From the Beacon Team:

We are having a bit of a dilemma this month. As you may or may not know, the Beacon has always been self-sustaining with the revenue we produced from our advertisers. Our electronic and website versions have been full color and enjoyed for quite some time now.

Last month we put out our first all-color printed Beacon and it was received with overwhelming positivity. We got phone calls, emails and comments from both our residents and our advertisers. "So much more enjoyable to read now." "Read it from cover to cover." "Pictures look so much better in color." "We actually saw a jump in business with the color issue," were just a few of the compliments we got. People even remarked on the "feel" of the better quality paper. We were so gratified with the responses. So what's our dilemma?

Minuteman, our regular printing contractor, had given us a quote on what our job was going to cost us and it was only about \$150. more than we had been paying for the blue cover and black and white interior. It made sense to try the full-color and new paper. We knew we could easily cover this increase and the community's response to it was well worth the expense.

Unfortunately, Minuteman had grossly underquoted the job. They did honor the price for the February issue but said they would have to bill future issues at their regular all-color price, less a 20% discount because we are a long-time, good customer. We immediately sent the job out for bids from other local and online printers and did our due diligence. What we learned was that even though the Minuteman price was prohibitive to us, it was the least expensive and most convenient vendor to use. It made the price of an individual copy \$2.37 as opposed to \$1.09 with no color and \$1.40 for February's all-color issue. We decided to do this issue in color and turn to you, for additional ideas on how we can maintain the high quality and still remain self-sustaining.

Meet Your Neighbor—Katy Mitrani

If I had to choose a person to be with in an emergency, it would surely be Katy. She's calm, caring and resourceful. Twice she encountered catastrophes while working in New York. The first time was in 2001, on 9/11, when airplanes crashed into the World Trade Center. The second time was in 2012 when Hurricane Sandy struck.

On 9/11/2001 Katy was at work as an assistant store manager at a Pathmark Supermarket in lower Manhattan. As with most of us. she suddenly became aware of the horror that was taking place not far from her store. Katy was the only store manager on duty that day. People had to run to get away from the Twin Towers. Many survivors walked into her Pathmark store which was located under the Manhattan Bridge on the east side. They were frightened and covered with ash, many without shoes. All public and transportation were cancelled that morning. At the same time, uniformed policemen and women descended enmasse in the parking lot and the store. Katy organized the employees to make sure the survivors had clean, well-stocked bathrooms where they could clean up. She found sneakers for those in need.

Katy had the deli department make hundreds of sandwiches and provide beverages for the First Responders until they ran out of supplies. From their drug store, she also provided emergency supplies such as bandages and flashlights. Katy didn't get home that day. She worked all night supervising the restocking of bare shelves. From the loading dock all she could see was smoke where the towers once stood. All along FDR Drive cars were being towed covered in soot and ash. As far as the eye could see there were emergency vehicles lined up ready to be being used.

During the day Katy made time to talk with her husband, Jack. On one of her calls to see how their four kids were, she couldn't speak. All she could do was cry and cry and cry to relieve



the stress. After working all night she was able to drive home to Queens in the morning. She slept in the next day and could still smell the stench of the collapsed buildings. On the following day a police escort brought her back to the store.

A few years later, Katy went to work for Stop & Shop in a management position in their Human Resources Department. Her responsibilities included union and management issues, performance evaluations, training, hiring and discipline throughout four boroughs and nearby Long Island.

She soon had to handle another catastrophe, Hurricane Sandy which hit parts of Brooklyn, Queens and Long Island. Katie had to drive through many devastated neighborhoods to help employees who were affected when their homes were destroyed. Katy worked with "Helping Hands" an organization funded by Stop & Shop employees which distributed money with matching funds from the Stop & Shop corporation. Katy explained, "Helping Hands was for any employee that needed emergency funds to help them through a catastrophe." In this instance Katy represented both the employer, Stop & Shop, and the employees through Helping Hands, which was quite a challenge. It was her job to evaluate the employees' applications for help with money for food, clothing, shelter, etc. Her dedication and caring helped her to make the right decisions.

