

## One body, many parts

### Notes on the Bible readings

- Paul's letter to the Christians in Corinth moves on from issues of worship to those of authority and service. Some people had been queuing up to speak in tongues, thinking that this gift was superior to others, though without the gift of interpretation, Paul simply describes it as 'holy babbling' – a rather useless skill that doesn't build up the community.

- To stop spiritual snobbery and help the church community fully grasp the idea of spiritual gifts, Paul uses the human body as an analogy. Just as the body has different members, such as hands, feet, eyes and ears, and is deficient without one of them, so he wants the Corinthians to understand that different people have different gifts. No one person can possess them all, but everyone makes an important contribution and Paul wants them to rejoice together in a sense of unity and cooperation.

- Paul's image of the church as the body of Christ is more daring than saying 'many hands make light work'. It implies that the presence of Christ is found in people as they exercise their God-given gifts, and that Christ's followers are trusted to represent him on earth.


- In Luke, Jesus, as a guest in the synagogue, is invited to read and comment on Isaiah 61. He amazes everyone when he says that the prophecy about Israel's future glory, when the blind and sick are healed and the captives are freed, has been fulfilled that day.
