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A Word from the Bishop – 2017

The 500th Anniversary of the Lutheran his coming year, 2017, marks the Reformation. January, as you meet for your annual meeting, is also likely to be a month of continued political turmoil as we inaugurate a new president.



This is our context. We minister in interesting and expectant times!

Our church has a 78-year history of formal refugee resettlement and relocation work through Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services (LIRS). In 1945, immediately following WWII, American Lutherans formed a government advocacy ministry which today is known as the Lutheran Office of Governmental Affairs - LOGA. Through LOGA American Lutherans have under our belt 72 years of advocating for individual and family rights and benefits. And, for over 150 years, Lutheran hospitals have served the sick, counseling centers have worked with families, and adoption agencies have striven for the wellbeing and safety of children. Lutheran Services of America (LSA), an umbrella network for these institutions, now touches one in every 50 American lives. We give thanks for the many ways we are able to serve.

This coming year will call us from many directions to focus and refine our ministry as Lutheran Christians.

- Living in a world of the “spiritual but not religious” we seek relevant language and connections for vital ministry.
- With a large number of Oregon Synod congregations feeling the pinch of increasing ministry costs and declining member contributions, we wonder about sustainability.
- And, with new initiatives on the political horizon, we are likely to have basic Lutheran convictions and work (such as those mentioned above) challenged.

The blessing here is that these three issues all relate. Those who have given up on institutional religion often do so because they find ‘church’ politically and practically irrelevant. We are neither of those things, and this year will give us a fresh opportunity to walk our talk as socially relevant people of faith. Committing clearly and courageously to all whose daily lives we can impact is the most direct path forward. The coming 500th Anniversary of the Reformation gives us a opportunity to share our joy.

As you gather and pray around your ministry for the coming year I would ask the following:


1. Engage in celebration around the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. I have written a series of bulletin inserts for your use, (oregonsynod.org/500) and Augsburg fortress has wonderful resources as well. We are finding ways to give thanks together.
2. Send thoughtful leaders to our May 5-7, 2017 500th Anniversary Synod Assembly in Portland - individuals who will eagerly engage in conversation and bring our work back to you. We want you present. We want you active in shaping the future of our church, and we want everybody at the table. (Send Youth Voting Members, too!!)
3. Give generously of your time and treasures. We fell (possibly significantly) behind Mission Support this year and I know there are pressing needs in your local community and congregation as well. The Mission Support you give us this coming year goes 41% to the national church, another 10% to ministries outside of Oregon, with the remaining supporting the synod's operating budget. Above and beyond this, though, over \$350,000 in the form of New Beginnings grants, Health and Wellness grants, Ethnic ministry support, Transformational Leadership Initiatives, and New Ministries support will go directly to you in 2017. This money comes from synodical endowments and churchwide sources. I thank you, our national church organization, and the courage of your Synod Council. We are investing heavily in our future!
4. Consider becoming an ELCA AMMPARO Welcoming Congregation to help protect the rights and wellbeing of Latino Immigrant children and their families. The Synod voted to become a "Sanctuary Synod" in 2016 and requested resources for engaging this work.

I am excited about the work we are doing together. I share your concern in changing social and financial times, but rest in the words of our Risen Lord, "Fear not!" The Grace of God, which we embrace so boldly as Lutheran Christians, is given to us so that we might risk the new and resist the temptation of the temporary.

You are called – you, uniquely and by name - to be a part of God's great, gifted, unfolding of the Kingdom. Here there is room for all. And, living in the hope of the feast of life yet to come, we are bold to confess our faith, welcome the stranger, serve our neighbor, and embrace ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden.

Year End Report — 2016

Grace and Mercy Lutheran Church, Hermiston, OR.

I always pray for you, and I make my requests with a heart full of joy...

Philippians 1:4 (NLT)

So here we are again at the end of one year and the beginning of the next. It would be an understatement to suggest that this has been anything but an "interesting" year. We have been involved with (ongoing?) financial issues (actually, they just kinda snuck up on us a year earlier than we expected. They really weren't anything that we didn't know that we would have to deal with one day. But money, for some reason, is an ongoing "tissue" in the church. We tend to approach finances from a perspective of scarcity rather than from the view of the blessing of God. Thoughts on this?); space issues (or we might say, "Where is our next home?" Thank you to First United Methodist Church who extended an invitation to live with them and to explore with each other how ministry can, is, and will be done in Hermiston.). We wouldn't be far off to say that our thoughts and actions were consumed by these two issues — but much more took place.

We again celebrated another 'Cod's Work Our Hands" Sunday (you have circled September 10, 2017 for the next one, correct?) doing yard work for the Domestic Shelter. Far from being a "one-off" event, initial talk has started about doing a little more in-depth work for the shelter. Though this hasn't materialized, yet, the conversation has started.

