SERVICES

Sunday Services were held regularly at 9:30 AM. Settings 1 and 2 of the Lutheran Book of Worship were alternated monthly. In 1993 the Service of the Word, which had been used occasionally since 1990, began to be used regularly on the fifth Sunday (or the fourth Sunday when the fifth was a special day such as Reformation/Confirmation). In March 1994 the Hymnal Supplement 1991 began to be used (see above) at 8 AM communion and third-Sunday non-communion services...and then in 1995 regularly for the new third-Sunday communion.

An 8 AM service of holy communion was held regularly on the first Sunday of the month May through October (at first May through September). \square Sunday School began regularly at 10:40 and lasted until 11:30 AM. \square Confirmation Class, held at first (1988-1989) on Sundays at 6 PM, came \square

early to be held at 11:45 AM on Sunday (until 1 PM at first, then until \Box 12:45 PM); and when two classes were needed to prepare one for \Box confirmation in October, that class was scheduled from 1-2 PM Sunday.

Mid-week services were held regularly at 7:15 PM (early enough for children, late enough for day workers) on Ash Wednesday (ashes and holy communion at first, in 1995 and 1996 ashes only), Midweek Lent, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday (Tenebrae). A Maundy Thursday communion service was held at 12:15 PM (at first 12 noon) in the chancel for those who could not attend the evening (7:15) service. The old rugged cross made by Floyd Markham and Ben Miliano in 1956 (see Mt. Morris Index, 4-4-68, p.1, "Trinity's Cross Signifies the Crucifixion of Christ") continues to stand outside the west door for the last week or two of Lent and the first week or two of Easter. It is brought into the chancel for the Good Friday Tenebrae service and leaned upon the altar with seven candles and crown affixed. The candles are gradually extinguished as part of the Tenebrae service. For Easter morning and the Easter season it is wrapped in gold foil. A new rugged cross for the front of the nave was made by Elwin Zumdahl in March 1989. It is generally in place at the same time as the older, outside cross.

Easter services were held at 6:30 AM (sunrise, no communion, as much youth participation as possible, for a year or two at 6 AM) and at 9:30 AM (festival, early came to include communion, at foot of steps to save time). Easter breakfast was served in the Fellowship Hall by Trinity Youth at 7:30 (or 7:15) to 9 AM.

Christmas services were held only on Christmas Eve (Christmas Day only when it was a Sunday) - 4:30 PM (beg. 1988 rather than 7:15) Family Service (candlelight) and 11 PM (changed in 1993 to 10:30 PM) Candlelight Communion Service (communion was omitted if Christmas Day was a Sunday, then holy communion was celebrated Christmas Day instead). Printed services (from either Creative Communications or Augsburg-Fortress) have been used for the late candlelight services. Sunday School Christmas Programs began in 1989 to be given on the Sunday morning (9:30 AM as the regular service) before Christmas Eve. An Advent Vesper Service (4:30 PM on some Advent Sunday, e.g. 12-4-88) was held for a few years but then discontinued when choir participation became difficult.

Thanksgiving services were held only with the Churches of Mt. Morris, \square rotating among the four churches, at 7 PM on the evening before \square Thanksgiving Day, followed by a reception in the Fellowship Halls. The \square service was held at Trinity in 1991 and 1996.

High School Baccalaureate Service was held at the Mt. Morris Churches on a rotating basis. On 1 June 1989 (Thursday) it was held at Trinity at 7 PM, Charles Hayes speaking. On 21 May 1992 it was again held at \square Trinity, Mrs. Pat Mullin was the speaker, and 140 people were served at \square the reception. (5/20/90 at DUM, 5/26/91 at CB, 5/30/93 at DUM) On 25 May 1995, at 7 PM, the Oregon and Mt. Morris Churches held baccalaureate for \square the newly-merged school district at the high school.

Coffee Hour continued strong through these years, in the summer months served by the committees of the church beginning 1989, the rest of the year by members volunteering. A coffee hour followed midweek Lenten services (not Ash Wednesday or Holy Week, though), too, until 1996, when Trinity Women sponsored instead a Soup-and-Bread Supper before the service (beginning at 6 PM for the sake of the choir practicing at 6:30 PM) in the Fellowship Hall (reservation and one dollar donation invited but not obligatory).

Teacher Recognition Sunday was usually held on a late-May Sunday, and Rally Day on the Sunday after Labor Day (once in August). Church Music Sunday was held in May, both choirs participating and replacing the sermon with music. Graduate Recognition Sunday came in 1993 (May 30) to be held

on the Sunday of High School commencement; high school grads were specially honored and given the gift of a book, but junior high promotions and college graduations also were recognized (Vern Welp gave strong lay leadership to this). In September Rally Day was regularly (since 1989) followed by Bible Sunday (Good News Bibles \[ABS\]] given to third grade class) and by Bring-A-Friend Sunday (children and adults encouraged to bring friends to church and Sunday School). Women's Sunday was sometimes held in the Fall with a woman as preacher/speaker (e.g. 10/16/94, Judy Engebretson). Bible Sunday came to be regularly observed in December (e.g. Advent 2, 12/10/89, 12/10/95) or November (11/20/94) as a way of promoting regular Bible reading and the work of the American Bible Society. Occasionally a Gideon speaker was permitted.

