To the brethren of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Arizona,

It is my great privilege and honor to serve as your Grand Master of Masons in Arizona for the 2025-2026 year. I owe so much, to so many, for their love, friendship and support during this incredible journey. I am humbled by the trust you have placed in me and I will do my best to exceed your expectations.

I always knew that I would become a Mason at some point in my life. My father was a Mason and my uncle (my mother's brother) was a Mason. My mother was a multi-time Worthy Matron of the Order of Eastern Star. When I was stationed in the US Army in Recruiting Command as a Company Commander my two best recruiters were Masons as well as the supply sergeant. They introduced me to the brethren of Wadsworth Lodge No. 417 in Albany NY; I submitted a petition and was initiated, passed and raised there. Subsequently, I was transferred to Germany, then Kansas, then to Tucson where I affiliated with Tucson Lodge No. 4. The leadership of the lodge made a very intelligent decision and gave me something to do in the lodge so I was welcomed, put in the progressive line and the rest is history. I never thought I would be elevated to the position of Grand Master.

My theme this year is Freemasonry: A Way of Life and its foundation are the three principal tenets of Freemasonry, Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

Brotherly Love is the very essence of our Craft. It calls us to cultivate harmony, kindness, and respect among our brethren and within the wider community. This love compels us to look beyond differences and to bind ourselves through empathy and fellowship.

Relief teaches us the true meaning of charity and compassion. It is through acts of support and assistance—whether to a distressed Brother, a family in need, or our communities—that we demonstrate the living heart of Masonry. Relief is not merely an ideal; it is an active commitment to easing the burdens of others.

Truth stands as the cornerstone of our moral and ethical conduct. We are called to live with honesty, integrity, and sincerity in all things—upholding the honor of our Lodge and ourselves. Truth guides our speech, our actions, and the way we fulfill our obligations.

There are many challenges before us. But in my travels around Arizona the last few years I see a recurring theme in all the lodges. The officers and brothers are working very hard to meet those challenges. Every day you can see on Facebook and other social media lodges conducting degrees, lodges providing relief for distressed brothers and families, lodges supporting our Job's Daughters Bethels, Rainbow Assemblies and DeMolay Chapters, lodges conducting funerals, lodges hosting barbeques, lodges fund raising, lodges giving away bicycles for readers, and so much more. The fraternity, as represented by the Blue Lodges in Arizona, is doing the things it is supposed to be doing.

We have assembled a great asset for our lodges and that is the brothers who have stepped up to serve the fraternity as District Deputy Grand Lecturers and District Deputy Grand Masters. Although their titles and roles have changed in the last year, the work they do is vital to the success of the lodges. They all have great experience in the craft and will maintain the highest standard for ritual performance. I have great confidence in the abilities of all the DDGLs and DDGMs and know they will all perform their duties admirably.

Also, in my travels I have presented short talks on the 3 R's for lodges. That is Recruit, Retain and Reinstate. I am not proposing that we should ask men to become Masons but I am proposing that each lodge must actively recruit. We now have a great tool in our tool box called Grandview that receives inquiries about Masonry from two sources which are then transmitted to the lodges for their action. Every lodge has a Prospect Manager and every lodge has a prospect group, whether it is called that or Seeker group or by some other name. This is how we recruit but still maintain the requirement of To Be One, Ask One.

Every lodge leadership team also should be constantly assessing their efforts at retaining members. Are we, as Masons, meeting the expectations of our new members? Are we delivering on the promise of making good men better? Are we conducting the activities that the brethren want? Do we have meaningful, instructive Masonic education? Do we have enjoyable social events? Are stated meetings boring recitations of committee reports or worthwhile opportunities for brethren to plan the future of the lodge and see ways to participate?

That leaves reinstate as the 3rd R - lodges should all have programs in place to contact those brothers who have been suspended for non-payment of dues (NSPD). This program is wide open - phone calls, text messages, emails, other social media contacts to find out what is keeping those brothers away.

The activities planned for this year are straightforward and intended to be fun, productive events. The Grand Line will be introduced at the Order of Eastern Star Annual Meeting on August 5. RW Eric Dupree, Senior Grand Warden, is hosting a Leadership Conference in Mesa for August 15-17. The Deputy Grand Master, RW Roger Biede is going to implement an inspection program, as required by the AMC, to assist lodges in their operations. In conjunction with the next projected Worthy Grand Matron,

Donna DiCola, we will host a picnic at Kiwanis Park in Tempe on October 25. You will see an announcement for a statewide Open House tentatively for March 21 and March 22 at which all lodges will be open to the public. My team is planning a trip to the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts for the week of April 12-16, 2026, which will include opening the Grand Lodge of Arizona in Boston, a day trip to Lexington and the Scottish Rite Museum there, a walk through the Freedom Trail in Boston, visit to Fenway Park and more. I am selling my Grand Master coin and some knives as a fund raiser for the youth groups, Job's Daughters, Rainbow Girls and DeMolay. Sales have gone very well so far and I ordered more coins, but the knives are almost gone, just 7 left as of today. Thank you all for your support of our youth groups – they are the future.

