SAYS PHYSICIANS' CERTIFICATE EASY TO GET

ANOTHER WITNESS MISSING

Woodbridge Divorce Case Continued. Patient Ill, Says Attorney, and the Court Answers Him Facetiously

The absence of an aged witness, who through her ailments was unable to journey from San Jose to Los Angeles, caused a postponement of the Woodbridge divorce case which came up for hearing before Judge Trask yesterday. The parties to the action are members of well known families of Southern California and the defendant in the suit, S. M. Woodbridge, has been the director of a large fertilizing concern for many years.

The attorney for the plaintiff asked a continuance in the proceedings yesterday, saying that his chief witness was ill and unable to come. "I can get a doctor's certificate to that effect," said the attorney.

"Yes, I suppose you can," responded Judge Trask. "It seems that anybody who wants a doctor's certificate can get one. I do not mean to say anything against the physicians because in their minds everyone has something the matter with them. It is their business to think people are sick. However, I will grant a continuance in the case."

In her suit for divorce, Mrs. Edith Woodbridge charges her husband with cruelty. She alleges her husband struck her whenever he took the notion into his head and that as a preliminary to his blows he often used bad language in referring to her.

LIVELY BIDDING OVER DEPARTMENT SUPPLIES

Council Will Grant Fire Chief Lips All the Apparatus That He Requires

The council opened bids yesterday morning for everything Chief Lips asks for in his department except lieutenants and battalion chiefs.

The chairman of the supply committee of the council made an effort to secure the reference of the bids to his committee but Councilmen Kern, Smith, Heller, Blanchard and Healy insisted upon the bids going to the fire commission, declaring the question involved a proper one for the fire commission to settle.

Bids had been invited for three third size 650 gallon per minute engines. The Molt Engine company offered to furnish the apparatus for \$13,500, while the R. S. Chapman company offered the three engines for \$13,200.

R. S. Chapman also bid on the six combination chemical engines and hose carts with 60 gallon tanks, offering to furnish the six for \$10,500. The Siegre company offered six of their machines for \$9900.

Bids were also opened for 20,000 feet of fire hose and the gallery of the council chamber was crowded with representatives of various bidding companies. The offers were Fabric Fire Hose company, Keystone brand, 90 cents per foot; New Jersey Car Spring and Rubber company, AL brand, 68 cents; Warren & Bailey, 62 1/2 cents; Chicago Fire Hose company, 78 cents; Cass & Smurr, 90 cents; Boston Rubber company, 89 cents; Revere Rubber company, 12 1/2 cents; Holabird Rubber company \$1; Harper & Reynolds, on Victor jacket, such as is now used by the department, 73 cents.

RELEASED PENDING TRIAL ON CHARGE OF ASSAULT

M. N. Woensner, who is alleged to have shot T. H. 

RAILROADS WILL BE BUSY FOURTH OF JULY

SERVICE TO ALL BEACHES TO BE INCREASED

Pacific Electric, Salt Lake, Southern Pacific and Los Angeles Pacific Roads Prepare to Handle Big Crowds on National Holiday

Officials of the Huntington electric lines and of the Salt Lake road are making preparations to take care of the largest Fourth of July crowds in their history. The day is the busiest of the twelve months, and is only approached by that of New Year's.

Every piece of rolling stock fitted for passenger accommodation will be put into service by the Pacific Electric company. At the big Sixth street station arrangements have been perfected by which cars can be dispatched at intervals of half a minute each, a shorter time than is required to fill the coaches.

Catalina island will be the mecca of thousands, and the road is putting forth every effort to have its San Pedro line open by that date in order to give another entry to the harbor city. The Salt Lake is preparing to put twenty-five trains into service, beginning at 6:05 o'clock in the morning and running them at half hour intervals after that time.

The Southern Pacific will increase the size of its trains, but otherwise will not be influenced by the national holiday beyond running special trains to Anaheim and Newport beaches and one to Riverside, which is to leave here at 11:30 o'clock on the morning of the Fourth.

AVOIDS ILL FEELING BY CLOSING TICKET INCIDENT

Salt Lake Route Officially Ends Affair Relating to Excursionists to Mormon City

So far as the Salt Lake is concerned, the incident of certain members of the chamber of commerce excursion scalping their tickets is said to be a closed one.

And if the Clark road is willing to let the question drop it is said the chamber of commerce officials will have a sigh of relief and do likewise. The truth is that there were several of the tickets of the most prominent members of the excursion party which rightfully or wrongfully, so far as the original holders are concerned, fell into the hands of scalpers.

An investigation could not fail to bring out much ill feeling and misunderstanding without perhaps attaining any satisfactory results, so it has been decided to let the incident die a natural death.

"I do not know the name of a single individual who sold his ticket or permitted it to get into a scalper's hands," said Ferd K. Rule, treasurer of the Salt Lake road, "and I hope I shall not be permitted to get such information." "Every man who went on the Salt Lake excursion I counted as a personal friend, and I have no disposition to instigate an investigation to find out whether or not that friendship was taken advantage of."

CITY OFFICIALS WILL ATTEND PORTLAND FAIR

Council Accepts Invitation of Managers of Big Exposition in the North

The council as one man accepted the invitation of the management of the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland to attend the big fair July 29, and celebrate Los Angeles day. The invitation was extended through Mayor McAleer and sent to the council with a message urging the city legislators to do all in their power to make the day a memorable success.

Already councilmen are planning to attend and have fallen in with the mayor's idea that Los Angeles should show the people of the northern state and visitors what Los Angeles and Southern California can do. From a caucus taken yesterday, at least seven of the city fathers will attend. Mayor McAleer will be present and will be accompanied by a committee of prominent men and politicians.

According to rumor, Oscar Lawler, the "Boy Orator of Los Angeles," will deliver the address in answer to the welcome of the governor of Oregon. The chamber of commerce has a committee already at work and this committee will be aided by the council acting as a committee of the whole.
