Before he died, John McCain made the decision not to have additional medical treatment for brain cancer he battled fiercely, letting nature take its ultimate course. It was a courageous decision by a courageous man. But it raises the question, "why would anyone make such a choice?"

Research shows the vast majority of people would rather spend their final days at home surrounded by friends and family, rather than being "poked, prodded and infused" in a clinical setting. The average hospital stay for patients who do not have an advance directive is three times greater than those who have an advance directive.

So, in many ways, we can all honor the legacy of Senator McCain by creating our own advance directive for health care treatment.