We continue to worship at the Prison every six weeks. This year we added a Reformation Sunday Celebration, complete with Brats and trimmings; a Christmas Eve service and requests that we begin to include the concerns of this community in our Sunday morning worship. And, I have been asked to help mentor one through his Master of Theology degree (anyone want to read up on Process Theology). Events and requests like this only happen as relationships are established and allowed to grow. As part of our worshiping together, we have seen the numbers who participate grow and the congregation become more diverse.

We have found a new home. My thanks to the members of the First United Methodist Church who have graciously received us. It was a wonderful "moving Sunday" as we joined together to worship in two sites and share a meal together. Talk continues as we seek points where shared ministry can take place (think Sunday school, Open Table, Prison Ministry, and Quilting to start).

We had a wonderful turnout for the Family Christmas festival in December, Women's Appreciation Sunday, VBS, a good two-year Site review, etc., etc., etc. In short, we had/have much more to celebrate than to worry about!

To paraphrase Paul, "we look through a glass dimly..." What does the future hold? The only honest answer is, "Only God knows." For some this could mean that we wait and let God tell us what to do — or more to the point we would call this a holding pattern. Preferably it means that we are proactive in understanding what God has already called us to (think Baptism in its grandest terms). The place we need to start is where the Site Review report dovetails with the sticky note survey of ministries that G&M is involved with. Where are the points of greatest passion? How are the identified areas of ministries and identified growth edges an expression of the hand of God at work in our world? This is exciting to think about — to see how far and wide God works through us. Add on top of this the layer of FUMC and it really does begin to look like the edge of ministry is our imagination.

One other big conversation we need to have, soon, is our ministry together. We now enter year 3 of a 3year term call. What lies ahead for us? Will our journey continue together? If so, how will this take place (in real practical terms we can now talk about those financial issues). Should our journey continue or does God have something else in mind? I don't have an answer for this, but I do think that the conversation does need to begin, now.

With that, I do want to thank you for this past year and to underscore what Paul says to the church at Philippi: When I pray for you, I do so with great joy.

Worship Committee

- Average attendance for the year thus far was 27.45 (as of October)
- Midweek services during Lent were shared with Hermiston First United Methodist and St. John Episcopal
- Monday morning find two groups involved in study of the Bible texts for each Sunday's worship o In June, and outdoor service and picnic was held in a city park

Prison Ministry:

- In May of this year, we were given the opportunity to initiate a Vesper and communion worship service at Eastern Oregon Correctional Institution. We have continued worshipping with the prisoners in a service about every six weeks. Average attendance at these services has been 26.
- Beginning in January, we will be providing the prisoners who attend the Sunday morning Lutheran services with the devotional booklets, "Portals of Prayer".
- This month of October, we will combine the Vesper service with a Reformation Celebration meal.
- In May, during the annual "Art Walk" on Main Street, sponsored by the Parks and Recreation staff of the city, we were able to display art work created by the inmates of TRCI. This is the third year we have done this.

Music:

Using funds from memorial gifts, we have purchased a set of hand chimes. We are still on a learning curve in their use, but hope to add special music to worship services soon.

Foot Care Clinic:

On the third Wednesday of each month, two retired nurses make available basic foot care to any community members.

Bible Study:

Other than the Next Text studies noted above, there is also a twice monthly group that meets to discuss the Bible studies from "Gather" magazine.

Benevolence:

Each month our benevolence giving focuses on a different need — sometimes local needs, such as Agape House or Domestic Violence Shelter; or more globally, to Lutheran World Relief or ELCA World Hunger.

09 October 2016

Grace and Mercy Council

Good evening. I am not certain if I am formally considered chair, or even part, of a standing committee for Grace and Mercy Lutheran. However, I am very active in some groups that are hosted by the congregation and I want to take a moment to talk about these groups.

1. Next Text

- a. Next Text is a group that meets weekly to discuss the next Sunday's Lectionary Bible readings. The concept for this group was borrowed from a similar group that meets in Coos Bay and after attending sessions there Michelle wanted to have a similar discussion group here in Hermiston.
- b. There are now two discussion groups. One known affectionately as Next Text Classic and the other Next Text version 2.0
- c. Attendance at the Monday morning session that meets at the Pheasant Restaurant at 0632 is usually 6 to 8 early risers. Pastor Tom has added a wealth of knowledge to the discussions there and is certainly a major factor in the success of the group.
- d. Attendance at the Monday mid-morning session meets in the social area of Grace and Mercy and I believe its attendance numbers are consistent in the 6 or 7 .
- e. I believe that both sessions are alive and a viable outreach mission of Grace and Mercy.

