Acts 15:36-41

Getting Things Started

- According to Colossians 4:10, John Mark is the cousin of Barnabas who, according to Acts 13:5, been working as Paul & Barnabas' assistant when they went on their first Missionary journey.
- Silas is one of two men that the apostles and elders in Jerusalem sent to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas along with a letter confirming that Gentile converts didn't need to be circumcised (Acts 15: 22)
- According to Acts 9:27, Barnabas is the person who takes Saul/Paul to the Apostles in Jerusalem and then vouches for him so that he will be accepted. Once Saul/Paul returns to Tarsus, he's also the person who brings Saul/Paul to Antioch.
- Saul/Paul is the person who held the coats of the people who stoned Stephen, arrested believers, was converted on a road and became a missionary to the Gentiles.