During the Pastor's absence for vacation, instead of inviting a guest preacher, the congregation has sometimes held a lay-led hymn-sing, as for example on 19 February 1995 and 30 July 1995. Vice President Vern Welp led the services (carefully laid out by the Pastor), and Bill Horst, Donna Meyer, and Mary Jo Borneman-Dilbeck have taken roles in the hymn-sing. Affew lay-led hymn-sings were held in earlier years, too.

CHURCH PICNICS

An annual church picnic is held in June. The Education Committee makes the arrangements. Prior to this pastorate, these included services of worship at the picnic site (usually LOMC) following an earlier service at the church for those not attending the picnic. But in recent years, the picnic has begun at 12 noon or 12:30 PM, and no additional service has been offered at the picnic site. Attendance ranges around 60-65, though in 1996 it was nearly 100 (volunteer appreciation Sunday observed). The meal is pot-luck. Someone (Salley Wessels, Crete LeFevre, Steve Pearson) is assigned the planning of games and sports. At LOMC swimming is also available. Dates of recent picnics have been 6/25/89, 6/24/90, 6/23/91, 6/14/92, 6/13/93, 6/12/94, 6/25/95, 6/23/95. Only in 1989, 1992, and 1993 was the picnic at Dillehay Park; the other years it was at LOMC.

BENEFIT SUPPERS

Benefit Suppers were held regularly, sponsored by Trinity Men and assisted (beginning 1990) by Trinity Youth. A second annual benefit supper was added in 1990. Until 1995 these were always Pancake Suppers; In February 1995 and 1996 Spaghetti Suppers replaced the Pancake Suppers. The Bethel Benefit Supper has been held since 1972. The leader of these events has been Robert Stouffer, assisted by Don Cornelius and beginning 1995 Bill Horst.

COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Trinity continued as a strong member of the Council of Churches. In

1995, with Tracy Singleton as pastor, the Evangelical Free Church began

seriously considering joining with the Council. It had regularly joined

in Thanksgiving and Good Friday services only. In addition, the Council

sponsored Weekday Religious Education (until its termination in 1994),

Baccalaureate (through 1994), Vacation Bible School, a Boy Scout troop,

international youth exchange (when possible), some observances of the Week

of Prayer for Christian Unity (EFC participating, too), CROP Walk,

Parents as Teachers Program (later called Time Out and Another Step), and

Good Friday and Thanksgiving Eve services on a rotating basis. The

Council has regularly met quarterly and is composed of the pastor and two

representatives of each member church. Leadership has rotated among the

three churches, the pastor serving as president and the church secretary

as secretary-treasurer. In 1995 and 1996 the Council began to re-think

its bases, and less-than-quarterly meetings were held.

CROP Walk: 9/18/88 at Church of Brethren, 5/6/90 at Church of Brethren (89 people, \$3,591, Chris Hopp representing Trinity \[from 1989-1993\]), 9/27/92 at Trinity, 10/10/93 at Church of Brethren (550 walkers, \$3,400), 10/16/94 at Trinity, 10/15/95 at Church of Brethren. In 1993 Cindy Nicholson worked with Chris Hopp on the Walk, and since 1994 Cindy and Bill Nicholson have offered leadership.

In 1990-1991, during Desert Storm (war in Kuwait and Iraq), the Council of Churches sponsored weekly services of prayer for peace at the Township Hall, Thursdays at 12:15 PM. At Trinity, Pastor Schroeder preached a sermon on "God of War, God of Peace" on 20 January 1991. The names of servicemen of the congregation and related to our members were attached to a cross-anchor displayed in the nave.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity has sometimes been observed. \Box In 1989 about thirty members of the various churches gathered in a circle for Bible Study at the Church of the Brethren. In 1990 (1/23/90, 7 PM) and ecumenical conversation was again held at the Church of the Brethren. \Box Twelve from Trinity attended, but there were only three others, two of \Box

them pastors. On 1/20/91 (afternoon) a Hymn-Sing was held at the \square Evangelical Free Church. On 3/15/92 an ecumenical Hymn-Sing was held at \square Disciples United Methodist Church. On 2/28/93 (and again in 1994?) the \square Hymn-Sing was at Pinecrest.

A Sing-Along Messiah has sometimes been scheduled by the Performing \square Arts Guild of Mt. Morris. On 12/11/88 it was held at Trinity, and on \square 12/9/90 at the Church of the Brethren.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL
