It doesn't matter if you have not made soup or bread, come along anyway, and bring something else to eat or drink or a donation. Any leftovers will be distributed to the homeless. Friday 15th March will be CAFOD Lenten Fast Day.

<u>Note on Fasting and Abstinence during Lent:</u> Common guidelines, tend to favour those who are 18-60 years of age. Those on medication are exempt, but can fast if they could under the advice of their doctor. Children can be encouraged to have some form of abstinence, under the guidance of their

parents. Strenuous fasting is not encouraged. Usual guidelines are that on the day of the fast have one main meal and have less food during the other meal times. Abstaining from meat on Ash Wednesday, Fridays of Lent and Good Friday is advised. If one cannot abstain from meat, then it is advisable to abstain from some food that is regularly taken. Abstinence can also take the form of certain pleasures such as sweets, smoking, alcohol, and cutting the time spent on watching television and on the Internet. It is also traditional practice to save the money from fasting and abstinence and donate them to those in need. *Sundays of Lent are feast days so do not qualify as a day of fasting*.

The Centre for Catholic Formation our diocesan catechetical centre has some informative videos on their You Tube Channel including the three pillars of Lent which can be accessed on the internet via

The Southwark Diocesan Spirituality Commission will be producing an online series of reflections for Lent. The reflections, sent straight to the subscriber's email inbox, will focus on the forthcoming Sunday readings. Each day there will be a different reflection; Monday & Tuesday will focus on the first reading, Wednesday on the psalm, Thursday & Friday on the second reading and Saturday & Sunday on the gospel. The reflections will draw us deeper into the Lenten season and allow us to hear the readings anew, looking at where they resonate in our own lives and how they can draw us nearer to God.
