This was a very worthwhile exercise, and will be discussed at our next Kirk Session.

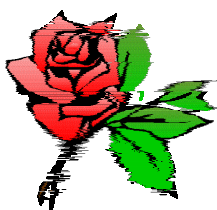

Tuesday 6th September - all sections to meet in hall in uniform.

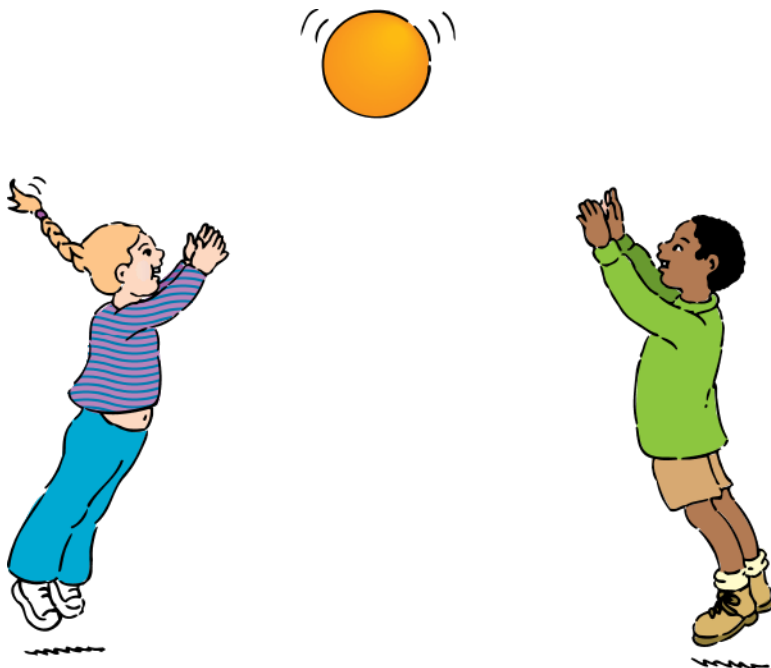
If there are any parents that are able to give Girls' Brigade some of their time please contact me, every little helps.

## The Olympic Games and the Bible

The first Olympic Games, held in Greece in 776 BC, were part of a religious festival to honour Zeus, the god of sky and leader of the Greek gods who lived on Mount Olympus.

At first there were only short straight races to keep Greek men fit for war. Other events were added later but there were no team sports and no women were allowed! The only prize was for the winner – a wreath of special leaves – no medals!



The ancient Games ended in 393 AD when Roman emperor Theodosius banned them - he outlawed worship of the ancient gods because of new beliefs in Christianity.



These Games were a huge part of the ancient world and are used in the Scriptures to illustrate Biblical principles in a way that readers of the time could understand and identify with.

In the New Testament the apostle Paul compares the races run in the Olympics, to life.

As athletes dedicate themselves to training in order to compete in a race, we should all dedicate ourselves to living lives which follow the example of Jesus.



## How do we train for this?

By reading and studying the Bible.

By attending Sunday School and Church.

By asking God, through prayer, to help us to be the best we can be by following the example of Jesus in the way we live our lives.
