SENSORY ROOMS

Thanks to your outstanding big-heartedness towards the Georgina Mortimer Appeal, the state-of-the-art Sensory Rooms at Jalazone and Nour Shams Refugee Camp Rehabilitation Centres opened in November, when Val Jourdan, Firas Sarhan and Rachel Hobleby, ABCD's new administrator, visited.

Fusing different therapeutic disciplines in the Sensory Rooms creates a holistic rehabilitative

environment. The rooms' lighting, sounds and projections can be controlled from an iPad allowing the therapists to adapt the space without interrupting their one-to-one sessions. The endless options create stimulating spaces to suit the needs of every child in an environment a world apart from the children's challenging living situations. Therapists continue to receive specialist sensory room training.



The picture above shows 7-year-old Yara who has cerebral palsy, receiving a speech language session with Hadia, a therapist at the Jalazone Centre. Hadia chose a blue light to encourage Yara to focus on her treatment and played



a nursery rhyme through speakers in the room that Yara knew. Hadia also incorporated guidance that Yara's physio had given her and was able to position Yara in a way that would strengthen her physical health. With few distractions, a calm space and in a comfortable position, Yara engaged and benefitted from the session.

The Sensory Garden at the Bethlehem Arab Society for Rehabilitation is currently under construction and we look forward to bringing you news of its progress in the autumn.

SHEEPFOLD

Mary Rewers, who runs the Sheepfold day care centre for children with disabilities in Beit Sahour, near Bethlehem, introduces us to her newest attendees:

"A 9-year-old new boy with autism (ASD) started recently. He's never had any regular education due to living far from any suitable facility, but the family has now been referred to us. His behaviour is quite challenging at times but helping children like this makes it all worthwhile."

"Many families have more than one child with disabilities, one of these has three disabled children. The youngest one, a 4-year-old boy with severe developmental delay and visual impairment who was initially very withdrawn and unresponsive, is making wonderful progress. He loves to play and has acquired a few words despite the very poor original prognosis he was originally given."

BASR Outreach Needs

In November Val Jourdan and Rachel Hopley spent a day with our long-term partners, the Bethlehem Arab Society's Community Outreach Team. We travelled into the more remote Greater Bethlehem and Hebron areas with Jamal, the community physiotherapist, and Aliya, the community social worker. Community Based Rehabilitation workers live and work in the outlying towns and villages. They are the eyes and ears of the community, identifying children in schools and families who

would benefit from the support of the BASR. Once identified, the multi-disciplinary BASR Outreach Team visit children and their families to assess what help can be given. This is where ABCD steps in through our Individual Needs Programme offering assistive devices such as wheelchairs and orthotics, home modifications, home rehabilitation sessions, provide hearing aids and spectacles and much more. The list is endless but the results are heartening, changing the lives of these

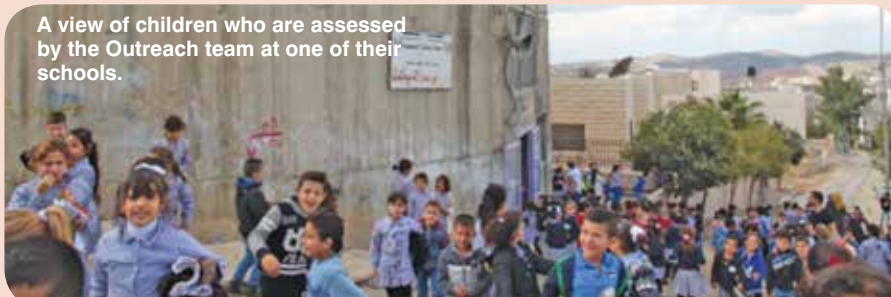

MUSIC THERAPY

"As part of ABCD's ongoing Music Therapy programme at the Bethlehem Arab Society for Rehabilitation (BASR), Sophie Williams, a fantastic music therapist, undertook a ten-week Music Therapy programme running clinical sessions in different settings. The main body of my work was in two schools closely linked to BASR where most of the children had developmental needs on the Autistic Spectrum. Sessions followed a similar pattern every week allowing them to develop a sense of belonging and self, and to explore expression and social interaction.

At BASR, I ran open groups for in-patients and their carers (generally mothers) on the pediatric ward. The mothers reported it gave their children time out to enjoy themselves, making them more co-operative even after a morning of therapy and clinics. The Speech and Language Therapy department referred four young boys for group music therapy. Using blown instruments such as kazoos encouraged the children to develop their vocal skills with others. On Fridays I ran a music hour for the educational group, also open

to children in the community. This environment gave children with psychological challenges the ability to interact with others in a safe and supportive space.

I also worked on an individual basis with an eight-year-old boy who had suffered a catastrophic brain injury - sound is his only connection with the outside world. Focusing on song, repetitions of his name and pertinent facts helped him be aware that the music was directed at him and was for him.

We are delighted to announce that ABCD is now supporting the salary of a Music Facilitator at BASR. The incredible progress which is achieved during the ten-week programmes, run by wonderful therapists such as Sophie, can continue throughout the year. This has created a more sustainable programme ensuring that more children are able to benefit from everything music has to offer. Our utmost gratitude to ABCD Trustee Claire Tillotson for her incredible organisation of the programme and ongoing support of the BASR Mental Health Team.

I led a music experiential music group for a group of up to 12 teenage boys who are ex-detainees of the Israeli Defence Force. They spoke about how they had found the sessions, which were based on ideas of 'being heard' and 'listening', useful as ways to express their feelings.

My thanks go to all the mental health team for their positive and welcoming attitude and to all the staff at the hospital, with special thanks to Souha Shehadeh and Sawsan Eweineh gave me invaluable professional support and advice. My clinical supervisor, Claire Tillotson gave so much more than clinical support and advice and, without whom, my work here would not have been so fruitful.

Finally, I would like to express my deep gratitude to ABCD for the opportunity to work in Palestine. There were, of course, physical and psychological challenges, but I hope that these will have allowed me to experience the deeper emotional and intellectual resources that lie within us all."

Camps Updates

As well as the significant addition of the sensory rooms, The Jalazone and Nour Shams Refugee Camp Rehabilitation Centres continue their exceptional work.

As part of a growing collaboration with Bethlehem University, the camps' therapists received a 5-day training course in April. Delivered by lecturers who specialise in occupational therapy, clinical psychology and physiotherapy, they covered topics such as teamwork in holistic rehabilitation, sensory and environmental needs of children with neurological conditions, working collaboratively with families and the use of adaptive equipment. This kind of training helps to enhance the critical thinking of the therapists, and to plan for the future.

Jalazone and Nour Shams Rehabilitation Centres are now being

used as centres for training students from Bethlehem University. Working alongside Bethlehem University is a valuable opportunity for therapists and children alike. Our thanks to organisers Firas Sarhan, ABCD Trustee and Project Manager and to Manar Jaber, lecturer at Bethlehem University.

The rehabilitation centres in both camps are also opening their doors to the wider community. The therapists provide the camps' schools direction on how to identify learning, speech and language difficulties and support those students referred to the centre. The schools now recognise the benefits for their pupils. Jalazone also hosts a kindergarten every Monday. This inclusion helps to erode entrenched taboos about people with disabilities which are still common in the West Bank.
