## Statement of the poverty-related problem or challenge to be addressed by the VISTA Summer Associate Program:

The Cedar Rapids community is experiencing tragedy as never before. The Cedar River, with a flood stage of 12 feet, crested at 31.1 feet on 6/13/08. This was 11.1 feet over the previous record of 20 feet set in 1929. After the city evaluated the damage it was found that the flood affected 5,390 homes, 1,049 businesses, 18 industries, and 85 non-profit and faith based organizations. The floods in lowa caused more than \$8 billion in damage, with Cedar Rapids the hardest-hit area with a total of 10 square miles and 1,300 city blocks under water in Cedar Rapids. Sadly much of neighborhoods experiencing flooding were neighborhoods already designated as target areas due to high crime levels and lower socioeconomic class. This tragedy continues to greatly compound issues already being faced by these individuals.

## Description of summer project activities including expected outputs and outcomes from this initiative.

It is important to note that given the fact that Cedar Rapids has never encountered a disaster of this magnitude that it is impossible to anticipate all of the needs that will continue to arise during the rebuild process.

**Activities**- Summer Associates will be brought in to provide support to the collaborative flood recovery effort in Linn County. They will assist with volunteer recruitment and mobilization, providing necessary leadership to community-wide efforts.

**Output-** Specific needs of the community will continue to be identified and strategies will be developed to meet these needs.

Volunteer recruitment is two-fold: 1) provides necessary support for individuals seeking to rebuild their homes that would otherwise be unable and 2) spreads public awareness on the continued devastation experienced by many in the Cedar Rapids community.

**Intermediate Outcome**- Providing necessary support to the Volunteer Reception Center (VRC) will increase the scope and reach of efforts in the Cedar Rapids community.

#### **End Outcomes-**

- 1. With 59,037 volunteer hours coordinated through the assistance of the VISTA Flood Recovery program 7/2-10/31, the summer program would seek to mobilize an additional 35,000 volunteer hours May 4 through August 31, 2009.
- **2.** It is anticipated that a minimum 50 properties will be directly impacted by teams mobilized through the efforts of the VRC.
- In addition a minimum of three different mediums will be utilized to educate and inform the public.

# Description of how community partners will contribute to the project's success:

Throughout this tragedy the entire Cedar Rapids community has come together in ways that can only be described as remarkable. The Volunteer Reception Center (VRC) is a partnership with United Way of East Central Iowa. Now re-located inside the new Community Recovery Center (CRC) the program is part of the larger collaboration of agencies and entities including: Rebuild Iowa, Case Advocates, Matthew 25 Tool Lending Library, etc. The Linn Area Long Term Coalition is spearheading the formalization of the rebuild process for affected individuals in need of assistance.

Limited travel is necessary as the Weed and Seed target area consists of a 4.2 square mile section of Central Cedar Rapids. Following the June flood CCIA was able to acquire several buses that can be used for transport. A grant was also written for the purchase of a truck to be used for VISTA Flood Recovery field work. Financial assistance with the purchase of gas cards is available through grants written to the Greater Cedar Rapids Community Foundation and Rockwell Collins. CCIA continues to look for additional ways to meet the transportation needs of the recovery effort.

## Description of end-of-summer assessment/recognition event to be conducted:

Each Summer Associate will receive a certificate in recognition of their service during our community's time of need. A recognition event will be planned to recognize the contributions of the summer associates and additional year long members that will complete service in August. Members will be consulted on type of celebrations to be held.

## Description of project sustainability upon conclusion of summer program:

During their 8-10 weeks of service, summer associates will provide necessary support to the Cedar Rapids community recovery and rebuild process. While their primary role will be volunteer mobilization, effective mobilization will ensure community volunteers develop necessary skills to mobilize additional teams of community volunteers in their absence.

### **Summer Associate Assignment Descriptions**

Summer Associates will provide essential support to the Cedar Rapids Community during flood recovery/rebuild efforts. It is difficult to determine the exact roles of 75 individuals without knowledge of the skill base or interest of the applicant pool. The recruitment of year long members will also affect the placement of individuals in the 8-10 week roles. At the current time it is anticipated that the member break down would be:

- (30-35) Volunteer Reception Center Field Leads—mobilizing groups of volunteers, teaching them the necessary rebuild skills to mobilize future teams of volunteers.
- (8) Volunteer Reception Center Field Support—mobilize to canvas neighborhood to determine needs of the community, contacting homeowners, develop partnership with construction coordinator to perform assessments.
- (8-20) Flood Recovery Liaisons—educating the public and other groups about the process and resources available, developing partnerships.
- (5) Homelessness: Collaborate with and provide support to Sleep-Out Committee, Sheltering Committee, and Continuum of Care Committee.

- (3) \*Code Enforcement—Work to understand the city's newly implemented code enforcement strategies and develop a medium to inform the public.
- (1) \*Health—Partner with the Health Department to gather accurate and comprehensive information on the health affects of those who worked in the flood zone last summer (continue to work in the flood zone). Information should also be gathered on low/no cost health care. Medium should be developed to share the information with the community.
- (1) \*Hunger—Work collectively with food banks and discount food programs in the community to identity greatest needs. Develop a strategy to address one or more of these needs. Assist with information individuals about Food Stamp eligibility.
- (3) \*Employment—Familiarize self with ES-Tips program. Work with the Workforce Development office and local shelters to schedule individuals to complete the program.
- (1) \*Reentry—Provide additional support to the on-going reentry initiatives. Work will likely include extensive research and data entry.
- (2) \*Communication—Accurate documentation of VISTA Flood Recovery projects is important to fund development and future recruitment. Members will work to write articles on the projects being completed.
- (3) \*Taylor—Members will assist with projects specific to the Taylor neighborhood, including the Tiger Cub Kids Club and Matthew 25 Tool Lending Library. Members will work to plan events that will rebuild the community cohesion that has suffered due to the closing of the Taylor School.

Goal: Due in part to greater-than-average snowfall during the winter of 2007 and greater-than-average rainfall levels during the spring of 2008, massive flooding of the Cedar River in Cedar Rapids, Iowa occurred during the second week of June 2008. The river crested at an unprecedented record level, causing city-wide devastation. Major residential, commercial, and industrial areas, especially those in the flood plain surrounding the river, experienced a significant loss of electrical power, restricted or non-existent sewer and water services, loss of homes, possessions, and business viability, health risks, and displacement hardships. The Central Cedar Rapids Weed and Seed target neighborhoods were especially hard hit, as they are located in downtown Cedar Rapids and other areas directly within or adjacent to the river's flood plain. As the city struggles to assess damages and rebuild, there will be an immense need for resource allocation and assistance. AmeriCorps*VISTA members will partner with various city, county, state and federal authorities and organizations to assist in the clean-up and rebuilding effort.
