Engineer's Body Found—The body of Gordon H. Dixon, 47-year-old aviation engineer, was found in his apartment at 349 E. Queen St., Inglewood, a pistol at his side. Police said Dixon left no note. He leaves his estranged wife, Natalie, and two children, Richard, 11, and Charlene, 8, all of 8919 Bleriot Ave.

Goods for Honolulu—Los Angeles' diversity of products will be displayed to Honolulu businessmen with a box of local goods sent to the island city aboard the Pan-American Airways' Constellation Clipper on its inaugural flight from here next Thursday. Sorrell Condition Told — Declaring that it is "a matter of life and death," Dr. Edward S. Ames told Burbank Police Judge Raymond L. Reid that he had ordered Herbert K. Sorrell to bed for 10 to 15 days because of the way Sorrell has been affected by high blood pressure and various ailments. He said he had directed that Sorrell not even use a telephone, so precarious is his condition. Sorrell, leader of the 1945 film strike, is on trial in connection with the strike riots at Warner Bros. studio. Judge Reid postponed further hearings until next Monday.
