## Spring Brings New Life In Full Bloom

The Coalition for Compassion and Justice (CCJ) has just launched a brand new program via United Way of Yavapai County's Social Enterprise Program.

In concert with other organizations, the Coalition for Compassion and Justice (CCJ) has formed the Prescott Work Progress Agency (WPA) which will provide minimum wage part-time employment for people who are currently or likely to ask for money on the street. CCJ staff will identify individuals, provide them with proper employment and supervise their daily work. The work will include outdoor trash collection on public and private property. In conjunction with the Home Repair Program, WPA employees may clean up trash at private residences and the City will define public areas in need of cleaning. For example, a target area of cleaning will be creek sides throughout the city. During cold weather they will provide indoor opportunities. This program provides the structure and training for those working in the WPA to later gain stable and long-term employment. United Way of Yavapai County is supporting this creative program which provides solutions to homelessness and unemployment. Together, we can change lives!
