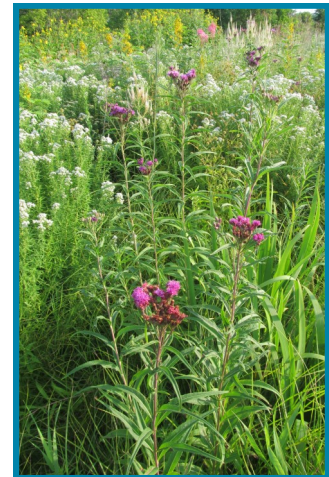

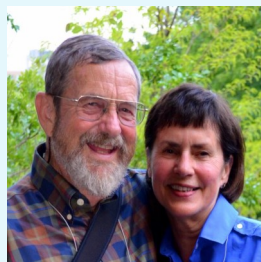

Dan has been an invited speaker at several cacti and succulents conferences in the US, England and New Zealand and given over 80 workshops and talks on cacti and succulents. He is a frequent guest on the Larry Meiller Show on Wisconsin Public Radio. Dan has traveled extensively visiting cactus and succulent plants in their native habitats in over 15 countries.
