The Concept

The Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> and J Rock<sup>™</sup> is a national performing arts initiative for schools, colleges and youth groups that promotes a healthy lifestyle message. Students between the ages of 7 and 18 create a five to eight minute dance, drama and design performance about a theme of their choice which they then perform at a professional venue in front of a panel of expert judges. The event is presented by the Be Your Best Foundation, (registered charity 1077291). **Originating in Australia in the 1980s Rock** Challenge<sup>®</sup> was brought to the UK by Hampshire Constabulary in 1996 and has since grown from one event in Portsmouth to 49 events in 17 local authority areas across the UK involving over 300 schools and 20,000 young people. Schools begin to create their entries early in the school year, picking their theme and soundtracks before creating set designs, props and costumes and devising their choreography. Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> provides the opportunity for young people to learn new skills by working in a local venue with industry experts as well as improving teamwork and communication skills and decreasing anti-social behaviour. Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> aims to increase resilience in young people by increasing self-esteem and confidence and providing the opportunity for students to realise that they do not need artificial stimulants to realise a natural, adrenalin based high.

Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> and J Rock<sup>™</sup> provide young people with a unique opportunity to be their best and experience the adrenaline rush associated with live performance. Schools create a piece which gives them ownership of creative ideas and fuels student's imaginations whilst they strive to reach their goals. 2018 evaluations show proven and evidenced benefits above and beyond the original aims and objectives of increasing resilience, raising awareness of the dangers of drugs and alcohol and promoting a healthy lifestyle. Whilst these aims are still at the core of Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> the event is also shown to provide other seemingly limitless benefits such as improving students relationships with their teachers, decreasing anti-social behaviour, increasing school attendance and participants' enjoyment of school. 93% of the schools reported that self-esteem was improved in their students since they became involved in Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> and 84% said that their student's understanding of the importance on teamwork had improved (a full breakdown of Evaluation Results is available on pages 12 and 13). The event has grown year on year with more students wanting the chance to have the Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> or J Rock<sup>™</sup> experience and receive all of the associated benefits of taking part.

Benefits of Participation

Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> and J Rock<sup>™</sup> events encourage students to make positive life choices and be their best without the use of tobacco, alcohol and other drugs. These original objectives are also enriched with a multitude of benefits for the young people, teachers, school and the wider community. Below we will highlight how our events can be used to promote a healthy lifestyle, support educational Government aims and provide a compelling learning experience to all those involved.

#### **HEALTH AND WELLBEING**

Dance can be an appealing physical activity for those that may be resistant to getting involved in sports and through participation, young people can be physically active for sustained periods of time. In addition to improving physical health, the process of creating a Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> or J **Rock<sup>™</sup> performance enables** young people involved to develop a range of life skills and character traits important for personal growth and development. The event is seen by students and teachers alike as a key part of their improved resilience. confidencebuilding and

understanding of teamwork. It also provides wonderful opportunities for student leadership in many areas including choreography, fundraising and project management.

#### ENGAGEMENT

Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> and J Rock<sup>™</sup> offers young people an activity to engage in with their peers that is a credible alternative to less desirable behaviour. It encourages the formation of positive relationships not only between students but also the student teacher relationships and, yearon-year, improved attendance and the reduction in anti-social behaviour is reported in a large proportion of the schools. Teams can be made up of students with a range of religions, ethnicities, behavioural and special educational needs. Performances can be created to bring out the strengths of each and every student involved with no barriers to every pupil achieving. The whole experience also helps schools to promote the

fundamental British values of democracy, tolerance and mutual respect.

CURRICULUM Involvement and creation of a Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> / J Rock<sup>™</sup> piece is strongly placed to supplement the Purpose of Study, Aims and Attainment set out in numerous statutory aspects of the English National Curriculum. This is possible by allowing a different platform for learning which can engage and deepen the understanding of more young people. The Education Scotland Curriculum for Excellence is intended to help children and young people gain the knowledge, skills and attributes needed for life in the 21st century. The personal and social health benefits the young people experience through involvement help to achieve this aim, whilst the self-reported overall enjoyment of school contributes to raising the levels of attainment - also a key Government focus.

#### **COMMUNITY BUILDING**

The Foundation works in partnership with various police forces around the UK, humanising officers and offering an access point for young people involved if required. A positive profile of the school and young people in the community is established and schools regularly report the community support increases year after year. The events are a good opportunity for secondary school Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> students to assist the J Rock<sup>™</sup> entries of their feeder schools which in turn has positive implications for the primary school students in their transition to secondary school.

