SHARE A COLLECTIBLE, SHARE A QUILT



Quilt As You Go with Julie Yandura

In February, Julie Yandura, a local quilter, will be doing a presentation on Quilt As You Go techniques. She will show you how to break down those larger projects into manageable sections to do quilting on your home machine. She will have samples and tips to put your project into perspective. If you have a quilt in progress that you'd like help breaking down into manageable parts, bring a copy (8-1/2" x 11" would be a good size) of the quilt so she can show how to find the natural breaks or partitions in the quilt. Or bring the quilt top in that night.



Although most of us quilt as a hobby, some of us may dream of quilting as a career, but how? Could we really make a living, enough to live on, doing only quilting? Unfortunately, we probably all know friends who have tried and failed. On the web this month, I came across the Mason-Dixon Quilt Professionals Network and was interested in the way this group of quilters in the Mid-Atlantic Region have banded together to promote each other in making a living as quilters. Their website shows that the women in this group represent a wide range of “professionals” – longarmers, hand quilters, teachers, appraisers, “fiber artists”, and authors. Yet the group is small enough to meet monthly in members’ homes (where I’m not sure what they talk about, but probably quilts!). To help the members promote their businesses, the MDQPN website provides a member gallery where each member can display 1-3 quilts, and the website’s challenge gallery shows how the group uses annual projects much like ours to grow together as artists. The challenge gallery shows a large shot of each member’s contribution alongside a detailed close-up of one segment to show the quilter’s style and skill.
