### Series: Defining Moments

#### Week 6

**Esther 4:1-17 (NLT)** <sup>1</sup> When Mordecai learned about all that had been done, he tore his clothes, put on burlap and ashes, and went out into the city, crying with a loud and bitter wail. <sup>2</sup> He went as far as the gate of the palace, for no one was allowed to enter the palace gate while wearing clothes of mourning. <sup>3</sup> And as news of the king's decree reached all the provinces, there was great mourning among the Jews. They fasted, wept, and wailed, and many people lay in burlap and ashes. <sup>4</sup> When Queen Esther's maids and eunuchs came and told her about Mordecai, she was deeply distressed. She sent clothing to him to replace the burlap, but he refused it. <sup>5</sup> Then Esther sent for Hathach, one of the king's eunuchs who had been appointed as her attendant. She ordered him to go to Mordecai and find out what was troubling him and why he was in mourning. <sup>6</sup> So Hathach went out to Mordecai in the square in front of the palace gate. <sup>7</sup> Mordecai told him the whole story, including the exact amount of money Haman had promised to pay into the royal treasury for the destruction of the Jews. <sup>8</sup> Mordecai gave Hathach a copy of the decree issued in Susa that called for the death of all Jews. He asked Hathach to show it to Esther and explain the situation to her. He also asked Hathach to direct her to go to the king to beg for mercy and plead for her people. <sup>9</sup> So Hathach returned to Esther with Mordecai's message. <sup>10</sup> Then Esther told Hathach to go back and relay this message to Mordecai: <sup>11</sup> "All the king's officials and even the people in the provinces know that anyone who appears before the king in his inner court without being invited is doomed to die unless the king holds out his gold scepter. And the king has not called for me to come to him for thirty days." <sup>12</sup> So Hathach gave Esther's message to Mordecai. <sup>13</sup> Mordecai sent this reply to Esther: "Don't think for a moment that because you're in the palace you will escape when all other Jews are killed. <sup>14</sup> If you keep quiet at a time like this, deliverance and relief for the Jews will arise from some other place, but you and your relatives will die. Who knows if perhaps you were made queen for just such a time as this?" <sup>15</sup> Then Esther sent this reply to Mordecai: <sup>16</sup> "Go and gather together all the Jews of Susa and fast for me. Do not eat or drink for three days, night or day. My maids and I will do the same. And then, though it is against the law, I will go in to see the king. If I must die, I must die." <sup>17</sup> So Mordecai went away and did everything as Esther had ordered him.

**Prayer and fasting are intended to more clearly reveal what \_\_\_\_\_ wants \_\_\_\_\_ to do.**

**Esther 5:1-2 (NLT)** <sup>1</sup> On the third day of the fast, Esther put on her royal robes and entered the inner court of the palace, just across from the king's hall. The king was sitting on his royal throne, facing the entrance. <sup>2</sup> When he saw Queen Esther standing there in the inner court, he welcomed her and held out the gold scepter to her. So Esther approached and touched the end of the scepter.

**Esther 7:1-6 (NLT)** <sup>1</sup> So the king and Haman went to Queen Esther's banquet. <sup>2</sup> On this second occasion, while they were drinking wine, the king again said to Esther, "Tell me what you want, Queen Esther. What is your request? I will give it to you, even if it is half the kingdom!" <sup>3</sup> Queen Esther replied, "If I have found favor with the king, and if it pleases the king to grant my request, I ask that my life and the lives of my people will be spared. <sup>4</sup> For my people and I have been sold to those who would kill, slaughter, and annihilate us. If we had merely been sold as slaves, I could remain quiet, for that would be too trivial a matter to warrant disturbing the king." <sup>5</sup> "Who would do such a thing?" King Xerxes demanded. "Who would be so presumptuous as to touch you?" <sup>6</sup> Esther replied, "This wicked Haman is our adversary and our enemy." Haman grew pale with fright before the king and queen.

**Esther 8:3-6 (NLT)** <sup>3</sup> Then Esther went again before the king, falling down at his feet and begging him with tears to stop the evil plot devised by Haman the Agagite against the Jews. <sup>4</sup> Again the king held out the gold scepter to Esther. So she rose and stood before him. <sup>5</sup> Esther said, "If it please the king, and if I have found favor with him, and if he thinks it is right, and if I am pleasing to him, let there be a decree that reverses the orders of Haman son of Hammedatha the Agagite, who ordered that Jews throughout all the king's provinces should be destroyed. <sup>6</sup> For how can I endure to see my people and my family slaughtered and destroyed?"
