

GOLF COURSE A BEAUTY.

Ambassador Links of Eighteen Holes to be Thrown Open Today.

The eighteen-hole golf course of the Ambassador Golf Club, Herbert Fowler's latest creation in Southern California, will be thrown open for inspection this afternoon. Incidentally a splendid array of matches, which will bring together some of the best players, both professional and amateur, in California, has been arranged by the management.

The piece de resistance, of course, will be the appearance of Dr. Paul Hunter, who paired with Jimmy Simpson of San Diego, will attempt to lick the amateur-pro team of Jack Neville and MacDonald Smith of San Francisco. The match will be the State champion's first since his return from England, where his magnificent play was a cause for jubilation by all Californians.

Other players who will perform are Miss Doreen Kavanagh, State champion for women; C. H. Palmer, Jr., the long-hitting amateur of the Los Angeles Country Club; Max Behr of New York, E. S. Armstrong, Everett Seaver, Frank Pebles, Mrs. Frank Griffith and Arthur Clarkson, the Ambassador professional.

Clarkson, Armstrong, MacDonald Smith, Jack Neville and Jimmy Simpson had a practice round over the course yesterday. While the massive greens are in gorgeous shape the fairways are not so well along, and it will be necessary to exploit winter lies for some time.

FULL LENGTH.

The course is of full championship length, par being 36 out and 36 in,

making a total of 72. It is not of the usual hotel type of golf course, the severity of trapping and the consequent necessity of keeping your shots down the alley making it one of championship caliber. The course is one of the hardest tests of the game in the South.

Fowler has given his best efforts to the course, has taken every advantage of the uphill and down-dale roll of the ground and has laid out a links that appeals to the picturesque as well as the sportive side of the game.

The greens are things of beauty, particularly the twelfth, which is 188 yards from tee to green, but with a hard wind blowing is fully thirty yards longer. The twelfth is located in a valley, the tee on a hill. It is a par 3, with small likelihood of many being taken.

All turf tees, greens and fairways make the course thoroughly up to date. The matches this afternoon start promptly at 1:30, according to David Boice, manager of the course.