2. Tapping into Faith

- a. Tapping into Faith is an idea that Caitlyn Cozad brought to the attention of the congregation during a mission development meeting back when we were meeting at the Presbyterian Church.
- b. Research into the original program found that the material, name, and concept were copyrighted by the Roman Catholic Church. The idea of meeting regularly in a non-traditional setting, e.g. a local pub, where a discussion could be held about theological ideas while enjoying a brew was still favored by some of the congregation.
- c. Thus was born Grace and Mercy's Tapping into Faith. We avoided copyright laws, have a forum that meets monthly to discuss theological ideas and socialize.
- d. Topics that have been discussed in the past are the relevance of beer to the church, Pascal's Wager, Does God Answer Prayers, is the book of Mark written in a Homeric style to attract the Hellenic reader?

- e. Tapping into Faith is a well attended outreach ministry of the Grace and Mercy Congregation. Attendance averages around 8 regular attendees with a high of 14.

On multiple occasions guests of the pub who are not members of the congregation have joined us either for nearly the entire discussion or have made comments to the group after sitting nearby and listening in.

- f. As the last meeting was about to start I overheard one patron of the bar asking what was going on as we started gathering around the larger table. Another patron answered that it is a local church that holds a bible study there. The first person responded "here?" and the second patron said "Yeah it is kinda cool."

3. Novel Ideas book group.

- a. The book group grew from a desire that Michelle and I had to have a book group here in Hermiston that could meet on a regular basis and discuss books mutually selected by the book group.
- b. There was a contest to name the group and Novel Ideas was selected as the theme.
- c. We meet monthly in the social area of Grace and Mercy to share a meal time, socialize, and discuss various books nominated to be read by the group.
- d. We have read a wide variety of books that include; Proof of Heaven, The Five People you meet in Heaven, Water for Elephants, Tuesdays with Morrie, The Book Thief, Spilt Milk, Sometimes A Great Notion, The Invention of Wings, Astoria, A Light in the Woods, The American Lady, Accidental Saints, Sentence of Marriage, Three Lines A Day, and many more.
- e. The book group is in its fourth year and going strong.
- f. I hope that when we begin worshipping at the Methodist Church that some members of that congregation will join us in the book group.
- g. Attendance at the monthly meetings averages 6 to 12 people depending upon abilities to attend.

4. The Sound System

- a. Within the limits of the current worship area the sound system seems to be meeting our needs.
- b. If we had a different meeting area I believe that we could improve on the sound system's abilities by moving the speakers out in front of the service's presider/reader.

- c. Currently we sometimes get a minor feedback from the microphone to the speaker when the Pastor moves out in front of the speakers. To counter this I have reduced the gain on the wireless mic. This results in his voice sometimes being muffled. However, since we meet in a small area this change has not affected us too adversely.

5. Technology

- a. Currently we have a Digital Subscriber Line (DSL) access to the internet through Eastern Oregon Telecom. This service seems to meet our needs.
- b. We have a modem/router installed that has no public access on it that if we needed a network for the church with greater security we could start using. To date this network segment has not been utilized. This router is owned by EOT and will return to them when we move.
- c. Michelle and I have loaned another router/wifi access point/firewall to the church that gives public access to the internet over an un-secured network segment with a different Internet Protocol address pool than the secure network segment. Having the two network address pools makes the network segments invisible to each other. This router should be returned to us if it is not put into use after the transition to the Methodist Church. Attached to the un-secure network segment are the printer and a file server.
- d. The printer is adequately used and served by this network. The file server is underutilized and Michelle, Pastor Tom, and I will work on making it more useful to the congregation; specifically to members of council who have need of a centralized storage point.
- e. There has been discussion of purchasing a laptop computer for the church. I strongly urge the council to not make this purchase at this time.
 - i. Pastor Tom has repeatedly expressed his desire to continue to use his own laptop(s).
 - ii. If no one is using the laptop it will sit in disuse and the anti-virus programs and operating systems will not be kept current creating a possible hazard of having the computer hacked into if it is put into use.
 - iii. Additionally technology advances so quickly that if we have a computer sitting on a desk that is unused for a few months to a year it will be stale, dated technology before it is even put into use.
 - iv. I have heard that there is a desire to have documents stored on the computer as a central repository. The computer will be less secure than the file server and it will be more difficult to put files onto the laptop and later to retrieve them than by using the file server which the council has already purchased.
 - v. The printer is available to anyone who brings their computer, phone, or tablet to the building, installs the correct drivers, and connects to the nonsecure network segment. The printer is outside the range of shared network addresses and thus less visible to casual users.

