

Pastor's Corner....

Dry Bones

"The hand of the LORD was on me, and he brought me out by the Spirit of the LORD and set me in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. ... Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath; prophesy, son of man, and say to it, 'This is what the Sovereign LORD says: Come, breath, from the four winds and breathe into these slain, that they may live.'" So I prophesied as he commanded me, and breath entered them; they came to life and stood up on their feet — a vast army."

-Ezekiel 37:1,9-10

If you have ever read the book of Ezekiel, you know that Israel was in horrible shape. They had forsaken God and given themselves to idol worship. They had gotten fat from the peace and prosperity to which God had led them.

It's an age-old story. When times are lean, we toughen up, turn to God and listen to Him. But when God redeems us, and leads us to sanctuary, we shun Him and look to our own comforts... as if we'd delivered ourselves and deserved our comfortable status.

The Israelites suffered for this attitude greatly. Taken into captivity by Babylon,

exiled from their homeland, they suffered greatly. Instead of turning back to God, they turned to the false idols of Babylon, and worshipped golden images.

By 586 B.C., Judah had fallen, and Jerusalem was completely destroyed. There seemed to be no hope. These events occurred right in the midst of Ezekiel' ministry.

Ezekiel heard the Lord and urged the Israelites to turn again to God; to listen to and obey Him. It was God, after all, who delivered them from slavery in Egypt.

Hard to get a people to be obedient though. They'd become used to their status... after all, it wasn't so bad in exile, was it? They had adequate food and drink, and Babylon wasn't a bad place to live. After all, it was a thriving nation with a strong army. Worship their kings and their gods and there was a great opportunity for advancement.

Therein the human condition: earthly solutions to eternal problems.

Before long, as Ezekiel knew, these people were dead to God. Hence, the words quoted above, from chapter 37: "in

the middle of a valley... full of dry bones."

How true. That is our status without God: dry bones. Oh sure, we might have a house and car, and a lot of other "stuff," but you can put an expensive suit or dress on dry bones, and it remains just that... a lifeless set of rotten calcium.

But there is a way to new life. God said, "[S]ay to these, 'Dry bones, hear the word of the Lord!'" (v. 4)

Isn't that beautiful? The dead bones, dry and rotting because they have chosen to reject the Lord, have a way to new life. And it's not their way... heck, they've tried every fleshly road to happiness.

The way, the *righteous* way, the *only lasting* way is to "hear the word of the Lord." Our culture might snicker at this... after all, we *are* such a brilliant and informed public.

But I would offer this: Look to where it all leads. Society's fleshly offerings, those advertised on TV and in magazines, look enticing for sure, but yesterday's commercials seem silly and meaningless today- they are so dated!

God's offering is eternal truth and life. His word, contained in the Bible applies yesterday, today and tomorrow.

But there's more to the story... God instructs Ezekiel to tell the bones to breathe; breathe the breath "coming from the four winds." Ahhh! The Holy Spirit has come to the dry bones, breathing new

and real life into them. Back from the grave comes the dead nation of Israel, through the strength, wisdom, breath and word of God.

I love the footnote in my Bible about this passage. It says this:

"The dry bones represented the people's spiritually dead condition. Your church may seem like a heap of dry bones to you, spiritually dead with no hope of vitality. But just as God promised to restore his nation, he can restore any church, no matter how dry or dead it may be. Rather than give up, pray for renewal, for God can restore it to life. The hope and prayer of every church should be that God will put his Spirit into it (37:14). In fact, God is at work calling his people back to himself, bringing new life into dead churches"

This is from the *Life Application NIV Study Bible*, and it is worthy of our consideration.

We are not close to being a "dead church," but a few years ago, we were hurting. Attendance was a bit off, several folks left or stayed home, a few elders abruptly quit the session, and we were hurt by the deaths of several or our brothers and sisters.

Then, look what happened. We didn't walk around with our heads down, or in the sand; we came to church and we prayed. We conducted meaningful and well-thought-out stewardship campaigns. We brought new and exciting groups to give concerts.

God called new and robust members to serve as elders; members who would honor their vows to lead, not just throughout their three-year terms, but through a second three-year term! And they are having a joyful time leading this church.

God has breathed new life into Franklin Presbyterian Church. Worship attendance has improved. We are seeing new faces. The scripture readers are enthusiastic. The youth are signing on for the Pulpit Club. The choir sounds beautiful. Reggie Saddler and his crew are coming back. In unity, church prayer is happening daily; prayers for the church as well as the community and world.

Our focus is where it should be; on Jesus Christ, not the petty things that divide us. It is on living anew in the Spirit, not on bells and whistles.

Let's join together and keep it up. Let's show the world that this "over-the-hill" gang ain't quite over the hill. Let's pray, join hands and do His work joyfully.

Dry bones? Shoot... not here.

Worship Committee

How do you worship?

Worship involves more than coming to church, singing and prayer. People worship God in many different forms and many different ways. I am worshiping now as I write this. You are worshiping now as you read this. Soon you and I will be distracted and fail to honor God as we should. How can we keep our focus on God when we have so many responsibilities, so many things that require our attention?

