When, What, Why Lent

Lent is the 40 days, not counting Sundays, following Ash Wednesday leading up to Easter.

Lent is a time of fasting, repentance and reflection. Jesus was transported into the Wilderness immediately after His baptism by John the Baptist, to be tempted by Satan and to prepare for His ministry (*Matt 4:1-11 and Mark 1:12-13*). Our observance of Lent is to remember Jesus' 40 days and to remind us of our need

for the love and forgiveness shown to us in Christ. We should practice works of love, and read & reflect; reflect on God's Holy Word.

Notice that our Lent is not the actual sequence, but the tradition of the 40 days of fasting that was started in the 4th Century to prepare us for Easter, as Jesus prepared for His public ministry.

The Sanctuary during Lent

During Lent there are no flowers on the altar. It is plain—no brass—to represent the wilderness where Jesus went. The cross is rough wood, with the crown of thorns added on Good Friday. The candles on the alter, 6 of them covered with black shades, will be extinguished 1 each Sunday until only the Christ Candle (from the Advent wreath) remains. Maundy Thursday, in Holy Week, will be the Communion with the Apostles, that we all strive to be. The Christ Candle will be put out on Good Friday to represent Christ's physical end. The cross will be draped in black and the tomb will be closed.

Easter Sunday will be the return of the brass cross and altar pieces. The tomb will be open. The cross will be draped in white and gold. The lilies will be on the altar and rails. The lilies are not to be worshipped, but are a symbol of Christ's resurrection, His purity and innocence, untainted by the world. They are signs of the new season, new birth, such as when someone comes to Christ.