Lastly, my vision for the future of the Grand Lodge of Arizona is for it to be a relevant, preeminent, fraternal organization whose members reflect the integrity of our Masonic teachings. We embrace high ideals and principles and we must commit to accepting only honorable men into our fraternity. We must maintain high standards in our activities and rituals. We must guard the West gate diligently. We must invest in our youth with support for Job's Daughters, Rainbow girls and DeMolay boys.

The Grand Lodge is here to support and assist you, the brethren of Freemasonry. You may call upon any of the Grand Lodge officers for their presence at your events and if possible, they will be there. You may call upon me, of course, my calendar is full but flexible – usually the first to ask for my presence is the first to be accepted. As stated at the beginning of this letter - I am humbled by the trust you have placed in me and I will do my best to exceed your expectations.






TRAVELING MAN



SEEKING COUNSELS



Brethren,

Masonic trials should be the least of our concerns, peace and harmony should always prevail. Unfortunately, from time to time a difference of opinion arises and the only solution is a trial. When this occurs the Grand Lodge Trial Masters Committee must be ready.

To be ready not only requires an understanding of the AMC but and having enough Trained Trial Masters ready but we must also have a cadre of Brothers ready to serve as counsels for either the prosecution or the defense.

Our committee is currently searching for Brothers interested in serving as counsels. Brethren serving in this capacity do not need to be attorneys, though that experience would help. Successful trial counsels should:

- Have experience speaking in public
- Be familiar with the A.M.C. especially Article IX and Sections 17 & Sec. 18
- Be familiar with our rituals, including the Installation Ceremony
- Be detail oriented

While we should all strive to work together to have no trials, our jurisdiction tends to have three or four each Masonic Year, so serving as a counsel will have minimal interference on your personal schedule.

THE ENDURANCE OF LIGHT: FREEMASONRY UNDER FIRE

*A Masonic Education Lecture and Discussion Guide Based on Historical

Accounts from the Scarlet Book of Free Masonry*

Introduction

Brethren, we gather not just to reflect on ritual or brotherly fellowship, but to remember the cost of Masonic light in the face of darkness. The book I bring to your attention is an 1888 publication titled the Scarlet Book of Free Masonry, authored by M.W. Redding. It offers thrilling, sobering, and emotional accounts of the persecution endured by our Masonic forebears. These pages recount torture, religious opposition, and state suppression, yet through it all shines the unquenchable light of our Craft. Let us explore this together—not just as history, but as inspiration.

Section I: Historical Background

The Scarlet Book of Free Masonry was published in 1888 by Redding & Co., Masonic Publishers. It is an ambitious volume that combines Masonic philosophy, historical narrative, and vivid illustrations. Among its most impactful stories are the tortures suffered by Brother Coustos at the hands of the Inquisition, and the plots of the Jesuits against the Craft in Paraguay. This book does not simply catalogue events. It raises timeless questions: What does it mean to stand for truth? How do we respond to persecution? And what lessons lie in the suffering of the faithful?

Section II: Image & Reflection

This hand-colored engraving shows Jesuits secretly conspiring to suppress Freemasonry in South America. It is a reminder that the Light we preserve today was once seen as a threat to authoritarianism and theocratic power. "The enemies of truth may cloak themselves in robes of piety, but the torch of Masonic knowledge exposes falsehood in



This stark black-and-white engraving shows a brother enduring horrific torture for his affiliation with the Craft. Note the words carved into the wooden pulpit at the right: "FOR THE GLORY OF GOD." The irony is tragic, and yet this is precisely why we must preserve the true spirit of brotherly love, relief, and truth.

John Coustos a Swiss born, Freemason and member of the British Lodge in Lisbon Portugal, and in 1738, the same year Pope Clement XII banned Freemasonry, he was arrested. His story was published years later, describing the pain he endured for his Masonic affiliation. "The Sufferings of John Coustos, for Freemasonry (1746) He survived, but the scars he bore are now a part of our collective legacy.

Even the cover of this book tells a story, The symbols engraved on its surface the sword, the compasses, the cross are more than decorations, they are emblems of honor, persecution, sacrifice, and truth. "Let us remember that we are the custodians of a truth once punished with the lash."

- What are we doing today to defend liberty of thought and freedom of conscience?
- Would we stand with the same integrity if tested by fire or blade?
- Do we recognize that the Masonic journey is not only one of internal illumination but sometimes of public courage?