We are told in 1 Thessalonians 5: 16-18 "Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances".

In Romans 12, Paul says to "present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship."

Does God expect us to live a life "acceptable" to Him 24/7? When I was young, I had the idea that as long as I went to church on Sunday, that was all God required as my worship. While church attendance should be a part of worship, God expects your worship to continue after you leave. Ralph Waldo Emerson brings some help to this theme in his sermon "Pray Without Ceasing". Emerson made the following observation: "It is not only when we audibly and in form, address our petitions to the Deity that we pray. We pray without ceasing. Every secret wish is a prayer. Every house is a church, the corner of every street is a closet of devotion."

Paul in his letter to the Colossians said: "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."

God knows you have responsibilities and duties. He likely gave them to you. Your schedule may include more than you think you can handle. You may think you don't have time to worship. Worship isn't what you do instead of something else; you do it "as" you do everything else. Worshiping like that takes commitment. Nothing we do should be placed before God. God alone deserves our worship. There may be things in your life you need to change. You can start today.

Stewardship and Finance:

Happy New Year to all! Here is what is happening with the Stewardship and Finance Committee.

Our friends at Lloyd Presbyterian Church in Winston-Salem, that same bunch who joined us during the last Reggie Saddler Family Concert, are in need of help. Their 200+ year-old sanctuary, which is a recognized historical site, is in dire need of repair.

Because their small congregation (around 20) is aging and of moderate income, they are falling short of the funds necessary to keep the building in repair. They've emptied their bank account to pay for those repairs that are absolutely necessary. The rest, such as painting on the outside, will have to wait.

The Stewardship and Finance will recommend to the session that we have a special offering soon, to assist our friends at Lloyd in repairing their church. This is, indeed, a worthy outreach; one Christ has brought to our attention. We anticipate the session will get behind this and hope you will find it in your hearts to help!

A few are stepping up, but they cannot carry the load that needs to be carried!

There have been many sermons and bible study sessions which highlight the opportunity to share the word of Christ outside the walls of our church, and Doug Foxworth has some really neat ideas coming to facilitate the opportunity. We can have a few leaders in the church with ideas, and they create opportunities for those who will step forward and participate. At times I don't understand how some of our leaders and staff continue on, how they carry the load, and why they continue to try!

Franklin Presbyterian is not a "dead church", this is a true statement because we have a core group who are not willing to give up and they will continue to carry the load.

I personally believe that each one of us have a role in the life of our church. I also believe that one day we will stand before the Master and we will be accountable for our actions, good and bad, and in some way, I believe that we will have to reflect upon the opportunities we passed over because we didn't have time for Gods' work.

In the past couple months, I had asked for help with the "Annual Review" of Rev. Elam and did get a volunteer or two. During my research and thoughtful consideration of what this review needed to include, I went back to the "Book of Order" for some guidance. II found that an "Annual Review" of the Pastor was not required, however we are required to make sure that his compensation and benefits fall within the guidelines per the Presbytery.

This being said- The Personnel Committee is considering the opportunity to provide "Annual Feedback" to the Pastor, and what feedback would be beneficial. We will be considering a wide range of topics and attributes that could be used for guiding our Pastor along a path that benefits the congregation. We will continue to provide updates on this as we move forward, and, anyone who feels that providing "Feedback" is something more appealing than an "Annual Review", the opportunity still exist.

The next topic is one that I have mentioned before and was in my January Beacon Article. I am going to include this again as I have not seen a lot of volunteers signing up on the clipboard that has been passed around the sanctuary on Sunday.

In addition to this, I'm sure that the Youth Director will be making an announcement for help once again as She continues to identify enough volunteers to make out a schedule.

During our annual staff reviews, I received some really good feedback from our staff and we will be making some subtle changes as a result. We will begin to list the name of the volunteers who assist the Youth Director in the Sunday bulletin so it is easier to keep up with, these will continue to be posted in the Beacon each month. It is very important that we have a second adult with the Youth Director so we follow the Safe Sanctuary Policy; on Sunday where we do not have a second adult in the class, the youth will have to come upstairs and miss out on the planned curriculum.

I have also received feedback from some volunteers who assist with children's Sunday School and Children's Church, these volunteers have expressed a desire to "have a role and be a part of the program" so here are the details on how we will work this out.

- A copy of the materials to be used during the Sunday School and Children's Church will be place in the box on the wall above the copier the Sunday before- It will be the responsibility for each volunteer to pick up their copy so they can review it and be prepared to assist the following week
- The volunteer will have an identified teaching role during the Sunday classes, these will be identified in the copy of the materials you will pick up prior to your week to assist.
- Once the schedule is put together and published, it will be the responsibility of the volunteer to be on time and ready to assist for the youth services. IF you are unable to attend during the week you are scheduled- The volunteer should arrange for a replacement and notify the Youth Director of the change.
