# The Concept

The Rock Challenge® is a performing arts initiative that delivers positive healthy lifestyle messages to young people aged 7 - 18 years in schools, colleges and youth groups throughout the UK. It aims to increase the resilience of young people to negative influences through developing their self-esteem, improving their teamwork skills and building on their talent, commitment and enthusiasm. The event is produced by the Be Your Best Foundation, (registered charity 1077291), and was initially introduced into the UK by the Hampshire Constabulary in 1996.

Participation in the Rock Challenge® begins for schools in September when young people start planning their themes and performances; they begin building sets, making costumes, choreographing, and rehearsing; this is a process that culminates in schools coming together at a recognised, local venue. At their event they will experience working with professional stage and production staff where they spend the day rehearsing in front of their peers and supporting one another: it is through performing in this professional environment that the students realise they do not need artificial stimulants to realise this natural, adrenalin-based high.

The event, which originated in Australia in 1980 and was brought to the UK in 1996, has grown to the extent that in 2011, 22,113 students from 320 teams took part in 45 events throughout England, Scotland and Northern Ireland.



## A Powerful Vehicle

The Rock Challenge® is a high-impact and professionallyproduced event that captures the imagination of young people by providing them with a top class opportunity to perform live onstage at major theatre venues across the country. The event gives young people a 'drugfree high' by striving to be the best they can be and achieving their goals. 2011 evaluations show proven and evidenced benefits above and beyond the original aims and objectives. In particular, the Rock Challenge® delivers outcomes in line with current Government thinking and policy, and is constantly striving to produce evidence-based outcomes for changes to Government policy. Every year, the Be Your Best Foundation sees a dramatic increase in the numbers of young people taking part in the UK Rock Challenge®; their commitment, talent and enthusiasm is testament to the success of this fastgrowing, dynamic and effective event.

# Benefits of Participation

Although much of the preparation for performing in Rock Challenge® happens in out-of school time, benefits to the school day are tremendous. Despite the ending of the National Healthy Schools Programme (March 2011), the well-being of children and young people, particularly their emotional well-being, remains a Government priority with Education and Health working closely together towards a new partnership in 2013. Rock Challenge® is seen by students and teachers alike as a key part of their development in resilience, confidence-building and pride in participation, all vital skills that permeate the whole curriculum.

Traditionally Rock Challenge® has been seen as an enhancement to the drugs, alcohol and tobacco curriculum; it encourages positive peer pressure and attracts young people who would not otherwise participate in extra-curricular activities, and is therefore an effective diversionary tool for young people who may be at risk. Participants talk of the 'natural high' they experience through participation and this can support key messages within the drug education element of the curriculum.

In addition to the drugs, alcohol and tobacco curriculum there are obvious links to dance, art and design, drama, physical activity, theatre studies, textiles, and business studies - some schools use Rock Challenge® as a vehicle for measuring and monitoring pupil fitness, stamina and commitment to healthy eating as part of the process.

Rock Challenge® can also help secondary schools to deliver on Citizenship issues, helping to develop communication and responsibility of team membership, increasing understanding of social issues through research into chosen themes, and joining school with the wider community including opportunities for working with community police and other agencies. Many primaries are now using Junior Rock Challenge® to explore and develop themes that arise through the curriculum, aiding pupils' understanding of some complex issues.

Because participants have to finance their own productions, there are also clear links to the revised National Curriculum (2008) for Economic Well-Being and Financial Capability.

Add to this the self-reported rise in self-esteem, pride and respect for others, and improved attendance, coupled with a reduction in truancy rates, and it becomes obvious why so many schools participate year-on-year in Rock Challenge®.

With the success of our 'Youth Division' event we are also set to see the benefits of participating in the Rock Challenge® reach a far wider community in the many diverse groups now taking part.

# **Entry Day**



Imagine the scene; it's 5.30am on a rather grey, but warm September morning. The Rock Challenge® staff stumble into the offices at UK Rock Challenge® headquarters, still rubbing the sleep from their eyes, ready for what they know is likely to be the busiest day of the year. They certainly had no idea just how busy it was going to be.

## After all, this is entry day

In the few weeks before, much had been made of the importance of getting applications in as early as possible and when the big day came it was apparent that this had been heard loud and clear. Entries officially opened at 6.00am and from that moment the office was alive with noise. By 6:15am, several of the more popular events were already full with over 150 entries received and by midday there had been over 280 applications received breaking all previous records for entries. The forms continued to arrive and the phone continued to ring for the next few days and in the end, with a lot of shuffling about and schools accepting 2nd and often 3rd choices for events, most teams eventually got a space;

Rock Challenge® Producer Zoie Bartlett says "It really is a case of the earlier the better. It's fantastic to see the Rock Challenge® events are so popular, but it's devastating that some people have to miss out. We always urge teachers to send in your forms as close to 6.00am on entry day as possible and this year that was more important than ever".

Entry forms are available on the Rock Challenge® website **www.rockchallenge.co.uk**Schools who are unsuccessful in gaining a place in the 2012 Rock Challenge® are urged to contact their local council in an attempt to engage them in staging a new Rock Challenge® event in their local area.

# Participants Survey

## National Participants Survey

Each participant in the 2011 Rock Challenge® events was asked to complete a questionnaire. These questionnaires were anonymous and 10,597 questionnaires were returned.

