There are several things to take into account before bringing home a reptile. Many reptiles are very long lived - with some species living 50+ years. It's important to carefully consider a reptile's life expectancy before adopting any reptile. Each species also has very specific husbandry requirements, including heat, lighting, humidity levels, diet, supplements, and appropriately sized enclosure. Certain species will need to have UVB lights replaced every 6-12 months. Reptiles also require a vet who is knowledgeable about their specific anatomy and physiology. Not all vets are able or equipped to care for reptiles. You will need to know who your reptile vet will be before bringing home your new pet. If you are not aware of a reptile vet in your area, please ask us - we will be able to refer you to one. Reptiles also require daily care - fresh water, fresh food, spot cleaning of their enclosure, and temperature checks all need to be done every day. Caring for a reptile can be labor intensive. It's important to consider all aspects of caring for a reptile - husbandry needs, start up costs, continued expenses - before taking on the responsibility of owning a reptile. We are available to answer any questions you may have, now and after you bring your new reptile home.
