## WILLIAMSON COLLEGE OF THE TRADES IN HISTORY

In 1888, Isaiah Williamson, a Philadelphia merchant and philanthropist, founded The Williamson Free School of Mechanical Trades. His purpose was to provide financially disadvantaged young men with the opportunity to become productive and respected members of society. The 220-acre campus on Middletown Road was purchased in 1889. Now the Williamson College of the Trades, they continue to provide full scholarships to their students which are held to the highest academic and technical standards.
