"Improve Putting through Practice"

You read almost every putt, but if you're like most players, your routine is guesswork disguised as green reading. Surely, that is something that will not get you close to the hole often and rarely let you "in". I remember reading a golf magazine not long ago that spoke of golfers under-reading greens by a whopping 65 percent on average.

Even with a perfect putting stroke, 65 percent of under-read putts equals a lot of stokes added to the scorecard at the end of the day. Great green readers have a knack for "feeling" where the putt will break and ultimately end up.

When you reach the green, picture a clock on the hole with the 6 o'clock position pointing at your ball. As you assess your line, imagine where on the clock your putt will roll over and fall into the cup. Then, simply react to the position on the dial. For example, if you see your ball falling into the cup at eight o'clock, focus on the edge of the hole as you settle into your address position, then smoothly let that line guide your stroke.

If your mind's eye sees the putt entering the club at four o'clock, then focus only on four o'clock. Reading and putting this way is similar to how a quarterback completes a pass to a receiver crossing over the middle; he focuses on the receiver, then taps into his instincts to hurl the football far enough ahead of the receiver so he can catch it in full stride. Find your entry point and let instinct take over. After all, your goal is draining putts, not perfect reads.

Your tendency is to scan the putt from the ball to the hole and back again, or vertically. That's a good way to determine if the putt is moving uphill or downhill, but it doesn't help the putt horizontally. Making a side-to-side assessment in your green-reading routing will have you judging break like a pro. Here's how:

- Step 1: Examine the final three feet of the putt from behind the hole.
- Step 2: Picture two coins on the green, one on each side of an imaginary line running from the ball to the cup. Make the coins about 4 feet apart.
- Step 3: If you haven't already, squat down, then run your eyes horizontally between the coins. In the event the green tilts, you'll immediately notice that one coin is lower than the other, giving you a clear idea of the direction and severity of the slope.
- Step 4: Walk behind the ball and repeat your horizontal scan from coin to coin for the first half of the putt. You now have a complete picture of the slope. For best results, drop actual coins on the green when you practice.

Talkin Turf - Doug Jeffrey

It was nice to end August on the cooler side after a tough July. Hopefully, we don't start off September like we did last year when temps rose well over a 100 and we also had power outage issues.

I brought up in last month's Mulligan about some turf decline on the greens due to some overly stressed issues that occurred during the third week of July. At that time the extent of the damage was just showing itself. A number of different factors led to the cause. To start, spring was fairly cool with a mild June.

A small core aeration was done in the spring with a light topdressing of sand. The greens were lush as we moved into July. The last topdressing was done in May due to lack of resources and we were not able to verti-cut the green routinely so thatch build up became an issue. Damage was done to excessive thatch areas around the time we were having some irrigation issues, which compounded some scalping issues.

Unfortunately, this all occurred during the hottest week of the year. The stressed poa anna could not handle it and went into decline. There was no effect on any bent grass in those areas due to a different growth habit. One could say it was an unintentional poa control. We quickly spiked in some new bent grass seed and got a fairly quick initial germination.

The smoky, warm conditions helped by keeping evening temps up and day temps down a little, along with a little higher humidity. We will continue to over seed these damaged areas and we were able to get some sand in to top dress greens to help with the grow-in.

There has been some summer disease activity, especially on the practice green. Greens aeration is planned for Sept. 24 and 25 and we will go back to large coring and deep tining if everything works out right.

We have been working on setting sprinklers to soak these hard to grow areas while reducing watering in other areas. We have raised and leveled a number of sprinkler heads and changed some internals to adjust part circles to reduce wasted water that was being thrown onto non-turf areas.

There have been issues with sprinkler heads clogging due to clam shells and other debris especially around the No. 11 green and the 12th tee, where we had to replace a sprinkler. One of the issues that caused problems with the pumps this past year - besides erratic power coming in - may have finally been resolved.

Also the amount of water flow into our holding ponds was down to a trickle so the crew climbed down into the creek and built up the rock diversion to send more flow into our diversion dam.

With the cooler weather at the end of August and the trees starting to change color, fall seems a lot closer.
