



Jordan Lake Rowing Club, Inc Safe Sport Policy

INTRODUCTION

In conjunction and with the help of USRowing, Jordan Lake Rowing Club (hereinafter referred to as “JLRC”) has adopted the following SafeSport policies. The policies contained in this handbook are internal and meant as a guide for activities sponsored by JLRC, particularly since our programs involve youth participants.

This handbook will identify and address six primary types of misconduct, including bullying, harassment, hazing, emotional misconduct, physical misconduct, and sexual misconduct. All forms of misconduct are intolerable and in direct conflict with the USRowing ideals and those of JLRC. JLRC is committed to ensuring the safety of its members, coaches, and volunteers.

SECTION 1: TRAINING AND EDUCATION

JLRC’s policies and procedures require coaches and/or volunteers to report abuse, misconduct and violations of its athlete safety program. To do so, coaches and volunteers should have a basic understanding of sexual abusers, as well as “grooming,” the most common strategy offenders use to seduce their victims. Using a combination of attention, affection and gifts, offenders select a child, win the child’s trust (and the trust of the child’s parent or guardian), manipulate the child into sexual activity, and keep the child from disclosing abuse.

Accordingly, coaches and volunteers involved in club-sponsored youth programs must complete an awareness training concerning misconduct in order to performing and remain performing services for JLRC. Misconduct in sport includes:



- Bullying
- Harassment
- Hazing
- Emotional misconduct
- Physical misconduct, and
- Sexual misconduct, including child sexual abuse

Coaches and volunteers involved in club-sponsored youth programs must successfully complete the online training module and corresponding tests at: <http://training.teamusa.org/store/details/1>

The course is free, but the site requires registration. When creating an account you can use your individual details to set up your account, it only take a minute, when asked for “Memberships” select “USA Rowing” from the drop down menu when prompted to select an organization and enter membership number 11283.

Those coaches and volunteers who are required to take awareness training will take athlete awareness training every two (2) years. As we are new members of US Rowing all current volunteers and volunteer coaches are required to complete the Safe Sport training by June 30th, 2016. All new parent volunteers and volunteer and/or paid coaching staff will be required to take the training no more than 30 day(s) before they have contact with athletes.

SECTION 3: ATHLETE PROTECTION POLICY

COMMITMENT TO SAFETY

In the event that any coach or volunteer observes inappropriate behaviors (i.e., policy violations), suspected physical or sexual abuse, or misconduct, it is the personal responsibility of each coach and volunteer to immediately report his or her observations to a member of the Jordan Lake Rowing Club Board of Directors.

Coaches and volunteers should not attempt to evaluate the credibility or validity of child physical or sexual abuse allegations as a condition for reporting to appropriate law enforcement authorities.

Instead, it is the responsibility of each coach and volunteer to immediately report suspicions or allegations of child physical or sexual abuse to a member of the Jordan Lake Rowing Club Board of Directors.

Coaches, volunteers, and members shall refrain from all forms of misconduct, which include:

- Bullying
- Harassment
- Hazing
- Emotional misconduct
- Physical misconduct
- Sexual misconduct, including child sexual abuse



PROHIBITED CONDUCT

Bullying

(1) An intentional, persistent and repeated pattern of committing or willfully tolerating physical and non-physical behaviors that are intended, or have the reasonable potential, to cause fear, humiliation or physical harm in an attempt to socially exclude, diminish or isolate the targeted athlete(s), as a condition of membership.

(2) Any act or conduct described as bullying under federal or state law

Exceptions: Bullying does not include group or team behaviors that (a) are meant to establish normative team behaviors, or (b) promote team cohesion. For example, bullying does not include verbal admonitions to encourage team members to train harder and to push through a difficult training regimen.

Harassment

(1) A repeated pattern of physical and/or non-physical behaviors that (a) are intended to cause fear, humiliation or annoyance, (b) offend or degrade, (c) create a hostile environment or (d) reflect discriminatory bias in an attempt to establish dominance, superiority or power over an individual athlete or group based on gender, race, ethnicity, culture, religion, sexual orientation, gender expression or mental or physical disability; or

(2) Any act or conduct described as harassment under federal or state law.



Hazing

(1) Coercing, requiring, forcing or willfully tolerating any humiliating, unwelcome or dangerous activity that serves as a condition for (a) joining a group or (b) being socially accepted by a group's members; or

(2) Any act or conduct described as hazing under federal or state law

Exception: Hazing does not include group or team activities that (a) are meant to establish normative team behaviors or (b) promote team cohesion.

Emotional Misconduct

(1) A pattern of deliberate, non-contact behavior that has the potential to cause emotional or psychological harm to an athlete. Non-contact behaviors include:

- verbal acts
- physical acts
- acts that deny attention or support

(2) Any act or conduct described as emotional abuse or misconduct under federal or state law (e.g. child abuse, child neglect).

Exception: Emotional misconduct does not include professionally-accepted coaching methods of skill enhancement, physical conditioning, team building, discipline or improving athletic performance.



Physical Misconduct

(1) Contact or non-contact conduct that results in, or reasonably threaten to, cause physical harm to an athlete or other sport participants; or

(2) Any act or conduct described as physical abuse or misconduct under federal or state law (e.g. child abuse, child neglect, assault).

Exceptions: Physical misconduct does not include professionally-accepted coaching methods of skill enhancement, physical conditioning, team building, appropriate discipline or improving athlete performance.

