

Finish: Livermore, CA





KITCHEN MECHANIC

Creamy Garlic Parmesan Mac N Cheese

1 lb Elbow Macaroni

1 1/2 Tbsp Butter

2/3 C Panko bread crumbs


1/4 C Butter

4 Cloves garlic, crushed

1/4 C Flour 4 1/2 C Milk

1 Tbsp Cornstarch

3/4 C Grated cheddar cheese
1 C Grated parmesan cheese
6 oz Grated mozzarella cheese



Crispy Topping: Melt 2 Tbsp butter in a large oven proof pan or skillet over medium high heat. Add the Panko breadcrumbs; stir to coat & cook until golden brown. Transfer to bowl.

Sauce: Melt the ¼ cup of butter in the same pan/skillet. Add the garlic & sauté until fragrant. Whisk in the flour, continue to cook while whisking or stirring for at least 2 mins. Reduce heat down to low; gradually whisk in 4 cups of the milk, about ¼ cup at a time, whisking between each addition to combine. Bring to a boil until beginning to thicken. In a measuring cup, combine the cornstarch and remaining ½ cup of milk; whisk until lump free & stir through the white sauce to thicken completely. Season with salt & pepper, and stir in the bouillon powder. Remove from heat & add cheddar, ¾ cup of parmesan cheese and the grated mozzarella. Stir though until all of the cheese has melted. Toss the pasta through the sauce until completely coated. Top with the Panko and remaining parmesan cheese. Broil in oven for 10-15





Planning and coordinating an group event is a lot of work. At first it seems like it will be easy. You have an idea about where to go. Check. You've already established when. Check. So how hard can it be, right? WRONG. The idea it is simple rapidly is replaced with countless details you discover as you go about documenting the plan. Where to stay, how to get there, what to do when you are there, and food. Places to eat, drink and be merry.

It's imperative to document your routes well in advance of starting out on your tour. Who knows when the posted photos were taken? The photos of the facility look fresh and great, but if they were taken many years before, the condition may not be the same as those deceptive photos suggest. Hmmmm. Again, trust me on this point. By actually visiting and staying at the facility you can avoid the analysis paralysis of reading to many reviews.