- vi. In the past members of the congregation were having trouble accessing the internet through the non-secure router. I found a problem in the way that the address are shared with users and after a change was made in the way that addresses are shared I have not heard a complaint for over a year about access.
 - f. Michelle and I will be working to create a website for the church prior to our departure for Arizona this winter. In the past the church had a web page however the cost was too great to justify keeping it. At the time we discontinued the web site it was costing the church 30+ dollars a month to maintain. Michelle and I are researching web sites that will not cost the church anything on a monthly basis.
 - i. Once established we will work with the council to see what information should be shared through the web site.
 - g. Currently Michelle and I are using Facebook pages and groups to share information about the Church, Tapping Into Faith, and Novel Ideas. After the web site is created I anticipate that the Facebook pages will continue to be used and the information will also be posted on the web site.
- 6. Phone system at Grace and Mercy Church
 - a. Currently we have a phone system installed in the church that gets little if any use. Messages are left and not retrieved in a timely manner. When we move to the Methodist Church I recommend that we discontinue the traditional landline phone and get a cell phone using a metered service such as cricket or similar.
 - b. If the council desires to maintain a landline type phone presence here I recommend that we research a VOIP (Voice over Internet Phone) type device. We have one at home that costs us \$35 per year. Calls may be made anywhere in the Continental U.S. without additional charge. And voice messages left are forwarded to an email address that we can establish. Rochelle is putting one in their residence soon for use by Em, Laura, and Dan in emergencies after they return home from school.
 - c. The existing phone device that the church owns could be used with the VOIP device thus saving the expense of the phone itself.
- 7. KIVA
 - a. The KIVA project, I believe, is an underutilized mission of Grace and Mercy. This concept was brought to the congregation by Jerry McMichael and I believe it is a brilliant method for the church to directly help persons throughout the world as they try to better their lives and their livelihood.
 - b. The monies that have gone into the KIVA project have been loaned out time and again with 100% return so that the monies can be used again.
 - c. KIVA is a monthly mission of the congregation with monies collected during December given to the benefit. However, we have never had a major KIVA fund

raising event except for the Luminaria sales that Michelle and I have promoted in the past.

- d. I believe that the council should put a greater level of support into KIVA and that we should promote it just as we do the Crisis Center, the Holiday Meals, and etc.
- e. I would like to see a social event offered and that attendees at the social listen to a short presentation about KIVA applicants from the KIVA committee and then the attendees vote on how the KIVA monies are distributed. This could be a very fun time together with a very good outcome for KIVA applicants. I would like to see the KIVA fund more actively supported and promoted by the Council during December when it is the monthly benevolence.

8. Luminaria Fund Raiser

- a. Selling Luminaria is still a viable method of fund raising except that we have saturated the market here at Grace and Mercy.
- b. Anyone who wants the electric Luminaria has already purchased them. I have suspended ordering additional boxes of lights because we were paying for them and not selling all that we had to order to get merchant pricing. Thus we now have many, many sets of Luminaria available to Michelle and I from unpurchased sets of lights.
- c. Perhaps after we move to the Methodist Church, and if we use the lights that are available to the congregation, we may be able to offer them to the members of the Methodist Church. But for now I believe that project is at its mature point and do not anticipate making orders this winter.

 - safe
 - authentic
 - reflects their values
 - looking for relational, deeper conversations
 - direct mail invites - direct person to person invites
 - need to listen to the 20 - 50 year olds about church - need to add 20 - 50 year old people to the church - what are 6 things common to 20 - 50 year old?
 - they need a reason to 'connect! with us - 'If we build it they will come ' does not work
 - Pledge and Plate (congregation needs to pledge, direct deposit)
 - look for grants and partnerships outside of the Lutheran Church

- look for 'friends of' (another church or organization donates \$\$ to us because we do a specific project. IE: Prison Ministry)
- If you are under 50 years old you do not relate to church or Christianity.

Summary of Life of the 3 year Grant with Pastor Inch

In any business class or accounting class you would be told to expect 7 years to start a new business. To plan on funding for the whole 7 years as all profit will be returned to the business for 7 years.

Starting a new church has similar challenges and expenses.

When we started Grace and Mercy we had nothing but our faith and a need to be servants to our community.

We have grappled with worship in a building not our own.

We leased and remodeled a building downtown to begin our ministry downtown. The first year we were on Main street very few people knew we were there.

We have developed in the community and become more involved. More people now know who we are.

We have hosted 2 interns who each lent their gifts to us.

Year 1 of Grant 2015 - 2016: We began small group Vision Groups with Pastor Inch. The questions were: Where did we start? Where are we now? Where do we want to go?

Year 2 of Grant 2016 - 2017: We would start Large Group Discussions to formalize our goals and path in the community. How do we fulfill our Vision Statement??

We had just started the large group discussions when we had to turn our attention to financial matters. Since this is the first time we have had a pastor we spent many hours this year also working our way through wages, retirement, health plans, insurance issues, etc. We are still a relatively new business in town.

Year 3 of Grant 2017 - 2018: Implement our vision and goals in the community, continue building partnerships in the community.

Year 2 and 3 will be impacted without the continuation of the grant. Including us possibly losing our pastor and our building,
