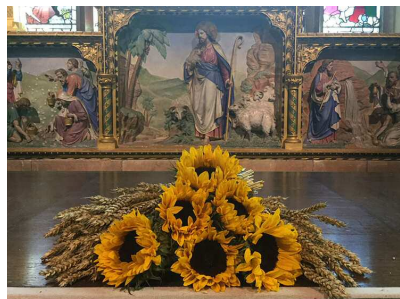
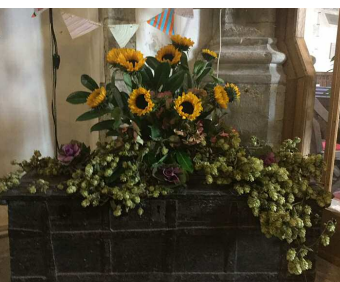
Harvest Flowers in St Mary's

The Future for Sundridge Village Report on the Public Meeting

The Parish Council hosted a Public Open session on October 16th which was attended by some 160 people.

I think that this demonstrated the strength of feeling within our village for the problems facing us, both now and for the future. The Parish Council is extremely grateful that so many people attended. In particular, we were very grateful for the attendance of all of our District Councillors, Robert Piper, James London and Anna Firth and for our County Councillor, Nick Chard. They will be instrumental in the progression of the idea.

The principal concerns seemed to be that of the flooding risk and we can assure you that this will be addressed very thoroughly by experts in this field.

Many of you will have seen recently in the press the serious issues surrounding local schooling and medical

facilities and this was pressed home when we were addressed by representatives from our medical centre and our school.

The level of support for this concept at the end of the meeting will enable the Parish Council to put all the elements of this together to create a more detailed plan.

The next step will be for the Parish Council working party to investigate the formation of a Community Land Trust to explore avenues of funding and to bring together all the elements discussed at the meeting. It will then report to the full Council with its recommendations.

Some of the more unusual books have been put aside to see whether they might attract on-line buyers and some have been stored for the next fete.

Thanks to Sir David Milman

The Friends of St Mary's Sundridge bade farewell to Sir David Milman as he stepped down as Chairman of the Friends after 14 years. When David was asked to become Chair, he was at the time Chairman of the Governors of Sundridge and Brasted School and so was already well connected and acquainted with Sundridge.

David has been an extremely skilled Chairman and every committee meeting he has led has been extremely productive and efficient. Under David's chairmanship, the Friends have put on many events including concerts, poetry readings, recitals, lectures, jazz evenings, dancers from Germany, two John Rutter Sing days, Hog Roasts, visits to numerous places including the House of Commons, Lambeth Palace



and the Whitechapel Foundry. Monies raised from these and other events have been spent on the church—a new South door, renewal of the exterior lighting, pew cushions, CCTV installation and the start-up costs to provide a loo for the church. The Committee is extremely grateful for all the support and hard work that both David and his wife Tina have given to the Friends.

The Singing Canon!

Recently the Tuesday Bible Group hosted a most unusual event at Ide Hill church. Canon Alan Rowell, a retired Minister and a friend of Angela Baker, sang from memory his own translation of St Mark's Gospel. Over forty years ago he found that he had a gift for "singing in tongues". An American pastor told him that a good way to remember Scripture was to write your own tune for it. Alan leapt at this suggestion and has been doing it ever since.

We were given a programme which included a brief summary and took our places at the front of the church, unsure what lay ahead.

There are many advantages to hearing the whole Gospel sung in one go. It allows one to sit back and listen to the complete story without interruptions. The story, though familiar, was brought to life as Alan's clever use of language brought the events into our time and place. It was powerful, moving and spiritually uplifting.

There was a retiring collection afterwards for the Sharpe Memorial School for the Blind in India. The charity is one of the PCC's chosen charities and the school benefits from our Christmas collections. The school is situated in the foothills of the Himalayas in Rajpur. It was founded by Annie Sharpe whose family came from Redhill. It was originally a hotel where people used to stay on their way up to the Missouri Hill station to escape

the heat of the plains. The school buildings were in a sorry state when the Principal and Sumana Samuel took over the school, and soon after an earthquake destroyed half of their house but with careful stewardship and gifts from a number of charities, the school compound is now in good order and the school building built to withstand earthquakes.

The school usually has just under 100 resident blind or children with low vision and about 160 local children join for classes. This is beneficial all round and the school is held in high repute by the Rajpur community. When the children go into the bazaar to shop, the shop keepers look out and care for them.

The girls have the same academic curriculum as sighted children. The older children go 2 or 3 days a week to a normal school in Dehra Dun, but basically have to remember what they are taught as there are no Braille facilities there. The system seems to work because the blind girls achieve very high exam grades. The older children organise themselves to play games, cricket being a favourite. The ball has a bell in it and the wicket keeper claps her hands so the bowler knows where the wicket is.

Harvest collection in the parish

The PCC chose the local foodbank - Loaves and Fishes as the charity to benefit from this year's Harvest collection. The foodbank has been running for five years. Its aims are quite simple – to provide basic food to families with children who have been recommended to it by a 'bona fide' source until they no longer require assistance. It is also prepared to help other people on a one-off emergency basis if resources allow. It is non-judgemental of recipient families and offers cups of tea and a listening ear to anyone who might appreciate this service, although on the understanding that the volunteers are not professional counsellors or social workers.

Food is donated by churches of all denominations across the district. Local schools, other charitable organisations and small businesses also support the project, as do many individuals. Sainsbury's has supported it since its inception. The foodbank currently supports up to 40 families – some long term and others only for a short time - giving them a large bag of non-perishable food every week of the year.

Sundridge and Brasted Primary School Harvest Service

The school's Harvest Service was introduced by the two Worship Captains who explained that, this year, the theme of their service was the work of Christian Aid and, in particular, its support for Malawi's farmers.

Elm class magnificently performed 'Frank and the Pea Stalk' as a comment on the effects of climate change. A terrifying march-past of "Fi, fie, foe, fum, extreme weather, here I come" accompanied every attempt of the poor pea to grow up and down the aisle. In the end, only a resistant crop proved able to survive.

Willow's class contribution was a lovely series of poems on the same subject. Each poem depicted at its beginning the beauty of the earth, moved on to the damage which we have done to it and ended with the warning about climate change, "It is happening".

Maple class planted a bean "with our finger", suiting action to word. "Sun will shine, winds will blow. Bean will fall asleep."

Mr Gaind's talk moved between an initial conker - "What is its purpose?" – onto a tiny acorn, from which mighty oaks are born. Amazing things come from small beginnings. This he linked to the small actions which make a big difference. He then spoke about the parts of the world where Christian Aid is seeking to make a difference, those countries where more than half of the population lives on less than \$2 a day and whose peoples do not enjoy the life-style which we in the West are privileged to enjoy.

Cedar class offered our prayers in gratitude for all that we enjoy (including their food at lunchtime that day) and held up pictures to illustrate all the good things which we should never take for granted.

A collection was taken for Christian Aid.
