MAFCE President's News

Well summer is finally here. I hope you enjoyed your District Meeting. In the past articles we learned about injuries or diseases of the brain now we will be learning about infections of the brain. The first infection is Meningitis or the inflammation of the membranes surrounding your brain and spinal cord. Most cases in the U.S. are caused by a viral infection, but bacterial and fungal infections are other causes. Some cases of meningitis improve without treatment in a few weeks. Others can be life-threatening and require emergent antibiotic treatment. Seek immediate medical care if you suspect that someone has meningitis. Early treatment of bacterial meningitis can prevent serious complications. The symptoms mimic the

flu and may develop over several hours or over a few days. Symptoms are: sudden high fever, stiff neck, severe headache, and headache with nausea or vomiting, confusion or difficulty concentrating, seizure, sleepiness or difficulty waking, sensitivity to light, no appetite or thirst and a skin rash. Seek immediate medical care as bacterial meningitis is serious and can be fatal. Delayed treatment increases the risk of permanent brain damage or death. It's also important to talk to your doctor if someone you come in contact with has been diagnosed with meningitis. You may need to take medications to prevent getting the infection. Bacterial meningitis may be caused by an ear or sinus infection, a skull fracture, or rarely after some surgeries. Several strain of bacteria can cause bacterial meningitis: Streptococcus pneumoniae; this causes ear or sinus infections. Neisseria meningitides; this bacteria commonly causes an upper respiratory infection, then enters the blood stream and goes to the brain. This bacteria is highly contagious. Listeria monocytogenes; this bacteria is found in unpasteurized cheese, hot dogs and luncheon meats. Some forms of bacterial meningitis are preventable by vaccines.

Viral meningitis is usually mild and often clears on its own. Viruses such as herpes simplex virus, HIV, mumps and West Nile can cause viral meningitis. Meningitis can be spread through coughing, sneezing, kissing, or sharing eating utensils. The steps to prevent it are: Wash your hands, don't share anything that touches your lips (lip balm), eat a healthy diet and cover your mouth when coughing or sneezing.

Encephalitis is the inflammation of the brain also. The most common cause is a virus. It often causes only mild flu-like symptoms. It is rarely life threatening. Symptoms are: Headache, fever, aches in muscles or joints, fatigue, seizures, loss of sensation in the face or body, problems with speech or hearing and confusion. Seek medical care if you are experiencing any of these. Common virus that can cause encephalitis are: Herpes simplex virus (HSV) Type 1 – associated with cold sores and fever blisters around your mouth and type 2-associated with genital herpes, Epstein Barr Virus which commonly causes

mononucleosis and the varicella-zoster virus (which is chickenpox and shingles), West Nile (from mosquitos), tick borne viruses, rabies virus, and child hood viruses such as measles, mumps and German measles. To prevent this disease practice good hygiene, don't share utensils, get vaccinations, protect yourself from mosquitoes and ticks and stay away from dying birds or animals.

As you can see both of these infections of the brain act similar so seek medical treatment when you are not feeling well. You are worth the money!

If your county has had any member who has passed away I would need that information before the convention. Send me a photo or the name of the funeral home they used.

Just a reminder that the applications for state board are due by July 1st and they can be found on our web site or from your District Director. We are in need of a Secretary. If you are going to have a 50 year anniversary of your membership in MAFCE please let me know by July 1st so I can get the certificate from NAFCE. Please try to sell your raffle tickets and if you do not sell tickets then have another type of fundraiser instead.

EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS AND GUIDELINES I hope everyone takes the time to enter one or more displays for convention. How else can we learn what other groups are doing? The displays might encourage other counties to try your project! You may enter all categories. The Hearthfire challenge is structured a bit different than the Educational Displays. Below are the guidelines for entering. Be sure to read carefully. Also included is the registration form to enter 1 or all 5 displays. Be sure to write on the back of the form or on a separate piece of paper the title of each of the displays you enter. A display may be entered by an individual, club or county.

GUIDELINES FOR EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS

1) Choose a project from your county or club and assign it one of the following categories:

- A) EDUCATION
- B) LEADERSHIP
- C) ACTION

* you may enter in EACH category <u>once</u>

2) Design your display board on your chosen topic. It should including somewhere on the board the following criteria:

- A) TITLE OF PROJECT (EXAMPLE: CHARACTER COUNTS)
- B) TYPE OF PROJECT (FROM ABOVE THREE CHOICES)
- C) PHOTOGRAPHS
- D) ANY MEDIA COVERAGE ARTICLES OR PICTURES
- E) GOAL, DESCRIPTION, ACTIONS TAKEN
- F) NAME <u>ON THE BACK OF THE BOARD</u> OF PERSON IN CHARGE AND CLUB OR COUNTY SUBMITTING DISPLAY

* Display board may be single or bi-fold/tri-fold fashion EXCEPT FOR HEARTHFIRE CHALLENGE...MUST BE ON A SINGLE BOARD!

3) Handouts/pamphlets not a requirement but may enhance your display and would be allotted 5 Points toward total score (certainly not enough to assure a win in your category BUT MAY HELP)

4) A one page typed summary (you may use front and/or back) to include the following information:

- B) CATEGORY OF PROJECT
- C) CLUB AND/OR COUNTY SUBMITTING DISPLAY NAME OF CONTACT PERSON IN CASE THERE ARE QUESTIONS BY JUDGES


