Monday, September 23, 2019

THE SESOUI-CENTENNIAL INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION OF 1926

by Thomas H. Keels, historian and author of Sesqui! Greed, Graft, and the Forgotten World's Fair of 1926

The Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition of 1926, held in South Philadelphia, was meant to be the greatest world's fair since the 1876 Centennial. Thanks to political corruption, greed, egotism, and the wettest summer on record, it became a crumbling, sodden, bankrupt mess, Philadelphia's "forgotten fair." This talk also explores how the Sesqui became an unwitting battleground for many of the social struggles convulsing America in the 1920s: racism, anti-Semitism, women's rights, the Ku Klux Klan, eugenics, and Prohibition. Mr. Keels is author or co-author of seven books on Philadelphia history.

THE BICENTENNIAL: THE BATTLE FOR AMERICA'S 200th BIRTHDAY PARTY

This is the story of the conflicting visions of Mayor Tate's planning director Ed Bacon, charged with creating a low budget exhibition on the model of Seattle's Century 21, and the Philadelphia Junior Chamber of Commerce and their allies styling themselves the Young Professionals proposing a billion dollar Expo centered on a platform to be built over 30th Street Station's coach yards. Ultimately the platform advocates won the battle but lost the war when federal funds from the Watergate-entangled Nixon Administration were not forthcoming. A series of hastily formed fall-back plans were vetoed by NIMBY activists and a final scaled-down celebration was nearly derailed by Mayor Rizzo's announcement that the City was about to be invaded by radicals during Freedom Week.

MILLS OF THE DELAWARE VALLEY

From the beginning of European settlement the creeks of Chester County (from which Delaware County was created in 1789) were a source of revenue for area residents. In 1699 William Penn partnered with Caleb Pusey and Samuel Carpenter to operate a grist mill along Chester Creek in Upland, only one of the hundreds of grist, saw, fulling and other mills, that lined the banks of our County's waterways flowing into the Delaware River going north from the Brandywine, to Chester, Ridley, Crum, Darby and Cobbs Creeks. Join Dan for the fascinating history of milling in southeastern PA and the process of locating and identifying these mills, whether still existing, re-purposed or in some degree of decay.