Of the respondents, **64%** said that they spent 3 months or more rehearsing with **51%** of schools spending 1-3 hours per week on their production outside of curriculum time.

**8%** of the respondents smoked before becoming involved with the Rock Challenge®; of those, **52%** have stopped or reduced the amount they smoke due to their involvement.

Of the respondents, **14%** reported they drank alcohol at least once a week before becoming involved in the event; of those, **72%** have stopped or reduced their alcohol intake since becoming involved in the Rock Challenge®.

Of the respondents, **2%** reported they used drugs before becoming involved in the Rock Challenge®; **70%** of these have now stopped or reduced their drug usage.

Of the respondents, **90%** felt their self-esteem had improved, with teamwork skills also improving in **90%** of respondents since they became involved in Rock Challenge®.

Of the respondents, **23%** said they had played truant from school before; of those, **82%** have stopped playing truant due to their involvement in the Rock Challenge<sup>®</sup>.

**90%** of respondents reported they enjoy school more since becoming involved in the event.

**91%** of responding students reported they have better relationships with their teachers following their involvement.

Of the respondents, **77%** reported they have made new friends through the Rock Challenge®.

**99%** of respondents described the initiative as excellent or good when given the choice of excellent, good, average or poor.

# **Teachers Survey**

The 2011 Be Your Best Rock Challenge® involved **323 teams** from **326 schools**; of these **63 were schools new to the event.** 

Each team nominated a liaison teacher who was asked to complete an evaluation questionnaire and return it prior to being supplied their judges critiques.

**314 liaison teachers** completed and returned an evaluation questionnaire representing **97%** of the teams involved.

The age spread of participating students from schools which responded to the questionnaire was:

The percentage of school time and out of school time taken to prepare for the Rock Challenge® was:

School time 12%

Out-of-school time 88%

The time schools spent preparing their entries ranged from **3 weeks** to **10 months.** The average time spent was **4.5 months.** 

Of the schools who responded, **52%** reported that **average attendance within the team had been improved.** On average **10** students per school had improved attendance. A total of **3,194** students experienced improved attendance.

The percentage of the students involved in the Rock Challenge® who would not have otherwise taken part in school extra-curricular or sporting activities was **18%**.

**98%** of the schools that responded to the questionnaire reported that self-esteem was either improved or greatly improved in their students.

**93%** of the schools responded that their students' understanding of the importance of teamwork had either improved or greatly improved.

Aside from the day of the event, **34%** of the schools were able to use the Rock Challenge® to promote a healthy lifestyle.

Out of all the schools that responded, **94%** reported that their students' participation in the Rock Challenge® had helped them realise a **'natural high'**.

Of all the schools that responded, **18%** said that the participants' consumption of tobacco, alcohol and other drugs decreased or greatly decreased.

Anti-social behaviour has decreased in **52%** of responding schools.


2011 has been an amazing year and it is a pleasure to see the continued involvement of schools catering for students with special needs in the Rock

## Positive Peer Pressure

Peer pressure is a term more commonly associated with negative lifestyle choices such as smoking and use of artificial stimulants, but in terms of Rock Challenge® it is central in helping a school grow a team and encourage participation especially within the more difficult-to-reach peer groups such as girls in Key stages 2 and 3. The following model has proven successful in many Rock Challenge® schools throughout the 16 years the event has existed in the UK.

## Step 1

In the first year of participation a school will use a number of techniques to enrol team members, from simply posting adverts on notice boards to advertising within dance and drama classes. In many first-time entry situations teachers will only use students from one class to make it easier to find rehearsal time.

## Step 2

Following a year involved and having attended an event, invariably enjoying the experience, young people will start to talk with friends and encourage them to get involved the following year and teams typically grow, roughly doubling in size between year one and two. Teachers are now more comfortable with the process and rehearsals help relationships between students and teachers improve making for a better and more positive atmosphere in classrooms. The young people involved are beginning to re-define their view of teachers and are enjoying school more in general.

## Step 3

By the third or fourth year of involvement the school team is running close to capacity; relationships between students and teachers are excellent and the general atmosphere within the school is improved. The school has started to use the Rock Challenge® to help in areas in which it struggles, for example, in some schools students are not allowed to participate in Rock Challenge® unless they have 95% attendance or better; the school could then allow underattending students to attend afterschool lessons to catch up and get them to the 95% required to be involved (on average 10 students per school involved in Rock Challenge® experience improved attendance).

## Step 4

Through increased attendance and enjoyment of school, exam results are improving. Also, through reduced antisocial behaviour and improved citizenship within participants (through mixing with other students they would not normally mix with), graduates are leaving school more socially-able and active members of society. In many cases the parents of participants become involved with the schools entry through making scenery or costumes, some remaining involved even after their child has left the school.

This is an idealistic model that, in many cases, is disturbed by elements such as teachers leaving the school, finance, or even difficulty getting participant numbers for the first year of entry. However, this model is proven in many Rock Challenge® schools. One thing that has continually been proven to make no difference in the success of the concept within the school however, is success in the competition itself. Whilst a team might grow quicker following success in the competition, the end results within the school remain similar. The key to the event succeeding and growing within schools is the young people's enjoyment of participation both on the event day and throughout rehearsals; this way the positive peer pressure will expand participation naturally and teachers can focus on their team and school benefitting as much as possible.
