Through Henriette Delille's Intercession

In September 2000, at thirty-five years of age, I suddenly fell ill. I was hospitalized with severe heart failure and ventricular arrhythmia secondary to severe ventricular distension (cardiomyopathy).

I stayed in the hospital from September 13-28. I received intensive treatment. I was also on bed rest for almost four months. I remain on drug therapy today.

When I entered the hospital, my heart function was at approximately 8%. Normal heart function is 50% - 55%. The doctors were befuddled by my condition. The Chief of Cardiology became my primary physician.

Currently, my heart function is drastically improved and is about 40% - 45%.

While in the hospital my wife, Chimene Grant Connor, gave me a prayer to Mother Delille asking her intervention with *GOD*.

On two occasions Mother Delille intervened and aided my recovery. First, after a failed attempt by the doctors to test my heart to see if I needed a defibrillator, which landed me in intensive care. I asked for a sign letting me know whether to allow them to perform the sur-

Researchers Explore Delille's Formation in Convent, LA

1862

In mid-January, Doctors Virginia Gould and Charles Nolan, of the Historical Commission, returned to Rome to spend time in the International Archives of the Religious of the Sacred Heart to find documental proof of Henriette's initial formation with the Religious of the Sacred Heart.

In her journal, Sister M. Bernard Deggs wrote, "Both the first and second superiors were instructed by the sisters up in St. James Parish, by the Ladies of the Sacred Heart." Both the Sisters of the Holy Family and the Religious of the Sacred Heart have strong oral traditions that Henriette Delille received her initial formation in religious life at St. Michael's in Convent, LA, upriver from New Orleans.

St. Michael's was a favorite spot for Bishop Antoine Blanc. He visited there often, spending time with the Sisters and students. The convent at St.

Michael's was a natural place to send Delille for a period of instruction in religious life prior to forming her own community. It was secluded from New Orleans. No one would have known her. There were few, if any, novices there.

"Expectation is the power that shapes our lives," said Father Ford as he began his homily. Then he asked what about our expectations - of ourselves, others, and God.

ed. She expected that it was her calling to address the needs of our people."

This she did as she expressed in her prayer: "I believe in God. I hope in God. I love, I want to live and die for God."

Dr. Ambrosi Named New Postulator for Delille

Mr. Andrea Ambrosi is a canon and civil lawyer of the Roman Rota, and licensed in Sacred Theology.

He has been a lawyer of the Congregation of Saints for 20 years.

During this time Dr. Ambrosi has taken care of and completed hundreds of causes in different parts of the world, 34 countries altogether.

In almost 30 years of

experience many causes have been pursued. Some of them include Pope John XXIII and currently 10 in the United States. Some of the easily recognizable names are: Father Peyton, Cardinal Cooke, Bishop Sheen, Father Moreau, and Mother Henriette Delille.

Dr. Ambrosi plans a visit to the Sisters of the Holy Family Motherhouse in June.

Question: What Is Happening with the Cause?

The first answer is: The Cause is moving very well. Devotion to Henriette Delille is growing. From the members of the Historical Commission to the latest Friends of Henriette Delille, everything is positive, hopeful, and exciting.

More than 85 documents in French, Spanish, Latin and English are being transcribed and notarized. Dr. Charles Nolan is preparing the twelve chapter document which tells Delille's story and gives the research on her life.

This document will be ready to present to the Congregation of Saints by June 2004.

The new Postulator will visit the Motherhouse in June and he is ready to move the Cause as speedily as possible.

Mother Annette Praz, superior at St. Michael's, was a French immigrant Sister and close to

Madeleine Sophie Barat. She did not have an assistant and thus would have been able to direct Delille herself.

Sacred Heart historians have written different accounts of when Delille received this formation at St. Michael's. Sister Jeanne de Charry, in her

multi-volume edition of the Barat-Duchesne letters, indicated that this instruction took place in 1836. A thorough review of her professional correspondence provided no indication of the source for this statement. Other evidence found in the archives points to the more probable 1851-1852 period just after Delille's first profession of vows.

Our week in Rome also provided an opportunity to review the correspondence, constitutions, rules, and



daily schedule at St. Michael's to better understand the time and formation program that Delille undertook.

Like others who presented themselves to the community having been "touched by God," Delille would have followed a rigorous daily schedule, been tested to discern that her vocation was truly from God, and been instructed in the fundamentals of religious life "according to her gifts." At the center of this formation was the develop-

ment of an openness to serve God "according to his will and good pleasure."

The Sisters of the Holy Family have always recalled with special appreciation the role of the Religious of the Sacred Heart in helping establish their community in the contentious years before the Civil War.

The Sisters of the Sacred Heart share this special bond with the Sisters of the Holy Family. They welcomed us warmly and worked fervently to help add flesh to bones of this part of the historical connection between the two communities.

perform the surgical procedure. I slept with the prayer card on my chest overnight. Second, I spent the next several days praying for Mother Delille's further intervention.

Things were looking bleak but one day my wife and I witnessed a double rainbow outside the hospital window on a sunny day. I allowed the doctors to perform the surgical procedure. It was successful. I took a dramatic turn for the better. While my actual heart function had not improved greatly during my hospital stay, I felt normal. I was not winded. I pray for Mother Delille's intervention each night since then. After one year my heart function had increased to 20% and within two years it was up to 40%. Every night after I pray to thank Mother Delille, I tell

myself I will write to you.

As I sat in my hospital bed I knew that God was not finished with me yet. I am unaware of my ultimate purpose on this earth. If it is to be a conduit by which Mother Delille's canonization occurs, it would be worth all the hardships I have endured. Mother Delille is truly of GOD and I squarely credit her for my life. **Karl J. Connor, New Orleans**
