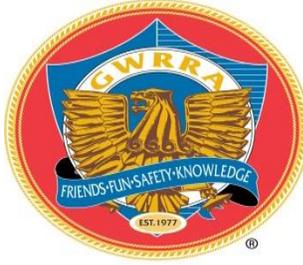

Product review by Tom Eden

Do you have Baker Built Air wings on your ride (bike/trike)? Have you ever experienced the tab (clip nut tab) on the side body panel of your ride breaking? I had this experience and had talked to the parts person at Honda Marysville Motorsports about ordering a panel. I knew that Gary Ballou had a tab break on his 'wing so I asked how he had resolved the problem. My budget said that was not an option. After taking off the air wing on the side that was broken and pulling the panel aside I began thinking of some options. I left the wings off both sides for the ride to the Region D Rally. Baker Built's manufacturing site is off Ohio 127 and that was my route north from route 33 in Celina to route 30 so I stopped by Baker Built and mentioned that problem while I was obtaining several other items. They showed me a clip that they manufacture just for this type repair. Cost was \$10.00 and change for the part so I purchased two in order to have a spare. I was shown how to install the clip and was on my way. Here are two pictures, one is of the broken clip on my ride and the second is the clip. The clip is installed with the nut on the down side to provide extra grip on the broken tab.

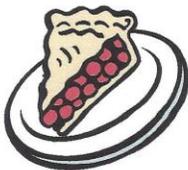
