A few insights I've picked up from long-distance motorcycle

touring...

I'll admit that I've stolen a few of these from various sources, but I've validated them all from personal experience.

Most motorcyclists seem to hate the superslabs, but I don't. Even though you're moving at a faster speed, you have mostly eliminated the hazards associated with intersections (opposing or side traffic making turns in front of you, bicyclists, pedestrians, animals chasing you etc). Let's face it friends, if somebody does turn left in front of you on a freeway, they've got to overcome a few hurdles (barriers, cables, median) before they can get to you.

In my opinion, distracted drivers (playing with their phone or radio, texting, reading, or whatever) are a little easier to spot on a highway rather than in stop-and-go city traffic. They usually give it away when they start to gently slow down for no (apparent) reason, or start that subtle weaving in their lane. And if you can get their attention for a moment (a short blast of the air horns is usually effective <grin>) you can easily get away from them.

If another driver does you a courtesy, return a friendly wave. If they've been an a**h**e, give 'em a friendly wave anyway.

There is no such thing as too many lights, or too much safety chrome on a motorcycle.

Maintaining a safe pace & following distance is hard in traffic, but do it anyway. If drivers are tailgating or cutting you off, you need to pick up your pace a little, or take a break, or find a different road.

The only good view of a lightning/thunder storm is in your rear-view mirror. Last year, while running cross-country, I had a close encounter with two different funnel clouds, in Arkansas & Texas; fortunately abaft the beam & moving in the opposite direction.

The storage spaces on a GoldWing can never hold everything you want for a 6 week cross country adventure, but they <u>can</u> hold everything you need. I'll test this axiom further when I attempt an Iron Butt challenge to go from Key West, Florida to Deadhorse, Alaska (Prudhoe Bay) next year.

Getting hit suddenly by a 60 knot crosswind can suddenly change your lane of travel, and double your vocabulary

If you want to get somewhere before sundown, you can't stop at every Dairy Queen along the way.

If you can't get it going with bungee cords, electricians tape, or WD-40, it's probably serious.

It is important what's going on in the vehicle directly ahead of you, but don't let that give you tunnel vision. It's <u>really</u> important what's going on in the next 5 vehicles ahead of you.

Sometimes the fastest way to get there is to stop for the night. And it's corollary: Riding at sunrise can be the best part of the day.

Well trained reflexes are better than luck. Ask me to tell you about my near-death experience on I-95 between Jacksonville & Dayton Florida. If it doesn't prove to you the benefits of taking a refresher Rider Course every couple of years, I don't know what will.

Riding faster than everyone else, only guarantees you'll ride alone.

Remember to pay as much attention to your partner as you do to your fuel gauge.

Never argue with an 18-wheeler.

The Rules of Winter Cycling

Rule #1 - BE SEEN! People often don't expect to see cyclists in foul weather. Use front white and rear red lights and reflective tape and/or clothing to make sure you can be seen from the front, side and back. A disproportionate number of bicycle/car crashes happen in the dark!! Just because we can see motorists, doesn't mean they see or expect us. And during the season of long nights, cyclists are often invisible in the canyon of shadows created by street lights and car headlights. Not convinced? Check out CDOT's clever "can you see the cyclist" video.

Rule # 2 - Know the Hazards: The streets are slickest when it first begins to rain or snow. Manhole covers, leaves and metal bridges are particularly dangerous when wet. Plowed snow reduces operating room on the roads. Fresh snow makes traction difficult. Black ice is sneaky; all ice can be upending. And then there are regular ole hazards--potholes, cracks and RR crossings. Your awareness of these hazards, especially on your common routes, will help you anticipate and handle them (see below).