How did Katy get the strength and fortitude to deal with catastrophes as she did? It must have been her innate ability and a loving family. She told me, "I always had a little bit of an air of authority about me." Early on at Pathmark she was promoted to a fullleadership position which eventually led her to supervise cashiers, bookkeepers and more than one hundred associates. She and Jack met at a Pathmark summer bowling league. After leaving Pathmark, both took jobs at Stop & Shop where they climbed up the management ladder together before they retired in 2017.

They were no strangers to Rainberry Bay. Jack's parents had lived here for many years and loved it. Both Katy and Jack come from large families and they even have a cousin living down the block in Rainberry Bay. Now Katy is an active member of our community. She dances with Helen Sohne's NIA class, tap dances with Shirley Gelfand, reads scripts with the drama club, plays bocce, bowls weekly, goes to book club meetings and current events and takes canasta lessons. As our paths crossed during these events I was impressed by Katy's calm and friendly manner and her willingness to take risks and responsibilities.

In an amusing example, at a recent drama club meeting, she took on Meg Ryan's role in the movie, When Harry Met Sally, in which she faked an orgasm as Sally in the hilarious delicatessen scene. She was funny and a good sport. Katy especially loves the bocce club which travels locally to compete with other clubs. She loves how warm and friendly the members of the club are. Katy said they are like family.

Despite all her happiness with her family and friends, it's still traumatic for Katy to talk or write about 9/11. It brings back memories for all of us.

Jews and Jazz

The Yiddish club meeting on March 8 will be a talk and musical presentation on Jews and Jazz by prominent musician and educator Dick Lowenthal.

It will explore Jewish musicians' involvement in the world of American Jazz, including the connection between Jews and African-Americans in the performance, production, and promotion of Jazz music.

Selected musicians will include: Benny Goodman, Artie Shaw, Red Rodney, Shorty Rogers, Herb Alpert, Randy and Michael Brecker, and Stan Getz.

Lowenthal is the former Chairman of the Jazz Dept. at the Manhattan School of Music, and a well-known music producer. Currently a resident of Lake Worth, he also serves on the board at the Arts Garage.

The first jazz recording was made in **1917**, but the musical form had existed for years before. Jazz is a blend of classical, spiritual, ragtime, march, blues, and popular music forms. Jazz originated in New Orleans and was likely performed first by marching bands. Its roots can be found in the musical traditions of both Africa and Europe. In fact, some people say that jazz is a union of African and European music.

Different Types of Jazz Music

- Ragtime. Ragtime was established in the 1890s.
- Chicago Style. Chicago style jazz music became popular in the 1920s.
- New Orleans Style. New Orleans style jazz music evolved out of ragtime and became popular in the 1920's. It is also known as "hot jazz."
- Bebop. Bebop music became popular in the 1940s.





Frequently Asked Questions

Q: What was the result of the Capital Contribution Vote?

A: The Amendment passed and had been sent to the attorney for filing with Palm Beach County. It will be noted for ongoing sales.

Q: I hear there will be a task enforcement for some rules regarding our properties. What is the reality?

A: The board appointed an Enforcement Task Force. It is made up of volunteers from Landscaping and Management committees, and is about to begin reviewing properties that may have plantings that are not in compliance with our Rules and Regulations. The team is beginning their training to identify violations that need to be addressed by the homeowner. The focus will be on plantings that are too close to roofs, sidewalks, driveways, fences and mailbox posts as well as dead or seriously neglected plantings. You may receive a letter regarding your responsibility for any remedies that are necessary.

Q: How can I volunteer in Rainberry Bay? What opportunities are there?

A: Each month the Beacon lists all committees on page 4. When each new board is confirmed in March they begin looking for volunteers. Most committees have a one year term. The board chooses the chairperson and the chairperson chooses the committee members. Architectural Control Board has a two year term and each of the three member team are appointed by the board. Consider which committee best suits your interests and qualifications. Clubs also want and need your help! Reach out to any board member to get more information on the committees and clubs to get more information. Rainberry Bay counts on our volunteers.

Q: Are the 2016 Rules and Regulations still in effect?

A: They are in effect and will remain in effect until the 2019 Rules and Regulations are approved by the board of directors and made available to all. They are currently being updated.