Let the sufferings of Coustos and the schemes of his persecutors remind us that Masonry, though symbolized by the square and compass, is built upon the unyielding stones of sacrifice, truth, and brotherhood.

The Message of Martyrdom:

So why do these stories matter? Because they mirror the allegory, we all share: The legend of Hiram Abiff. The upright man slain for guarding truth. The builder who would not betray the secret. The martyr like Jacques de Molay, Grand Master of the Knights Templar. These stories remind us that being a Mason means standing for principle even when it costs us. While we may not face torture or exile, we do face a world in need of more builders. Men

who uphold justice, integrity, and brotherly love when the world leans toward cynicism and division.

Modern Reflections:

Today, being a Masonic martyr isn't about blood, it's about resolve. It's choosing what's right over what's easy. It's standing for truth, quietly and consistently, in our homes, workplaces, and communities. So, I ask you, what legacy are we leaving behind? Will we be remembered as defenders of light in a darkened age? Or will our tools of character lie buried in forgetfulness?

Section III: Key Quotes from the Book

- "The Masons have been hunted down and persecuted for daring to think freely, to worship rightly, and to unite in brotherhood."
- · "When ignorance and dogma hold power, Light becomes a crime."
- · "Every true Mason is a torchbearer in a darkened world."

- 1. What emotions do the images in the Scarlet Book provoke in you as a Mason?
- 2. What parallels can we draw between historical persecution of Masons and modern challenges to free thought and fraternity?
- 3. How can we ensure that our Lodge remains a sanctuary for truth and a beacon for society?
- 4. What responsibilities do we inherit from Brothers like Coustos?
- 5. In what ways might Masonry still be "under fire" today? Closing Charge

Brethren, let us never take for granted the freedoms we enjoy as Masons today. Let us labor with gratitude for the sacrifices of those before us. The stories in this book are not relics—they are reminders. Every time we open a Lodge, raise a brother, or whisper a word of encouragement, we reaffirm a legacy built not just on stone, but on suffering, resilience, and faith. Let this be more than a history lesson — let it be a call to vigilance, virtue, and valor.

So mote it be.

The Three Lesser Lights

In Freemasonry, the three lesser lights represent the Sun, Moon, and the Worshipful Master. These lights are symbolically arranged in a triangle around the altar, with each representing a different aspect of governance and light. The Sun, placed in the East, represents the rising sun and the source of light, the Moon, in the South, symbolizes the moon's governing influence, and the Worshipful Master, in the West, symbolizes the master of the lodge and his role in guiding and governing.

The remainder of my tour was at the "Twin Bases" Bentwaters and Woodbridge Royal Airforce Bases near Ipswich, England. From Bentwaters, I also was on various temporary duty assignments at Wheelus Air Force Base in Libya, North Africa, Zweibrucken Royal Canadian Air Force Base in Germany, Torrejón Air Force Base in Spain, and Incirlik Air Force Base in Turkey.


I was 19 years old when I arrived at Bentwaters. Then, Bentwaters was home for the 81st Tactical Fighter Wing composed of the 78th, 91st, and 92nd fighter squadrons. I was in the 81st Field Maintenance Squadron electric shop supporting 75 F-4C and F-4D fighter aircraft in those three squadrons We also supported a T-39 Sabreliner Executive aircraft, a C-47 Skytrain Transport aircraft and one HH-43B rescue helicopter. 19 years old and there I was working on multi-million dollar aircraft!

Being 19, and "ten feet tall and bulletproof" I soon learned that I wasn't all that I thought I was. The benefit of my being in the United States Air Force was that it not only gave me a career that I could also use in civilian life but made a man out of a kid. I learned the value of being respectful and the ability to effectively communicate and work with my peers from many other walks of life. If I had it to do over again, I'd do it all the same way. The Air Force gave me a firm foundation on which to build my life. I left the Air Force in August 1970 as an E-4 Sergeant.

I am a member of Peoria Lodge #31 and serve as the Mentoring Committee Chairman and Lodge Education Officer. I am also a Past Master of Marion Lodge #6 in Marion, Iowa in which I also serve as Mentoring Committee Chairman and Lodge Education Officer. I belong to Marion Chapter #10 Royal Arch Masons (Past High Priest) in Marion, Iowa, Palestine Council #27 Royal and Select Masters in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Apollo Commandery #26 Knights Templar in Cedar Rapids, Cedar Rapids Valley Scottish Rite, Phoenix Valley Scottish Rite, member of York Rite College #37 in Iowa and El Kahir Shrine in Hiawatha, Iowa currently serving as Captain of the El Kahir Foot Patrol and part-time network administrator.

What does this mean?

The Secretary is required to maintain an up-to-date printed edition of the Grand Lodge Constitution and Statutes, including all officially issued Proceedings, as directed by the Grand Lodge.
