Purchase pays off for Ngāti Rārua

In 2015 Ngāti Rārua purchased the Island Vines Vineyard on Cemetery Road in Marlborough. The purchase was strategic as it aligned to both the Mauri Ora (Cultural Identity) and Mahi Ohaoa (Economic Growth) strategies for Ngāti Rārua.

During the commencement of this exciting new venture, the office has established dedicated and robust partnerships with JTC Viticulture and Indevin (New Zealand's second largest winery).

Island Vines was harvested on 19 April 2016. The harvest went extremely well, taking eight hours in total with two machines working simultaneously.

TRONR is delighted to report the vineyard achieved a very good yield this year of 306 tonnes of fruit or 20 tonnes per hectare, compared to the

forecast of 15 tonnes per hectare.

We wish to acknowledge Shane, E-J and Duncan from Indevin, and Jason Tripe from JTC Viticulture, who have been very supportive to the office leading up to and through our first Vintage.

We look forward to sharing the final result with you in the 2017 Annual Report, which will be reporting on the 2016-17 financial year.

The launch was attended by Amoroa (Molly) Luke on behalf of Ngāti Rārua.

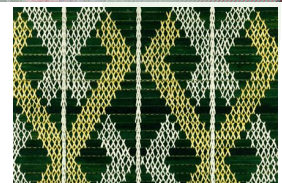
Whakaaro Kotahi – Of One Mind

There are many Iwi Māori who live in this area of Te Tau Ihu; they have a close filial relationship and enjoy and respect that relationship. This papa also re-iterates the kōrero of the Tipare (woven headband) - Raranga Tangata – knitting people together – that surrounds the Whare, and sits above the Tukutuku Papa.

On another level, the two colours

The pattern used as a background on the \$100 is called Whakaaro Kotahi from the Wharenuī Kaakati at Whakatū Marae in Nelson. Whakaaro Kotahi is a representation of the unity and consensus of the six Iwi of Whakatū Marae in the Nelson area. Ko te tauira e whakamahia nei hei kaupapa mō te moni pēke \$100 ko Whakaaro Kotahi, mai i te wharenuī o Kaakati i Whakatū Marae, i te Tauihu o Te Waka.

Ngāti Koata kuia, Puhanga Tupaea, the creator of the tukutuku panel, gives the following

(gold and green) represent a Treaty which was signed between Tangata Whenua and Pakeha / Tauīwi in 1840. That partnership is taking time to equalise, and has taken our motu though trials, tribulations and hardships. However aside from the squabbles of the past, there is reason to have faith in the process we currently now have in play to bring about reparation with the formation of the Waitangi Tribunal in 1975, overlooking Waitangi Hearings and negotiations. This gives us a sense of bi-culturalism, the bringing of two together as one.

He Tangata – Monique Bradley

Kia ora whānau,

I'm Monique Bradley, a proud member of Ngāti Rārua currently living in Auckland.

My great grandfather was Tinirau Piripi who passed before I was born. My grandparents, Harimate (Hully) Phillips and his wife Melva, brought up their family initially in Wairau Pa, then moved to what is now our family home in Spring Creek.

My mother Helena (Isobel) married my father Morris Bradley, a musician, store owner, painter and paper hanger, after they met in the Theatre so coming from two theatrical parents, it was no surprise that I would end up in a similar industry.

I achieved a Bachelor of Arts in Theatre and Film from Victoria University in 1995. I also studied music, composition and languages - including Te Reo. I completed my post graduate diploma in Film and Television Production at the Avalon TV Training School at TVNZ in Wellington.

Since then, I've toured with professional theatre companies, run my own performing arts school, have appeared in several films, worked as a specialist early childhood educational entertainer and have voiced characters for film, documentary, radio and an X Box game. I've won

a number of country music awards including the Gourmet Paradise Awards in Blenheim in 2000.

Now, my partner Pete Ward and I run a company called Starlight Media House in Auckland which initially was about social media marketing, web development and content creation, with the next phase and evolution the production of web and broadcast quality TV style shows.

I have also had the wonderful role of being MC of the Foodshow that travels around New Zealand and have worked with many New Zealand TV celebrity chefs - one of whom will be joining us to launch our first big TV style show! Look out for 'Fresh and Seasonal' hosted by myself and former Masterchef judge Ray McVinnie, streamed live to you very soon!

I also recently secured a role as a presenter for the TV shopping Channel 'Yesshop' (Freeview 21 / Sky 26) so appear on national TV daily and as of 15 February, in Australia via Foxtel.

As I lost my father in 1991, I applied for Iwi support from Ngāti Rārua to subsidise my University reading material and textbooks, for which I will always be extremely grateful.

Our very own **Miriana Stephens** won the Māori Woman Business Leaders Award at this year's Aotearoa New Zealand Māori Business Leaders Awards.

Miriana was born and raised in Motueka by her grandparents, often travelling to various hui with them. She became a Wakatu Incorporation Board member in 2009, and was previously an Associate Director and Scholarship recipient of the Incorporation.

Miriana is also a Director of Aotahi Limited (Aotahi) which is a Māori-owned and managed business that specialises in developing and managing educational programmes in the areas of small business and money management for communities throughout Aotearoa. Aotahi has published three books that support small business and Indigenous business development.

Miriana is a trustee on Te Āwhina Marae, Motueka High School, and has recently been appointed to the Psychotherapists Board of Aotearoa New Zealand. Her qualifications include a Bachelor of Arts (New Zealand History) and a Law Degree. Miriana resides in Motueka and has four children.

In May 2015, Miriana was selected to participate in the International Stanford Leadership Programme. This prestigious and intensive training and development programme includes the Directors, Chief Executives and senior management of New Zealand's leading companies and organisations where they are exposed to some of the world's 'best thinkers'.

Miriana has since been seconded to Callaghan Innovation who offer various programmes in the areas of intellectual property, innovation, strategy, practices, tools and benchmarking. A resulting outcome of this partnership is the implementation of Innovation ImProve – a tool designed to measure and improve innovation.
