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# Farewell, Mrs. Donney

On April 4, 2016, Diane Donney passed away at the age of 55. Ms. Donney taught Exceptional Student Education (ESE) at West Boca High School for 11 years. She grew up in New City, New York and was a loving mother to her daughters Katherine and Elizabeth, and son Brian.

Those who knew her well describe Donney as a passionate, dedicated, and selfless woman. She was an advocate for children and constantly went out of her way for her students.

“She was the most positive, truly genuine person I’ve ever worked with in education,” explains Mr. Sommer. He stated that Donney always answered faculty emails with compliments, reassurance, or a positive quote. It was clear to Sommer and the rest of the community that “she sincerely cared about the kids at West Boca.”

Donney started the Pay It Forward club at West Boca and was the faculty sponsor. Tatum Kelson, a senior at West Boca and a board member of Pay It Forward, said that “she went out of her way to do things for people. She was very caring and thoughtful and always wanted people to be happy.”

According to the Glick Family Funeral Home, Donney was involved with her religion. She was a parishioner of St. John’s Evangelist Roman Catholic Church, where she was a Eucharistic Minister.

Mrs. Lombardi, a friend and co-worker of Donney’s, remembers her as a “kind soul.” She described Donney as very involved with the school, as she went to almost every sporting event. Donney tried to make learning fun for her students through fun contests, parties, and positivity.

The Funeral Mass was celebrated at 11:00AM on Saturday, April 9th at St. John Catholic Church, Boca Raton. Donney was laid to rest at Deland Memorial Gardens.

## Pathfinder Winners: Stephanie Cornwell and Julia Lopes

*On the evening of May 10, hundreds of students, parents, and educators from both Palm Beach and Martin Counties filled the tiers of the Raymond F. Kravis Center for the Performing Arts for the 33rd annual Pathfinder High School Scholarship Awards. The prestigious Pathfinder competition awards between \$2,000 and \$4,000 to four students in each of the eighteen categories ranging from academics to athletics. Two West Boca High School students were honored, for the first time, with \$4,000 and the coveted “astrolabe” trophy which symbolizes the path each student may follow in the world. Stephanie Cornwell received the award for Communications, while Julia Lopes received her award for Art.*

You probably know Stephanie Cornwell. She's pretty, she's popular, and she's the Captain of the Varsity Cheerleading Squad. She is also brilliant. On Wednesday night, Stephanie won the Pathfinder High School Scholarship Award for Communications.

This outgoing and well-liked student is the former Editor-in-Chief of the West Boca High School *Bullseye*, President of National English Honor Society, Historian of National Honor Society, and has written numerous published articles for places such as *The Boca Raton Tribune*. After taking journalism for four years, and writing for the school newspaper for three, Cornwell decided to apply to become the Communications nominee for West Boca. Her essay on why she should become the nominee, which detailed her chosen career path as a writer in the communications field, secured her spot as a potential pathfinder.

Cornwell put together a ten page portfolio including articles she had written for the *Bullseye* and local newspapers, and a letter to Marco Rubio about offshore oil-drilling, among other things. During her interview at Palm Beach Atlantic University, Cornwell diligently shared as much about herself and her work in the brief ten minutes with the judges. Leaving the interview, she felt that “This was the best interview I had ever had. I loved the judges; I felt really positive.”

At the event itself, Cornwell detailed that “It felt like the Oscars.” The awards are given out in reverse alphabetical order making Communications one of the last categories to be announced. So far, West Boca had not placed in anything. This came as a shock after a very successful year in 2015 with over six winners in various places. Cornwell thought “Maybe I would scrape by with a fourth because I had a really great interview,” after not hearing her name she had virtually stopped paying attention. When her picture was projected on screen, Stephanie couldn't believe it. Salutatorian, Preet Kumar, grabbed her hand and screamed “Steph, that's you!” She “could hear her parents screaming from the balcony” as she walked to the stage, stunned and in tears.

As she heads to the University of Florida in the fall, Newspaper Adviser Mrs. Rosenblum believes “Stephanie has the ability to make everyone feel wanted. She is a born leader with incredible potential in the field of journalism.”

**Julia Lopes** moved to the United States from Minas Gerais, Brazil when she was six years old. Even at this young age Julia had already developed a passion for art, however she had not tried to pursue it. Towards the end of middle school she applied to Dreyfoos School of the Arts and was declined. She enrolled in West Boca and checked off Art with Mrs. Feldman as her first choice elective on course selection sheets.

Even on the first day of school, her now teacher and mentor of four years, Mrs. Feldman, noted that “Julia Lopes is one of those students who comes into your class very quietly and sits down; but when she puts a pencil to a piece of paper, it’s magic.” It was that day in the period five classroom that Lopes made the decision to “let go of the fear” that had accumulated from years of self-doubt and insecurities. Four years later, Mrs. Feldman has seen Julia flourish from extremely talented to prodigious. Throughout high school, Lopes has traveled internationally and gone on missionary trips that have enriched her perspective and contributed to her impressive portfolio which contains countless paintings and drawings, eighteen commissioned pieces, and three murals.

Now a senior excelling in AP Art History and AP 2D Design, Mrs. Feldman pushed Lopes to apply for a Pathfinder award. It was no surprise that with her immaculate 4.15 weighted GPA and evident talent she won the nomination for the school.

The Pathfinder process was not an easy one for Julia. Although she has overcome significant obstacles, she considers herself “really a shy person” and “not a speaker.” On the first of many interview practices, Julia admitted “It went so bad, I started crying.” After months of practicing every week with Mr. Questo, Julia had a ten page portfolio featuring a glowing letter of recommendation from Mrs. Feldman, academic information, and some of her artwork, along with a newfound confidence and readiness for the interview. Her official interview went very well, the judges were artists themselves so the shared interest eased her nerves.

On the night of the award ceremony, Lopes was extremely nervous because “Everyone had so many accomplishments. Especially the [students from] from Dreyfoos School of the Arts, [where] I was declined.” As the fourth, third, and second place names were announced Julia did not expect her name to follow. Her picture was projected onto the massive screen as the judge read a biography of her accomplishments, mentioning the amazing story her art tells. Her fellow Pathfinder nominees from West Boca erupted into cheers and ushered a flustered Julia onto the stage to claim the astrolabe trophy engraved with her name.

Lopes was accepted into the Savannah School of Art and Design, Art Institute of Fort Lauderdale, Ringling School of Art and Design, and the Art Institute of Chicago where she has chosen to go to study to become an Art Therapist. All of these schools offered her scholarships of as much as \$18,000 for the first year. The Art Institute of Chicago is the second best art school in the nation, right behind Yale University in Connecticut. Between scholarships from the Art Institute itself, the Pathfinder Scholarship, the Bradley Marc-Ginsberg Scholarship, and various others, Lopes has 90% of her college already paid for.

Her biggest supporter, besides her proud parents, Mrs. Feldman, is very sad to see her go after having her as a student for four years. In an interview Mrs. Feldman shared that “For [Julia], being the Pathfinder is just another star in her sky. This is just the beginning for her. I will see her again.”