Sexual Misconduct

(1) Any touching or non-touching sexual interaction that is (a) nonconsensual or forced, (b) coerced or manipulated, or (c) perpetrated in an aggressive, harassing, exploitative or threatening manner;

(2) Any sexual interaction between an athlete and an individual with evaluative, direct or indirect authority. Such relationships involve an imbalance of power and are likely to impair judgement or be exploitative; or

(3) Any act or conduct described as sexual abuse or misconduct under federal or state law (e.g. sexual abuse, sexual exploitation, rape)

Note: An imbalance of power is always assumed between a coach and an athlete.



Child Sexual Abuse

(1) Any sexual activity with a child where consent is not or cannot be given. This includes sexual contact with a child that is accomplished by deception, manipulation, force or threat of force, regardless of the age of the participants, and all sexual interactions between an adult and a child, regardless of whether there is deception or the child understands the sexual nature of the activity.

(2) Any act or conduct described as child sexual abuse under federal or state law.

WILLFULLY TOLERATING MISCONDUCT

It is a violation of this Athlete Protection Policy if a coach and/or volunteer knows of misconduct, but takes no action to intervene on behalf of the athlete(s), participant(s), coach, and/or volunteer.

SECTION 4: REPORTING POLICY

Every Jordan Lake Rowing Club member, volunteer, and/or coach must report:

- (1) violations of the Athlete Safety Program
- (2) misconduct as defined in JLRC's Athlete Protection Policy
- (3) suspicions or allegations of child physical or sexual abuse

As a matter of policy, JLRC does not investigate suspicions or allegations of child physical or sexual abuse or attempt to evaluate the credibility or validity of such allegations as a condition for reporting to the appropriate law enforcement authorities.



TO WHOM TO REPORT

Club members, volunteers, and coaches may report to the JLRC Director and/or any member of the JLRC Board of Directors.

In addition, all allegations of child physical or sexual abuse must be reported to relevant law enforcement authorities.

HOW TO REPORT

A report will be taken in the way that is most comfortable for the person initiating a report including an anonymous, in-person, verbal, or written report. Regardless of the chosen method of reporting, it is helpful for individuals to provide, at a minimum, (1) the name of the complainant(s); (2) the type of misconduct alleged and the name(s) of the individual(s) alleged to have committed the misconduct.

REPORTING FORM

Individuals reporting child physical or sexual abuse or other misconduct may complete a US Rowing Safe Sport Incident Report Form. A copy of this form can be found [here](#).

CONFIDENTIALITY, ANONYMOUS REPORTING AND BAD-FAITH ALLEGATIONS

Confidentiality

To the extent permitted by law, and as appropriate, JLRC will keep confidential the complainant's name on request, not make public the names of potential victims, the accused perpetrator, or the people who made a report of child physical and sexual abuse to the authorities.



Anonymous Reporting

JLRC recognizes it can be difficult for an athlete, teammate, friend or family member to report an allegation of misconduct and strives to remove as many barriers to reporting as possible. Anonymous reports may be made without the formality of completing an Incident Report Form:

- by completing the Reporting Form without including their name
- by expressing concerns verbally to the JLRC Director
- through email, texts, or notes left for the JLRC Director

All suspicions of child physical or sexual abuse will be reported to the appropriate law enforcement authorities.

“Whistleblower” Protection

Regardless of outcome, JLRC will support the complainant(s) and his or her right to express concerns in good faith. JLRC will not encourage, allow, or tolerate attempts from any individual to retaliate, punish, allow or in any way harm any individual(s) who reports a concern in good faith. Such actions against a complainant will be considered a violation of our Safe Sport Athlete Safety Program and grounds for disciplinary action.

Bad-Faith Allegations

A report of abuse, misconduct, or policy violations that is malicious, frivolous, or made in bad faith is prohibited. Such reports will be considered a violation of our Safe Sport Athlete Safety Program and grounds for disciplinary action. Depending on the nature of the allegation, a person making a malicious, frivolous, or bad-faith report may also be subject to civil or criminal proceedings.



SECTION 5: INVESTIGATION AND ENFORCEMENT

JLRC utilizes this Investigation and Enforcement procedure to resolve those allegations that are governed by the Ted Stevens Olympic and Amateur Sports Act (“Ted Stevens Act”). A hearing under the Ted Stevens Act will not necessarily affect JLRC’s ability to immediately suspend or terminate an accused individual. As appropriate, and at its discretion, JLRC may institute a formal investigation and hearing procedure to address serious allegations of misconduct (e.g., physical and sexual misconduct). However, JLRC anticipates that an investigation and hearing will be undertaken to address only the most serious allegations and patterns of behavior that warrant significant sanctions.

The JLRC Director and/or Board of Directors has the discretion to impose sanctions on the individual if it finds, based on a preponderance of evidence, that emotional, physical, or sexual misconduct has occurred and may impose sanctions on the individual based on its findings.

Sanctions may range from a warning and reprimand to suspension from involvement with JLRC for a period of time. Suspensions from involvement with JLRC may be temporary or permanent. The most severe sanction possible to impose is permanent suspension from involvement and expulsion from JLRC.

SECTION 6: APPEAL

If the individual disagrees with the finding or sanction of the JLRC Director and/or Board of Directors, he or she may file an appeal with an independent arbitrator within 30 days of the finding. On appeal, the arbitrator will address the merits of JLRC’s decision de novo, and not the process that was utilized. A decision rendered by the arbitrator shall be final and binding on all parties.

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
