## Henriette Delille: Her Response to the Holy

That Henriette Delille lived a life of holiness there is no doubt. At a very young age she and her friends formed a fraternity to bear witness to the love of God, to teach others to pray and spread the love of God.

By these actions Henriette and companions demonstrated a strong desire to deepen their own faith life. Her life illustrates that as a young woman she took seriously her vocation as a Christian person.

As Henriette went about doing works of charity, caring for the sick, educating the ignorant, caring for the elderly and serving as godparent, no one could question or doubt her sincerity. History also indicates that Henriette and companions served as witnesses to several clandestine marriages. They did this because of strong belief that living without the blessings of the Church (matrimony) was sinful.

When Henriette Delille received the inspiration, "I Believe in God. I hope in God. I love, I want to live and die for God" to found the Sisters of Holy Family, little did she realize she was the face of God for a Church that was part and parcel of a cruel system of slavery. The courage and witness of Henriette in the face of adversity paved the way for the many women who came after her to strive for a life of holiness.

Today many of the followers of Henriette believe in her power to intercede in their behalf. Many favors have been granted through prayers and intercession of this great woman of God.

## Year-long Jubilee begins with solemnity, thanks, praise, and joy !



The Sisters of the Holy Family opened its 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary with a jubilant Mass, honoring Venerable Henriette Delille, held at the Motherhouse on Saturday, November 19, 2016 at 9:45 A.M.

Two Archbishops and two Auxiliary Bishops of New Orleans Archdiocese concelebrated: Archbishop Gregory Aymond, main celebrant and homilist, Bishop and Vicar General Fernand Cheri, III, O.F.M., and Retired Archbishop Alfred Hughes and Retired Bishop Dominic Carmon, S.V.D. Archbishop Aymond gave a very inspiring homily.

There were approximately 15 priests and six deacons who also concelebrated. We had a full chapel and wonderful music. Several attendees expressed how very moving it was

to see our Sisters process into the chapel, especially the elders of the Congregation. Several students from St. Mary's Academy also served at Mass and the St. Raymond/St. Leo the Great Choir led the singing with Connie and Dwight Fitch, and Sr. Lucia directing.

The Sisters of the Holy Family Associates turned out and participated in the mass, as well as many of our various Board members. The Ladies and Knights of St. Peter Claver, E.O. Moss Assembly #4, were also present and the Knights served as honor guards. The celebration was very uplifting and a most beautiful and appropriate way to open our year-long celebration of 175 years in God's service.

# Exhibit : “One Heart, One Soul” celebrates the life and Legacy of Ven. Henriette: Recognizes Sisters of Holy Family 175 Years of Service to the Church

On Oct. 15, 2016 the Sisters of Holy Family and some members of the lay faithful witnessed the formal opening of an exhibit honoring Venerable Henriette Delille, 1812-1862, and the Sisters of the Holy Family, the religious congregation of women she founded in 1842. The Old Ursuline Convent Museum on Charters Street is the venue for the exhibit. The exhibit, the creative work of Archdiocesan archivist, Emilie Leumas, highlights the life of the young Henriette and

her search for God; her courage to start a religious family during the nation's lived sin of slavery, and the growth of the congregation expanding a period of 175 years.

It is with this idea in mind that Sr. Judith Therese Barial wrote a coloring book to tell the story of Venerable Henriette Delille for young people.


She manages to tell the story in a simple style yet maintains a high level of interest.

## A Legacy of Love Henriette Delille and the Sisters of the Holy Family

This is the title of a documentary film which gives a historical look at a congregation of African American nuns who have spent their lives serving the poor, elderly, and enslaved in New Orleans.

The documentary is beautifully done. Not only does it tell the story of Venerable Henriette Delille, but also the story of the Sisters of the Holy Family that she founded in 1842.

The Sisters are celebrating 175 years of service to the people of God, not only in New Orleans, but many other places in the United States, and also outside the United States in Belize, for over 100 years, and Nigeria, West Africa.

The documentary was premiered November 20th and repeated December 7th and 26th. DVDs are available from Wlae.com. It is a partnership of Louisiana Public Broadcasting and the Willwoods Community.

# Update on Venerable Henriette Delille's Cause

The most frequently asked questions about the canonization are "When will Henriette be declared a Saint in the Roman Catholic Church? Why is it taking such a long time? What can we do to help promote the Cause and to move it along at a faster pace? How much does the Cause cost? Where is the Cause today? The update follows:

**Twenty-eight years ago** Henriette was accepted as a candidate for sainthood by the Congregation for the Causes of Saints in Rome. She became the first U. S. native born African American whose cause for canonization has been officially opened by the Catholic Church.

**Servant of God**, the first step to canonization, was the name given to her. At this time Henriette's life, virtues, and reputation of sanctity had to be researched, examined, and accepted by historians, theologians, and members of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints in Rome. An Archdiocesan Inquiry was also held. Our responsibility was to tell her story, promote devotion to her, and to accept and record favors.