Rule #3 - Know the Tricks: When it is wet or icy, pump the brakes, ride more slowly, keep your weight on the back wheel, and don't lean into turns as much. When it snows, follow the ruts created by cars, avoiding ridges which can deflect the front wheel and cause a spill. Again, keeping your weight to the back helps with stability. Breathe deeply, stay the course and keep pedaling--your bike wants to stay upright, and momentum will help it. If you do start to fall, try to lean away from traffic and resist putting out your hand to brake the fall; it's often better to take the impact flat along your forearms. There's also no shame in walking with your bike through rough patches.

Rule # 4 - Know your Options: Many of us are creatures of habit, taking the same route to a given destination. During messy weather, consider alternates. After a snowstorm, an unplowed side street where cars are poking along at 15 mph might be better than an icy artery where cars are sliding across the road at 40 mph or more and the bike lane is buried under plowed snow. Then again, during a storm, large arterials are sometimes best because cars are slow and the heavy traffic melts the snow. Bottom line—know your options.

Rule #5 - Be predictable: It's like a dance. Anticipate what other road users (that includes pedestrians and other cyclists) are going to do, and help them anticipate your movements. Signal when you are going to change positions or turn. Learn to look behind without veering off course. Try not to stop abruptly; there might be a cyclist right behind you.

Rule #6 - Be assertive: Don't hesitate to take a lane. It's our legal right! If someone is honking behind, that's a good sign. At least they see you. If they are that impatient, they might be the type that would try to squeeze past you if you were a little closer to the right. Also, stay to the left of right turning traffic at intersections. Oncoming traffic will see you better, and right turning traffic won't plow into you.

Thoughts on the Mechanical World

Tires age. As tires get older, they get more stiff and less resilient, more susceptible to cracking, and overall more brittle. Even if tires are not worn out, they should be replaced after six or seven years. "But I never have tires last six or seven years!" you may say. That may be – but what if the tires were three years old when you bought them "new"? Or when you bought that "new to you" motorcycle – how old were the tires on it? How can you tell?

It's a well-kept secret in the tire industry that a) tires are unsafe after six or seven years, and that b) tires that are sold new are not necessarily new – they may have sat on the shelf for years before being sold to you. They look new, they were sold "as new" – but they are not new.

Fortunately, there is a very simple way to find out the actual age of the tire, starting from its manufacture. Stamped into the side of every tire is a date code, that indicates the actual date of manufacture. The first two numbers in the code is the week of manufacture – 52 weeks in a year, remember. The last two are the year This can be approximated to the following – this is for the year 2010, and it will change slightly from year to year, but for the most part, this is how to convert the week number to the month: From: "Goldwing Docs" by by <u>WingAdmin</u> » Wed May 05, 2010

March Dates in US History

March 5, 1770 - The <u>Boston Massacre</u> occurred as a group of rowdy Americans harassed British soldiers who then opened fire, killing five and injuring six. The first man killed was Crispus Attucks, an African American. British Captain Thomas Preston and eight of his men were arrested and charged with murder. Their trial took place in October, with colonial lawyer John Adams defending the British. Captain Preston and six of his men were acquitted. Two others were found guilty of manslaughter, branded, then released.

March 6, 1836 - Fort Alamo fell to Mexican troops led by General Santa Anna.

March 18, 1974 - - <u>Grover Cleveland</u> (1837-1908) the 22nd and 24th U.S. president was born in Caldwell, New Jersey. He was the only president to serve two nonconsecutive terms and was also the only president to be married in the White House.

March 25, 1911 – The Triangle Shirtwaist Fire. A raging fire erupted inside a garment factory in New York City killing 123 young women employed as low-paid seamstresses, along with 23 men. The fast-spreading flames engulfed the 8th and 9th floors of the Triangle Shirtwaist Company in lower Manhattan in just a few minutes. About 50 of the victims had jumped to their deaths rather than <u>perish</u> from the flames. The sensational tragedy spurred national interest concerning the rights of mostly-immigrant women workers of the New York garment industry who labored long hours six or seven days a week in cramped, dangerous conditions for about \$5 weekly pay.