# Participants Survey Results

### NATIONAL ROCK CHALLENGE® PARTICIPANTS SURVEY RESULTS SUMMARY

Each participant in the 2018 Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> events was asked to complete a questionnaire. These were anonymous and 8,909 questionnaires were returned.

76% of students said that they spent 3 or more months rehearsing with 66% spending 3 or more hours per week on their production (outside of curriculum time). Over 210,000 student-hours were spent rehearsing for Rock Challenge®.

**785** participants said that they smoked before becoming involved in the Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup>. Of those, **610** have stopped or reduced the amount they smoke since taking part in the initiative.

Of the participants, **1,142** reported they drank alcohol regularly before becoming involved in the event. Of those, **995** have stopped drinking or reduced their alcohol intake since becoming involved in the Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup>.

112 of the students who completed and returned the survey told us they used illegal substances before involvement, 99 of those students have as now reduced or stopped their drug usage.

Of the respondents, **7,865** felt their self-esteem had improved, with teamwork skills improving in **93**% since they became involved in Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup>.

1,110 students said they had played truant from school before becoming involved in the event. 953 of those have stopped playing truant due to their involvement.

An amazing 6,996 of the 8,909 students reported they enjoy school more since becoming involved in the event. A staggering 6,512 of the 8,909 students reported they

have better relationships with their teachers following their involvement. Of the participants, **89**% reported they have made new

of the participants, **89%** reported they have made new friends through the Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup>.

We are very proud to report that **99.5%** of respondents described the initiative as excellent or good when given the choice of excellent, good, average or poor.

Each participant in the 2018 J Rock™ was asked to complete a questionnaire. These were anonymous and 6,122 questionnaires were returned.

4,652 participants in the J Rock™ event said that they spent 3 or more months rehearsing their production (outside of curriculum time).

**4,956** of the **6,122** students surveyed reported they enjoy school more since becoming involved in the event.

**93%** of respondents reported they have better relationships with their teachers following involvement in the event.

Of the participating students, **5,001** reported they have made new friends at their own school through J Rock<sup>TM</sup>.

# Teachers Evaluation Results

### 2018 ROCK CHALLENGE® & J ROCK™ Teacher evaluation results summary

The 2018 Be Your Best Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> and J Rock<sup>™</sup> involved 19,736 young people from 324 schools; of these 49 were schools new to the event.

Each team nominated a liaison teacher who was asked to complete an evaluation questionnaire and return it prior to being supplied their judge's critiques.

308 liaison teachers completed and returned an evaluation questionnaire, representing 99.3% of the teams involved.

The percentage of school time and out of school time taken to prepare for the Rock Challenge® and J Rock™ was:

School time / 15% Out-of-school time / 85%

The time schools spent preparing their entries ranged from 3 weeks to 12 months. The average time spent was 4 months.

84% of participating schools reported that average attendance within the team had been improved. On average 13 students per school had improved attendance. Nationally, 4,004 students experienced improved school attendance. The percentage of the students involved in the Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> who would not have otherwise taken part in school extra-curricular or sporting activities was **24%**.

**93%** of the schools reported that self-esteem was either improved or greatly improved in their students.

**85%** said that their student's understanding of the importance on teamwork had improved.

Aside from the day of the event, **20%** of the schools were able to use the Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> or J Rock<sup>™</sup> to promote a healthy lifestyle.

Out of all the schools that responded, **89%** reported that their students' participation in the Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup> had helped them realise a 'natural high'.

Of all the schools that responded, **10**% said that the participants' consumption of tobacco, alcohol and other drugs decreased or greatly decreased.

Anti-social behaviour has decreased in **34%** of responding schools.

#### PUPIL PREMIUM

In 2018 schools were asked how many students involved in their team qualified to receive the pupil Premium. **82%** of schools answered this question and reported that a total of **3,654** students involved in the events in 2018 did qualify for the Pupil Premium, this equates to approximately **19%** of young people involved.

Helps to establish positive relationship between students and staff. Thornhill is an area of extremely high deprivation falling within the UK the top st and as a result our pupils often don't have the opportunity to participate or experience enriching activities such as Rock Challenge. Other barriers the children within this school face include parents of carers with low incomes, low employment, poor level of education and skills, high crime rate, and high levels of ill-health and disability. One of our aims is to break this cycle and raise the aspirations of our pupils. The opportunity of being a part of Rock Challenge allows our children to become part of the wider community and develop many important skills needed to thrive in the future.