**Seventeen years later**, over 1,000 pages of documents, boxed and sealed during a special Mass, were shipped to Rome.

**After five years** of examination and approval of these documents, Pope Benedict XVI on March 27, 2010, declared Henriette **Venerable**, the second stage of canonization. For six years we have been praying and waiting for an authenticated miracle since a miracle is needed for **Beatification**, the third stage of canonization.

We had a possible 13 alleged miracles to choose from. Our Roman postulator, Dr. Ambrosi, thought that the healing of a four-year-old girl, in the Galveston-Houston Archdiocese, whose major organs had shut down and doctors said

that there was nothing more they could do - healed rather quickly when family, friends, the Sisters, students, and many more joined in prayer through Henriette Delille's intercession. Not only did she get well, but continues in good health as a happy student in graduate school.

Unfortunately, not all the doctors in the Roman investigation saw this as an accepted alleged miracle. They are waiting for more evidence. The Postulator has not given up on this cure. However, there is a second alleged miracle that is being investigated now in Little Rock, Arkansas.

This one involves a college student who became seriously ill. Her major organs shut down and the doctors predicted her death. Prayers through the intercession of Henriette Delille were being offered by the family, Sisters and friends. Her Mother said that she prayed to Henriette constantly from the beginning to the end.

The young student was healed, graduated from college, and is doing very well.

As soon as the inquiry is completed, the doctors, in Rome, will study the medical records. This could be the authenticated miracle we need for **Beatification**.

We will need a second miracle for **Canonization**.

What are we doing now? We continue to pray as a congregation. We ask and encourage others to pray with us. We continue to spread devotion to Henriette by using the media, our speakers' bureau, and getting chapters of *Friends of Henriette Delille*, nationally and internationally. We hope, pray and wait for the day when we can say **Blessed Henriette** and then **Saint Henriette**.

## In Memory of Venerable Henriette Delille . . .

November is a special time of the year for the Sisters of the Holy Family, their Associates and friends. Several activities are held during the month of November in remembrance of their foundress, Venerable Henriette Delille. One of those activities is providing a meal to the homeless.

Living the commitment of their foundress is a daily part of the Sisters of the Holy Family's lives, in that they feed those in need daily. However, during the month of November, they offer a hot meal and a gift bag to a larger group of New Orleans people by feeding men, women and children at Ozanam Inn.

This year on November 12, the Sisters prepared food for 150 people, with the assistance of KLM Catering. The Sisters were happy to personally serve the food to the persons who came to Ozanam Inn on this Saturday. The menu consisted of baked chicken, red beans and rice, green salad with dressing, rolls and butter, sodas and cookies. Other sisters, along with Associates and friends, sang while their guests enjoyed the meal.

Gift bags which included socks, wash cloths, comb, toiletries, information about health and housing services available in the New Orleans area, through the generosity of Sidney and Marcia

St. Martin, and a Venerable Henriette Delille tee shirt and prayer card were given to each of the 136 persons who came to Ozanam Inn.

Their outreach to feed those in need continued at Ozanam Inn because the excess food remained at the shelter for future use.

This month, the Friends of Delille partnered with the National Angel Tree Network/Prison Ministry. Approximately 25 children whose parents have been incarcerated will receive Christmas holiday gifts from Friends of Delille. This collaboration includes the collaboration of Holy Name of Jesus Parish, located in East Orange, New Jersey.

Fr. William G. Cook, Pastor of Holy Name of Jesus Parish and several parishioners have been instrumental in making the upcoming National Angel Tree Network a big success. Thank you to Holy Name of Jesus' Pastoral Council President, Donna Daniels, and their pastoral council.

Other parishioners from parishes involved in the Angel Tree project include members of Archdiocese of Newark's Af-

rican American, African and Caribbean Apostolate under the direction of Fr. Emeka Okwuosa.

Other Friends of Delille involved in the Angel Tree Ministry are parishioners from St. Theresa of Calcutta and St. Peter Claver Parishes, both located in Montclair, New Jersey.

On Saturday, March 11, 2017 Friends of Delille will participate in Archdiocese of Newark Women's Commission Day of Reflection entitled "Alive in Christ" at Seton Hall University, South Orange, New Jersey. The NJ Chapter will exhibit, for the second year, a beautiful Delille banner while distributing tri-lingual prayer cards and biographical information about Venerable Henriette Delille.

This wonderful conference allows for spiritual renewal and fellowship among Christian women throughout the Archdiocese of Newark.

We are awaiting the decision from Archdiocese of Newark Men's Commission Day of Reflection regarding Friends of Delille participation in the men's conference to exhibit information/prayer cards while sharing the message of Delille. Our male Friends of Delille will represent the chapter pending approval.

late Robert E. Andry and Martha Collins, Sister entered eternal life on August 27, 2016 at the age of 93.

She was born and reared in Chastang, Alabama. Sister has the distinction of being the first child baptized by Fr. Sabino Grossi, SSJ, who served at St. Peter's Catholic Church for forty years. Sister M. Magdalen de Pazzi entered the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Family on September, 1943. She professed First Vows, 1946 and Perpetual Vows, 1951.

Sister joyfully and compassionately ministered to the people of God. Before entering the convent at age twenty, Sister worked at St. Peter's School where she had attended from grades one through twelve and had graduated as a class of one.

As a Sister of the Holy Family, Sr. de Pazzi served throughout Louisiana as a teacher and/or administrator: in New Orleans briefly at St. Raymond Elementary School, St. Mary's Academy (where she also was assistant mistress of boarders), St. Michael School for Exceptional Children, and St. John Berchmans Child Development Center; in Baton Rouge at St. Francis Xavier Elementary School, and in Reserve at Our Lady of Grace Elementary School. Sister did venture to Compton, California where she served in ministry at St. Albert the Great Elementary School.

Sister did not forget her roots; for many years, she conducted Vacation Bible School during the summer for adults and children at her home parish.

Wherever Sister served, she was greatly loved and treasured. The principal at

Sister's additional degree in art aided her in teaching as well as in her ministry to the elderly at Lafon Nursing Home and the Sisters of the Holy Family Motherhouse in New Orleans. She also served her religious community as local leader and local treasurer.

When her health declined, she transitioned to Lafon Nursing Facility in November 2010, and it was there that she died.

Sr. de Pazzi will always be remembered for her ready and quick wit as well as her radiant and infectious smile. We all, of course, know of "those boys," Sister's brothers who have always been so faithful and supportive of her.

Sister was preceded in death by her parents and three brothers: Augusta Anthony, Francis Benedict, and Sabino Baltare Andry and two sisters-in-law Willard Breech Andry and Mary Pugh Andry. She is survived by three brothers: Robert Curtis (Lillie Mae), Milton Aloysius (Jessie Mae), and Harold Xavier Andry and Marietta Likely Andry (a sister-in-law) as well as a host of beloved nephews and nieces.

## Sister Augustine McDaniel

Sister Augustine McDaniel (nee Augustine Leetra) daughter of the late Joseph McDaniel and Lillie Malveaux McDaniel entered eternal life on December 3, 2016. She was 80 years of age. Sister Augustine was born in Lake Charles, Louisiana, entered the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Family September 8, 1955,



made First Vows March 19, 1958, and Perpetual Vows March 19, 1964.

Sister Augustine served in ministry to the people of God as an educator in Tulsa, Oklahoma at St. Monica and Holy Family schools; in Louisiana: New Orleans at St. Katherine and St. Raymond schools; in Lafayette at St. Paul School; in Opelousas at Opelousas Catholic; and in Houston, Texas at Our Mother of Mercy School. Sister Augustine was recognized for her leadership skills very early and was for many years the principal of the schools where she served.

It is no wonder that when she went to Nigeria, West Africa, she was the administrator of Presentation National High School. Sr. Augustine also served God's vulnerable ones in housing as administrator of Flint Goodridge and Malta Park Apartments in New Orleans. In addition, Sister was the administrator of Lafon Nursing Facility of the Holy Family for twenty years.

Sr. Augustine was recognized by civic leaders and organizations for her outstanding and untiring service. She received a Certificate of Merit from: Nursing Home Administrator 1982, American College of Health Care Administrators 1984, the City of New Orleans 1987, 1989, and 2001, the City Council District D 1987, Senate of the Louisiana Top Ladies of Distinction 2001, New Orleans City Council Top Ladies of Distinction 2001, and many others.

After having labored so long in the Lord's vineyard, Sister herself became ill and resided at her beloved Lafon Nursing Facility where she died.

Sr. Augustine Leetra McDaniel, as described by her good friend and former Congregational Leader, was "a woman of integrity and tenacity, unabashed and fearless. A person with a practical Christian faith and deep contemplative spirituality known to some cherished friends." Sister "had a keen mind and a willingness to use her talents to bear witness and serve her God wherever He called her.

She had an abiding love for her birth family from one generation to the next, but she also had great affection for an extended collection of faithful friends. With this select group of family and friends she often shared a prayer over a phone conversation. Behind the facade of a no nonsense nun was a gentle spirit, a faithful daughter of the Church who is now privileged to behold the gaze of God."

Sister was preceded in death by her parents, four sisters: Dorothy McDaniel Sanderson, Julia McDaniel Rodgers, Myra Charles, and Sarah Charles Clark; eight brothers: Joseph McDaniel, Joseph Charles, Edward Charles, Gilbert Charles, Robert Charles, Haywood Charles, Lester Charles, and Elridge Charles. She is survived by her step-brother, Joseph Victorian, and a host of beloved nieces and nephews.
